

Mini 4-H



Welcome to *Mini 4-H!* You are now a member of the Elkhart County 4-H family! We hope that you will have lots of fun learning new things in your 4-H career.

Mini 4-H is designed for youth in Kindergarten - Second grade. It will give you a taste of the 4-H program as well as help you to explore a variety of project areas.

Mini 4-H'ers may enroll in two different projects each year. This manual contains fun, age appropriate activities to complete throughout the 4-H year. These activities will help you to learn about the project you have chosen. Additionally, the manual contains all instructions needed for the exhibit you will be preparing for the Elkhart County 4- H Fair in July.

There is no competition in the Mini 4-H program. Each child who completes a project for the Fair will receive the same green completion ribbon and certificate. Judges comment sheets are provided only as a way to help you do your very best on future projects.

Mini 4-H does not have regular monthly meetings. Try to attend the special activities planned especially for YOU! These will give you a chance to meet the project leaders, have some hands-on fun, and ask questions about your important Fair display. Mini 4-H is FUN! You will enjoy it.

Once you enter the third grade you can join a regular 4-H club that meets monthly. You must enroll each year of your 4-H career.

As a Mini 4-H parent, please help guide and encourage your child through the activities. Work with them to help them "learn by doing". Activities are designed to help your child learn about the project they have chosen. It is not required that they complete all the activities in this manual. Choose those that interest you and your child.



What is Gardening?

Having a garden can be FUN! Plants are living things that you grow. We see plants all around us. You may enjoy growing houseplants (grown inside your house in a pot), a vegetable garden to put food on the table or a flower garden to make your yard more beautiful. All these plants need special care to grow. In this project you will learn how to grow plants successfully.



ACTIVITY 1 – WHAT PLANTS NEED

All plants have needs to grow and be healthy. Among these are water, soil, air and space to grow. Different plants like different amounts of sunshine and different temperatures. It is important to choose a plant that likes the conditions that you have where you want it to grow. For example, you wouldn't plant a flower that likes to be in the sun under a shade tree. Read the seed package when choosing seeds for your garden.



ACTIVITY 2 – GROWING A BEAN PLANT

This experiment will show you what happens when a plant doesn't get one of their needs met. In this case it will be light (or sunshine). This experiment also lets you see how a plant grows from a seed. The bean is the seed for the bean plant.

Materials needed for this activity:

pencil 2 clean plastic bags 8 – 10 bean seeds water 2 paper towels chart

ruler

What you will do:

- 1. Fold each paper towel so that it fits inside the plastic bag. Wet the paper towel and place it in the bag.
- 2. Place the seeds evenly inside the bag on the outside of the paper towel so you can see if they are growing.
- 3. Place one plastic bag in a warm, sunny place. Place the second bag in a dark place, like a closet.
- 4. Check the seeds every 2 days and record on the chart how they are growing.
- 5. Keep checking the seeds until they grow into a small plant.

Be sure to wet the paper towel if it dries out. You may plant the small bean plant in your garden!

ACTIVITY 3 – GROW A FLOWER GARDEN

(Get permission from your parents.)

Materials needed for this activity:


seeds of your choice a placed to grow a garden garden tools

fertilizer



What you will do:

- 1. Prepare the soil. Turn the soil about 2 ½ inches deep and smooth with a rake
- 2. Plant your seeds. Follow the instructions on the seed package. This will tell you how deep to plant your seeds and how long they will take to grow. (Be sure to plant early enough for your flowers to be ready for the Fair.)
- 3. Care for your garden. Water it every week if there isn't any rain. Protect your garden from hazards such as too much water, too much fertilizer, weeds or insects. Remember to pull weeds!






What to Exhibit Flower & Garden

There are three choices for your 4-H Fair exhibit. Please choose only one.

1. Make a Flower <u>OR</u> Garden poster. Your poster must be exactly 11 x 14 inches, displayed horizontally (wider than it is tall) and attached to a stiff backing (like cardboard). You may use foam board. Foam board is already stiff and does not require additional backing. Your poster must be covered with clear plastic. This can be a poster sleeve. If you have made a three dimensional item, you may use clear vinyl. Your poster must have a title.



Take several pictures of you working in your garden with your flowers \underline{OR} vegetables. Put 1 – 5 pictures of you working in your garden on the poster.

NOTE: No oversize posters will be accepted for exhibition.

No un-mounted items will be accepted for exhibition.

- 2. Select one vegetable from your garden. Place your vegetable on a paper plate along with a picture of you in your garden. Place your plate inside a plastic bag.
- 3. Exhibit cut flowers you grew in your garden in a simple bud vase (provide your own vase). Vase must be no more than 9 inches tall by 3 inches wide, neck opening of vase not to exceed 1.5 inches and be clear or white. Include 1 to 3 stems of one kind of flower.

NOTE: If you are unable to pick your project up on Project Release
Day, please make arrangements to have it picked up. All
projects must be removed from the exhibit building by Project
Release. There is no available storage space for unclaimed

projects.

All posters, vegetables or flowers must include: (both are found on page 15)

- Record Sheet (attached to the back of the poster, bottom of plate or rubber band to vase).
- > Exhibit Tag attached to the back of the poster, bottom of plate or rubber band to vase).
