Presentation/Communication Activities for the Program Part of the Meeting

These presentations are an important way for 4-H members to share what they have learned or interests they have developed thought their 4-H projects or activities. These are also important ways for youth to develop communication and leadership skills. It is good to encourage participation in these activities. The Extension Office can provide more information on how to carryout these activities.

Presentations/Demonstrations

These provide the opportunity for the 4-Hers to share things they have learned in their projects. Actual articles are used to show the steps necessary for a finished product. Most demonstrations consist of three parts:

- 1. <u>Introduction</u>—explains the purpose of the demonstration.
- 2. Body—outlines subject step-by-step
- 3. Summary—reviews important points and gives an opportunity for questions

Illustrated Talks

They differ from demonstrations in that they "**tell**" how rather than "**show**" how. Charts, models and other visual aids are essential for illustrated talks.

Project Talks

These are given about the member's projects. The project talk can describe things experienced while dong the project or give information related to the project.

Multimedia PowerPoint Presentation

This presentation is an original computer generated program developed by the 4-H member. It is a fully-automated presentation that relates to 4-H with only an introduction by the 4-Her.

Presentation Using Electronic Media

With this presentation the 4-Her may use slides, video, overhead or other electronic media as a part of a presentation relating to 4-H.
