The amount of participants and impactful programing presented within ANR in 2024 was exceptional. Reflecting on the impactful programs and partnerships from October to December, it's been a rewarding few months for HHS/CD programming. Our continued collaboration with partners like Hickory Treatment Center has been crucial in providing valuable resources to individuals overcoming substance use challenges. Over the last quarter, we hosted four sessions, engaging 78 participants in discussions on health and nutrition, financial education, and employability skills. I also had the opportunity to work alongside community leaders in Knox and Daviess counties, focusing on team building, conflict management, and interpersonal communication. These efforts highlight the power of community partnerships in achieving our broader goal of strengthening leadership and promoting well-being across Harrison County and beyond. As we move into the new year, I look forward to building on this momentum, continuing our strong partnerships, and always remaining open to forming new ones to better meet community needs and create lasting impact.

4-H and Youth Development

As we close out 2024, I'm happy to reflect on the growth and engagement in Harrison County 4-H. Our youth enrollment has seen a remarkable increase this year. From October to December of last year, we had 177 youth enrolled, and this year, that number has risen to 244 - a 38% increase!

October kicked off the start of the program year with fun STEM programs, enrollment events like Pumpkin Palooza, and Trunk or Treats. November was also filled with adventure for youth, with field trips to the North American Livestock Expo, Nashville's ICE at the Gaylord Opryland Hotel, and artistic workshops like the Paint Your Pet in Pop Art class. We wrapped up December with Saturday with Santa, cheese and caramel making workshops, and community service events such as Angel Tree and the a food drive.

I am grateful for the support of our volunteers and community, and I look forward to the continued growth and success of our 4-H program!

Crawford County 4th Grade Dairy Station

They discussed the differences between Dairy and Beef animals and the different dairy breeds along with characteristics. They had the chance to try 2 different types of cheeses and what causes them to be different. This was a very fun event to be apart of!



Area 2 Pesticide Applicator Program

On Tuesday, November 12, 2024, ANR Educator, Ariel Camm-Wilson had over 40 participants attend the Area 2 Parp program.

Attendees had the opportunity to learn about :

Cattle & Coffee

Saturday, Nov. 16th ANR Educator Ariel Camm-Wilson held an event for women in Ag in downtown Corydon at Kent Java. They enjoyed freshly brewed coffee while discussing Cattle. The discussions they had included cold stressors, body condition scoring and feeding cattle in the winter time. Participants also engaged in sharing stories and discussing fun facts about statistics in Indiana. Everyone at the event found the most interesting facts to be that cattle have the ability to smell things from 6 miles away, and that there are steaks that cost upwards of \$150 here in Indiana.

Guest speaker Jennifer Anderson with FSA, spoke about livestock disaster assistance programs and how they are available to those in the county.





Grain Bin Safety

Thursday, December 12th, ANR Educator Ariel Camm-Wilson and Extension Program Assistant Randall Drury teamed up with local Harrison County fire departments to put on a grain bin safety seminar. Ariel discussed corn statistics in Indiana and Harrison County, injuries involving confined spaces, and how to properly dress when entering a grain bin. Randall discussed grain bin explosions, and how to prevent them. Topics discussed were also lock out tag out, proper non-sparking tools to use, and harnessing equipment. Once the presentation portion was completed, the program was handed over to Ramsey, Palmyra, and New Middletown Fire Departments to present a demonstration with two different types of rescue tubes used for grain entrapments. One of the tubes was a metal tube while the other was a plastic tube. They discussed how these tubes get used as well as how to eliminate as much risk as possible while performing a rescue. The guests who attended had the opportunity to enjoy some chili and hotdogs while everyone was presenting, enriching their education experiences.



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Collaborations

Grow it, Cook it

On Thursday, October 17th, ANR Educator Ariel Camm-Wilson was joined by HHS/CD Educator Tara Beckman for a workshop centered on herbs. The herbs discussed included chives, parsley, thyme, and basil.

Ariel explained how to effectively grow and harvest these herbs, sharing fascinating facts during the "Grow It" segment of the presentation. She also handed out packets of herb seeds to inspire attendees to start their own herb gardens.

