



OISC Pesticide Applicator Licenses

For pesticide (PARP) and fertilizer (Cat. 14) applicators wanting to review their license "points", go to the Office of the Indiana State Chemist (OISC) website to check your personal OISC records

https://inplants.oisc.purdue.edu/USAPlantsIN/Index.aspx

On the left side click on the ninth/bottom tab marked "Applicator Login", then provide your name and last four SSN digits to log in for your information and credits/meetings attended.



For individuals wanting to obtain a Private Applicator license, the most popular way to take the exam has been to obtain the training manual for the CORE exam (PPP-13), study the manual at home, and then take the exam at the lvy Tech Community College in Evansville (other testing locations available at <u>https://tinyurl.com/5kb6898w</u> or ph. 877-533-2900

The test is administered by the Metro Institute, and Ivy Tech merely provides the supervision during the exam.

To prepare for the exam, the study manual can be purchased for \$40 plus shipping at <u>https://tinyurl.com/yrjxswt5</u> or by calling 765-494-6794.

Manuals are available in English and Spanish (limited English manuals are also available in some Dubois County libraries) .

Once you receive a manual, go on-line to <u>https://tinyurl.com/5yy5xay6</u> or call 1-877-533-2900 to schedule an appointment to take the exam. Leave a message and let them know when the best time is to reach you.

Everyone taking the exam must show a government-issued photo ID. Contact the Indiana State Chemist at 756-494-1492 for alternative identification, if needed. A person is allowed three attempts to take the exam in 12 months' time. There is a \$55 fee for use of facilities through Ivy Tech.



Winter Garden Calendar

Lawns, Tree Fruits, Landscape Plants, and Woody Ornamentals

February

- Check mulches, rodent shields, salt/wind screens and other winter plant protections. to make sure they are still in place.
- Prune landscape plants, except early spring bloomers, which should be pruned after flowers fade. Birches, maples, dogwoods, and other heavy sap bleeders can be pruned in early summer to avoid the sap flow, although bleeding is not harmful to the tree.
- Prune Fruit trees to control plant size and remove dead, damaged, or weak limbs.

March

- Rake to remove leaves, twigs and trash.
- Mow lawn as needed. the first mowing should be slightly lower than normal to encourage green-up.
- Prune trees and shrubs while plants are still dormant. Those that bloom early in spring should be pruned after flowers fade.
- Fertilize woody plants before new growth begins but wait until after soil temperatures have reached 40 F (Usually in early March in Southern IN) Two pounds of actual nitrogen per 1000 square feet should be broadcast over the entire root area.
- Remove winter coverings from roses as soon as new growth begins, but keep mulch near by for protection from late freezes. Prune and fertilize as needed.
- Apply superior oil spray to control scale insects and mites on landscape plants and fruit trees when tip of leaves start to protrude from buds.

Indoor Plants and Activities

February

- Check water levels daily in cut-flower vases.
- Repot houseplants as the outgrow current pots.
- Early blooms of spring-flowering bulbs can make good gifts for a sweetheart. Keep the plant in a bright, cool location for long lasting blooms.

March

- Apply fertilizer to houseplants according to label directions as days grow brighter and longer and new growth begins. Foliage plants require a relatively high-nitrogen fertilizer while blooming plants thrive on formulations that are higher in phorporus. Remove spent leaves and flowers regularly to improve looks and encourage more blooms.
- Start seeda of cool season plants for translplanting outdoors later in spring. (Late February for Southern IN.)

Flowers, Vegetables, and Small Fruits

February

- Prepare or repair lawn and garden tools for upcoming season.
- Start seeds indoors for cool-season vegetables; so they will be ready for transplanting to the garden early in the season. Broccoli, cauliflower, and cabbage seeds should be started five to seven weeks prior to transplanting.
- Test leftover garden seeds for germination. Place 10 seeds between moist paper towel or cover with a thin layer of soil. Keep seeds warm and moist. If less than six seeds germinate, fresh seeds should be purchased.

