Each pouch contains the essentials a young lady may need when that time comes, as well as a note of encouragement and a small piece of chocolate to help make that first time seem a little less scary. Members of the club harnessed the power of Facebook and started requesting donations before Christmas. What was originally concepted as 50 to 100 pouches, ended up being 361!

Lorraine Caldwell Award of Excellence

Since the inception of this award in 1994, many new members have joined our organization. Some may not know the background and reasons for this award. May I share that with you?

Lorraine Caldwell was my neighbor. She was a sincere and caring friend, not just to me, but also to those who knew her. Whenever or wherever she saw a need, she was the first to offer assistance, and could never turn down a request for her help. I used to tell her that she had a vocabulary deficiency—the word "No" wasn't included.

Lorraine was a New Palestine resident and a 20 year member of the Friendly Neighbors Extension Homemakers Club. She was a wife, mother, grandmother; a dear friend and confidant to many (myself included); a professional seamstress, quilter, an accomplished artist, award winner at County and State Fairs, Riley Days Home Arts and for many years, served as a fair judge for 4-H sewing projects in other counties and many other volunteer activities, too numerous to mention.

Soon after Lorraine's death in 1994, her longtime friend, Eva May Phelps contacted me about making a memorial gift to our club in Lorraine's name. Even though Lorraine's family had suggested that memorial contributions be made to the Cancer Fund or the Heart Association, Eva May felt that she wanted to make a donation to Lorraine's Homemaker's Club. To quote her, "Homemakers and their activities were very important to Lorraine." Her contribution was sizeable, and all that she asked was that the club have a luncheon, because, "Lorraine enjoyed them so much." I asked her permission to set aside part of the money for some sort of permanent memorial. After all, luncheons are soon forgotten. Her response was that whatever our club decided, as long as it included a luncheon. A dollar amount was set aside for our club's May guest luncheon, the rest went into a special account with the county organization, earmarked for the Lorraine Caldwell Award of Excellence.

At the time, my knowledge of the organization was limited. I contacted Nancy King, our extension educator at the time and good friend of Lorraine's, for advice. To make a long story, short, once the idea of the award was spawned, I contacted Lorraine's family for their approval. They were thrilled and pledged their support. Sharon Johnson, Lorraine's daughter, agreed to help establish the criteria for the award. I thank Sharon, Linda Lowe and Nancy King for their assistance.


Each year as I present this award, I feel very proud to honor an outstanding Extension Homemaker in Lorraine's name and memory.



LORRAINE CALDWELL AWARD OF EXCELLENCE

A yearly award to be presented on Achievement Day to a Hancock County Extension Homemaker.

Recipients are eligible to win only once.

Contributions to the award fund are encouraged, as a love gift or memorial for an Extension Homemaker. All contributions will be acknowledged and recognized.

Nominations for this award will come from all Extension Homemakers clubs in Hancock County. Forms will be passed out at the February President's County Council meeting. ANY club may nominate ANY Extension Homemaker, even though that person is not a member of their own club. When a nomination is made, it must be stated why that person should be considered. (Note: A biographical overview of the person's activities and achievements is helpful for the judge to be able to make a fair and appropriate choice.) Nomination forms must be in the Extension Office on or before Tuesday, April 1, 2025.

Selection of the recipient will be made by Health and Human Sciences professionals from surrounding counties or universities. All nominations will be considered.

Criteria for selection of the recipient are as follows:

- 1. Has shown excellence in promoting Extension Homemakers.
- 2. Has been a positive influence in her local club, county, and/or state.
- 3. Has shown excellence in promoting and "passing on to others", a field of interest, such as: Cultural Arts; Health, Nutrition, Safety etc.
- 4. Has been a positive influence in her home and community.
- 5. Has shown excellence "in the divine joy of living and helping others".