Tara delved into the flavor profiles, pairings, and common culinary uses of the herbs, while also highlighting their health benefits. She covered topics such as storage, preparation, and how to check for freshness, along with clarifying the difference between herbs and spices. Two recipes and a drink were prepared for attendees to taste, featuring the herbs in action. The recipes included:

- Broccoli & Chive Stuffed Peppers
- Spinach & Basil Pesto
- Thyme-Infused Lemonade

Fostering Wellness and Connection: Ongoing Partnership with Harrison County Public Library

HARRISON COUNTY

The ongoing partnership between Harrison County Purdue Extension and the Harrison County Public Library continues to thrive, with three engaging programs hosted this past quarter, totaling six sessions, and drawing 39 participants. "Fall Flavors: Seasonal Spices for Autumn Cuisine" taught

participants how to enjoy the rich flavors of fall without the stress of complicated cooking. Attendees discussed a variety of unexpected fall flavor pairings, included a hot spiced cider demonstration and sampling, and left with affordable, easy recipes to try at home. In "Holiday Stress: Mindfulness Tools for Well-Being," participants learned to identify common stressors and explored mindfulness techniques and self-care practices to reduce stress during the busy holiday season. The session emphasized the importance of gratitude, nurturing self-care, and connecting with others to strengthen community bonds and promote overall well-being. Finally, "Active Living in Winter" highlighted the importance of staying active during the colder months. Attendees discovered creative ways to enhance strength, balance, flexibility, and mental wellness through winter-friendly movement ideas. The session concluded with participants setting a SMART fitness goal to keep them motivated and moving through the winter, embracing the chill to stay active and joyful. These programs continue to provide valuable resources and foster a sense of community within Harrison County.

Festive Flavors: Eating the Rainbow with Seasonal Produce

On Tuesday, November 12th Harrison County Extension Homemakers gathered for their annual Holiday Workshop. During the day, Educator Tara Beckman and NEPA Cindy Finerfrock led a session titled "Festive Flavors: Eating the Rainbow with Seasonal Produce," where they shared practical tips for preparing budgetfriendly, in-season meals while maintaining food safety and nutrition during the holiday season. Emphasizing the importance of colorful, nutrient-rich foods, they demonstrated how a variety of foods can visually represent the

wide range of nutrients offered to guests. Participants had the opportunity to sample a delicious and nutritious Creamy Chicken Cranberry Roll-Up, which was demonstrated during the presentation, and then enjoyed during the group's pitch-in lunch. This session, attended by 53 adults and 5 youth, provided valuable insights for making healthy holiday meals festive and easy, with additional recipes available at eatgathergo.org.



Expanding Community Support through Ongoing Collaboration



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Building on the success of the initial partnership earlier this year, the collaboration between HHS/CD Educator Tara Beckman and Hickory Treatment Center in Corydon continues to grow, with additional sessions offered during the months of November and December. Hickory Treatment Center, known for its 28-day substance use disorders recovery program for men, has been an important partner for addressing substance use disorder in the community. These ongoing sessions continue to provide essential tools and support for individuals on their journey toward improved health and stability, with topics covering nutrition, financial education, employability skills, and the importance of sleep. Over the course of these months, 4 sessions were held, engaging a total of 78 participants across the series. This program remains a key component of the broader goal to foster a recovery-oriented system of care (ROSC) within the community, providing valuable resources to those seeking to overcome substance use challenges and build a healthier future.

Leadership Focused Trainings in Communities

In November, Tara joined colleagues in Knox County for their Community Leadership Program, where she co-led a team-building session with Mitch Wagoner, 4-H Youth Development Educator. The morning session focused on establishing trust, applying the Tuckman model of group development, and building confidence to enhance teamwork in community groups. In the afternoon, Tara led a session on Conflict Management, helping participants understand different conflict styles and develop strategies for managing conflict effectively. Through discussions, activities, and self-reflection, participants learned how to foster healthy conflict resolution and make progress within their teams, with the ultimate goal of improving their communities.

In December, Tara, led a session in Daviess County focused on the importance of interpersonal communication skills for community leadership. Participants explored how active listening, effective speaking, and giving and receiving feedback can enhance their leadership abilities. They discovered their communication strengths and areas for improvement, with the goal of increasing their effectiveness in both personal and professional interactions. The session emphasized the role of strong communication in building trust, fostering collaboration, and strengthening community ties.

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STEM at Saint Joe's: DNA Extraction!


