

Food Safety and Bird Flu

Published on December 31, 2024 I Center for Disease Control

AT A GLANCE

- Eating uncooked or undercooked poultry or beef or drinking unpasteurized (raw) milk can make you sick.
- Cooking poultry, eggs, and beef to the appropriate internal temperature kills bacteria and viruses, including avian influenza A viruses.
- Pasteurization kills bacteria and viruses, like avian influenza A viruses, in milk. Make the best decision for your health and the health of your family by always choosing pasteurized milk and products made with it.

Preparing Food

For poultry:

- Cooking poultry and eggs to an internal temperature of 165°F kills bacteria and viruses, including avian influenza A viruses. People should separate uncooked (raw) poultry from cooked foods and foods that won't be cooked. Cook all poultry and poultry products (including eggs) all the way before eating.
- While there is no evidence that anyone in the United States has gotten infected with avian influenza A viruses after eating properly handled and cooked poultry products, uncooked poultry, and other poultry products (like blood) could have been the source of a <u>small number</u> of avian influenza A virus infections in people in Southeast Asia.

For beef:

- Cooking beef to the appropriate internal temperature kills bacteria and viruses, including avian
 influenza A viruses. Cook all beef products thoroughly before eating. Ground beef should reach
 a safe internal temperature of 160°F and whole cuts of beef should reach 145°F then rest for 3
 minutes. Refer to <u>CDC's safer foods table</u> for a complete list of safe internal temperatures.
- Separate uncooked (raw) beef from cooked foods or foods that won't be cooked to prevent cross -contamination.

Unpasteurized (raw) milk safety

- Choosing pasteurized milk and products made with pasteurized milk is the best way to keep you and your family safe.
- Raw milk and products made from raw milk, including soft cheese, ice cream, and yogurt, can be contaminated with germs that can cause serious illness, hospitalization, or death.
- Pasteurization kills bacteria and viruses, like avian influenza A viruses, in milk.
- Make the best decision for your health and the health of your family by always choosing pasteurized milk and products made with it.
- Anyone, even healthy adults, can get sick from drinking raw milk.
- Based on the limited research and information available, we do not know at this time if avian influenza A viruses can be transmitted to people through consumption of raw milk and products (such as cheese) made from raw milk from infected cows.




166th Harrison County Agricultural Fair-June 22-28

Egg Substitutes When Baking

Published on February 10, 2023 / Center for Disease Control

Egg substitute for binding (helps hold the shape and stick together), such as in meatloaf:

- 1 Tablespoon flax or chia seed + 3 Tablespoons water (combine and let sit for 5 minutes)
- 1 package plain gelatin + 2 Tablespoons warm water (do not mix until ready to use)

Egg substitute for leavening (gives texture and a lift), such as in cookies:

- 1 Tablespoon flax or chia seed + 3 Tablespoons water + ¹/₂ teaspoon baking powder
- 1/2 teaspoon baking powder + 1 Tablespoon liquid (water) + 1 Tablespoon vinegar
- 1-1/2 Tablespoons water + 1 1/2 Tablespoons oil + 1 teaspoon baking powder

Egg substitute for moisture (by leaving out the egg altogether and simply adding more moisture), such as in pancakes, cupcakes, and quick breads:

- ¼ cup mashed banana, mashed avocado, applesauce, pumpkin puree, sweet potato, mashed beans, or silken tofu
- 2 Tablespoons mayonnaise

Other ways to replace eggs (Each replacement equals 1 whole egg):

- 2 egg whites
- ¹/₄ cup commercial egg substitute

Pro tips when using these alternatives:

- Ground flaxseeds + water Grind flaxseeds, mix with water, and let it rest until it becomes gelatinous.
- Mashed banana The banana you use should be ripe and easily mashed.
- Silken tofu Process tofu in a blender until smooth and creamy.



Tuscan Bean Soup

Healthy greens and beans add a flavorful punch to this easy soup recipe. Ingredients



- 1 tsp olive oil
- 1/2 small red onion (chopped)
- 1 medium celery (chopped)
- 1 medium garlic clove (minced)
- 2 cups fat-free, low-sodium chicken broth
- 15.5oz canned, no salt added Great Northern Beans (rinsed, drained)
- 14.5oz canned, no salt added, diced tomatoes (undrained)
- 1 tsp. dried oregano (crumbled)
- 1/2 tsp. dried thyme (crumbled)
- 1/4 tsp. crushed red pepper flakes
- 2 cups spinach
- 1/3 cup grated Parmesan cheese



In a large saucepan or Dutch oven, heat the oil over medium heat, swirling to coat the bottom. Cook the onion, celery, and garlic for 4 to 5 minutes, or until the onion and celery are soft.

Stir in the broth, beans, tomatoes with liquid, oregano, thyme, and red pepper flakes. Increase the heat to medium high and bring to a simmer, stirring occasionally. Reduce the heat and simmer, covered, for 20 minutes so the flavors blend.

Stir in spinach. Simmer, covered, for 2 to 3 minutes, or until the spinach is wilted.

Just before serving, sprinkle the soup with Parmesan.

Calories: 100 per serving, Protein: 7g per serving, Fiber: 4g per serving


