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Indiana 4-H Youth Development



Over 400 youth at Indiana's Statehouse talked with Senators and Representatives and sat in sessions watching bills being discussed. Youth plan to use this experience for future opportunities in government, as interns, in running for office, for careers, and for voting in local elections.

Agriculture & Natural Resources

"So, You Inherited a Farm, Now What?" helped families improve communication among family members or tenants, understand land values, and establish written leases. Six months later, participants had renegotiated cash rents, talked with their children about future plans, and gotten a farm manager. Changes led to improved financial outcomes over \$10 per acre.



Community Development

Leadership Vermillion County trained adult volunteers via workshops and an Indiana Statehouse trip. Participants learned about personalities, diversity, conflict management, economic development, boards, government, and community health. They were inspired and gained knowledge of their county, leadership skills, and ways to lead successful teams. One said, "This will make me a better, more inclusive leader."



Health & Human Sciences



Purdue Extension collaborated in 151 community health coalitions on wellness, substance use, mental health, chronic disease prevention, and local foods via workshops, health fairs, town halls, and challenge events. Some 35 received \$2.6 million. Coalitions changed/created 16 policies, 69 systems, 61 environmental strategies, and added 380 new partnerships for community health.
