



Sew-In Day



As a Volunteer Community Service Project, we will sew cloth bags to be used by Safe Harbor Child Advocacy Center to provide children with a care bag to take with them to their next destination. They may be returning home but more than likely they may go to foster care or to live with other relatives. This bag offers them comfort, security and something that is their own. These bags are large enough to hold an 8 1/2 x 11 sheet of paper and are quite simple to make. We will also be constructing dresses, for Dress a Girl Around the World. These are kits that were found when cleaning out storage areas in the Extension Office. In this same storage area, we found several fabrics pieces which we will use to make the bags.

However, if they have fabric remaining from other projects you want to share, they need to be at least 13 inches wide and 23 inches long. Please bring your sewing machine if possible and any other tools you like to use when sewing. We could use a couple of cutting mats, rotary cutters and 1 or 2 ironing boards and irons.

If you do not sew you could assist in cutting fabrics for the bags, pressing, and assembling the bags.

Come and join the fun on February 20, 8:30am to 2:00pm at the Home and Family Arts Building at the Fairgrounds. Soup and crackers will be available for lunch and please feel free to bring a dish to share.

Looking Ahead to the 2025 Fair



Port-A-Pit Fundraiser