March

- Perpare garden soil for planting. DO NOT work soil while it's wet. Soil should crumble when squeezed in your hand when it's ready to work. If soil forms a soild ball when squeezed in your hand, it's still too wet.
- Follow last fall's soil test recommendations for fertilizer and pH adjustment. (it's not too late to test your soil, if you missed last year.)
- Start seeds of warm season vegetables and flowers, indoors (In North and Central IN wait until end of Marchearly April)
- Watch for blooms of early spring bulbs such as dafodils squill, crocus, dwarf Iris and snowdrops.
- Remove old asparagus and rhubarb tops and then side dress with nitrogen or manure.

Keep Your Home Warm and

Safe in Winter Conditions

In winter our thoughts often turn first to higher utility costs. But we may need to consider more measures to stay warm and safe at home. Staying warm becomes more challenging if the heat goes out in your home. In that case, look for community resources to help you heat your house or apartment.

Keep Warm and Reduce Costs

Whether you're a homeowner or renter, you can keep your home warm and save on heating costs. Just take these simple steps:

- Set your heat at 68 degrees or lower. To save on heating bills, close off rooms you don't use. Also turn the thermostat below 68 degrees when you're asleep or away from home.
- Keep extra blankets, sleeping bags, and warm winter coats available if the power goes out.
- To keep warm at home, wear socks, slippers and long underwear. Dress in layers of clothing. Throw a blanket over your legs when you are sitting.
- Do not turn on stove burners or the oven for heat. This poses a fire hazard and can cause carbon monoxide poisoning. Carbon monoxide (CO) is produced whenever fuel such as gas, oil, kerosene, wood or charcoal is burned. Maintaining and using appliances running on these fuel sources correctly usually keeps CO levels safe. But if appliances are not working properly or are used incorrectly, dangerous levels of CO can result. Carbon monoxide is colorless and odorless. At high levels, it can kill a person in minutes.
- Portable space heaters are a good choice to provide more heat. Make sure your space heater has an automatic shut-off switch and a non-glowing element. Never place a space heater on top of furniture or near water. Also keep it at least three feet away from furniture and drapes. Never leave children unattended near a space heater.
- Seal insulation gaps. Especially check around doors and windows for spots additional weather stripping or caulk might be needed.
- Re-set ceiling fans to clockwise rotation to move heat back down into living areas.
- Add a humidifier for increased air moisture to retain heat (also helps house plants in the room).

Stay Safe During Winter Storms

Winter storms are natural disasters. They can have a devastating effect on families and their homes. Here are some things to be aware of:

- If you lose power, don't use stoves, ovens, grills, or other cooking equipment for heat. This could cause fires or carbon monoxide poisoning. Only use proper equipment, like space heaters, to provide heat. And use them correctly (see above).
- You may use a generator during power outages. But be sure to maintain and operate it correctly. Follow the operating instructions as listed in the owner's manual.
- Stay away from damaged utility lines. They present a fire hazard and can be life threatening.
- Water-damaged appliances and utility equipment, like water heaters, may still be electrically charged. Unplug damaged appliances and equipment. Also turn off electrical breakers or switches and contact your utility company.
- Frozen water pipes can burst and cause home damage and safety hazards. Drain and shut off water pipes that are not used frequently in the winter, especially those that lead outside.
- Gas lines, gas propane containers, and vehicle gas tanks may explode or ignite if they are leaking. If you smell gas, exit immediately and call for help.

Get Help from the Federal Energy Assistance Program

The federal Energy Assistance Program helps pay home heating costs and furnace repairs if you qualify. Both renters and homeowners are eligible for the program based on income, household size, fuel type, and usage. Learn more about the Energy Assistance Program on Indiana's IH&CDA website at:



Premise ID Information -

Premise ID is required for any 4-H livestock animal (beef, dairy, goat, rabbit, sheep, and swine) that will be exhibited and entered in the food system. It provides the information needed to trace the animal from processing back to the farm to ensure a safe food system and necessary biosecurity.

If there were animals on the property beforehand, then you will need to check if there is a premise id already assigned. To check to see if there is an existing Premise ID email <u>animalid@boah.in.gov</u> (Include your name and physical address in the email.)

To obtain a new Premise ID please go here <u>https://www.in.gov/boah/traceability-and-premise-id/indiana-premises-</u> <u>registration/</u> and you can complete an online form. It will ask you questions about what animals will be on the property but there is a spot that you can select 4-H as the reason animals will be located on the property.


