Expanding Opportunities

Fostering Sustainability

Here are some of the ways the Purdue Extension Master Gardener Program impacts Indiana communities.

- Purdue Extension Master Gardeners throughout Indiana donated 49,805 pounds of produce from approximately 47 educational demonstration gardens to local food banks to help fight food insecurity. Over 293 Purdue EMG volunteers reported more than 3,800 volunteer hours working in gardens that donated produce to food-insecure areas.
- The Community Garden in Elkhart started in 2001. A speaker from EnviroCorps discussed Plant A Row (PAR) for the Hungry. Many Michiana Master Gardeners committed to contributing to PAR and chose a site that EnviroCorps had developed at the Elkhart airport. More than two decades later the Community Garden is going strong.

In 2022 the gardens generated about 1,100 pounds of food that was donated to Church Community Services, a local food pantry. Extension Master Gardeners started keeping records in 2004; the donation total now exceeds 17,000 pounds. The garden is on city property, specifically Elkhart Municipal Airport. The city and airport staff are fully supportive partners and provide tilling, wood chips, etc. In 2021, the garden was the target of theft, and crops were destroyed. A fence was erected, completely at city expense, in spring 2022. The airport authority even threw a dedication party. Good things happen when people try to help each other.

In addition, Extension Master Gardeners have been part of organizing visits with other community gardens within the Seed to Feed Program at Church Community Services. These visits provide sharing of information, education and meeting together for a common purpose.
