- **Practice Gratitude**: Taking a few minutes each day to reflect on the things you're grateful for can improve your mental health and help reduce stress during the hectic season.






Beginner's Guide to Grant Writing

Record-Breaking Year! - Cookie Walk, Saturday, November 29, 2025

The Harrison County Extension Homemakers marked the **20th Anniversary of the Cookie Walk** in Historic Downtown Corydon during this year's Light Up Corydon— and it turned out to be our **most successful Cookie Walk yet!**

Thanks to the wonderful support of our community, they sold **143.873 pounds of cookies** and raised **\$1,151**, setting a **new all-time record** for the event. This year, the addition of both **cash and card payment options** made purchasing easier and helped boost overall sales.

As always, the tables were filled with an impressive assortment of homemade cookies— ranging from beloved classics like Sugar Cookies and Chocolate Chip to crowd favorites such as Snickerdoodles, No Bakes, and many more.

Funds raised support the Homemakers' efforts to purchase books for the **First Books Program**, helping ensure that children across Harrison County have access to quality reading materials.

In addition to the Cookie Walk, the Harrison County Extension Homemakers continue to make a meaningful impact throughout the year by:

Scholarships

First Timers Award

Ten state winners are selected, one from each IEHA District. Only those who have never attended the entire conference will be considered. Applications are available at the Purdue Extension Office.

Completed applications MUST be returned to the Extension Office by February 15, 2026

RUTH B. SAYRE SCHOLARSHIP

A scholarship given by Country Women's Council, USA is for a resident of the US with financial need, who shows potential leadership and carries, or will carry, a minimum of nine credit hours. The Scholarship award of \$500 will be sent to the recipient's educational institution. Applications and more information are available in the Extension Office. Applicant must be an Indiana resident. HARRISON CO. EXTENSION HOMEMAKERS SCHOLARSHIPS

Pick-up an application at the Extension Office for the **Harrison County Homemakers Scholarship**. It is open to any Harrison County resident. This is a \$1000 scholarship paid to the recipient's educational institution. Recipient is responsible for giving the institution's address and correct department for payment to the Extension Homemakers.

Completed applications must be <u>received</u> at the Harrison County Extension Office <u>no later than March 1, 2026.</u> See application for mailing address.

Career Advancement Scholarship Form

Eight (8) \$500 Scholarships will be given. One (1) as the Eleanor Arnold Award to an IEHA member, one (1) as the Ann Hancock Award to a degree in the medical profession, and six (6) random scholarships.

Read and follow the instructions for completing the application. Applications that are incomplete or that have missing information will not be considered. Scholarships are usually granted for Undergraduate degrees rather than Masters degrees. Scholarships will be awarded with regard to financial need. Former winners may reapply.
