Musings from Carol

Welcome to 2024 everyone. May this year be the year that the most you hope for is the least you receive. A new year can mean so many things to us. For me, this year, I am full of optimism for my personal growth and hope that as a group, we return to what we should be: community focused with a desire to improve life for others through gardening.

With interns joining us in January, we have an opportunity to welcome them with open arms and excitement to share what we know with each of them. It also gives us time to learn from them as well. We also have a responsibility to bring this group back to what it should be, not what it has become.

This past year the board has tried to reinvigorate general business meetings by having time at the end of the meetings for open discussion. We instituted a "What is it" part of the meetings. We had the grant recipients come in and report how the funds were used. This is something that should be done each year and was not always followed through. All these opportunities seemed to have been received well and generated some buzz. However, to have these continue, we need membership to step up and bring things to share. There may be new opportunities for 2024. Working with the Pax Center in La Porte at their two (2) community garden is one. They are looking for master gardeners to provide education and direction to novice gardeners. They have a children's garden where children are allowed to plant and watch their seedlings grow into food. It has been shown that kids who garden eat more vegetables than those who do not. How wonderful it is to work with children and encourage them to learn gardening. This is a fantastic opportunity for our La Porte County Master Gardener Association to give back to our community. We will have more about this opportunity at the January meeting.

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2024 PERENNIAL PLANT OF THE YEAR

Phlox paniculate 'Jeana'

The **Perennial Plant Association** (PPA) announced the 2024 Perennial Plant of the Year - *Phlox paniculate* 'Jeana', during its National Symposium this week in Niagara Falls, Ontario, Canada.

'Jeana' is an exceptional garden phlox renowned for its impressive flower show, tall sturdy habit, and pollinator-friendliness. Dense, domed trusses crown stiff stems from midsummer to early fall. Individually, the fragrant lavender-pink flowers are significantly smaller than typical garden phlox — only about half an inch wide — but the show at peak is eye-popping, nonetheless. This is a case where bigger is not better, from a pollinator's perspective anyhow. In trials at Mt. Cuba Center in Delaware, the nectar-rich flowers of 'Jeana' attracted more butterflies — Eastern Tiger Swallowtails were especially plentiful — than any other garden phlox in their study. Hummingbirds and other pollinators are fans too.

Topped with flowers, 'Jeana' can reach five feet tall and four feet wide, although size will vary geographically. Its bright green leaves are highly resistant to powdery mildew, so 'Jeana' has a striking summer look with

or without flowers. Jeana' performs best when regularly deadheaded as it promotes blooming. Deadheading also prevents self-seeding, avoiding inferior seedling production.

Tall garden phlox provide structure and color in summer gardens and are good bridging plants between early and later flowering perennials. 'Jeana' is at home in traditional borders and meadows and is a natural in pollinator gardens. Mix 'Jeana' with other tall perennials such as bluestars (*Amsonia*), Shasta daisies (*Leucanthemum* × *superbum*), and switch grasses (*Panicum virgatum*). Or let its handsome foliage be the backdrop for shorter companions such as coneflowers (*Echinacea*), alliums (*Allium*), and woodland sages (*Salvia nemorosa*).

PLANT DATA

Hardiness Light Size
USDA Zones 3 to 8 Full sun: afternoon shade in hot climates 36-60 inche

USDA Zones 3 to 8 Full sun; afternoon shade in hot climates 36-60 inches tall 36-48 inches wide

Soil

Moist, fertile, well-drained soils. Avoid dry conditions.

Maintenance

Divide clumps every 3-5 years in spring. Powdery mildew and spider mites may be foliar problems in hot or dry conditions. Thinning out stems to improve air circulation may guard against mildew. Deer and rabbits can be pests.

JANUARY GARDEN

HOME (Indoor plants and activities)

- Keep holiday poinsettias and other plants near a bright window. Water as top of soil becomes dry.
- Increase humidity around houseplants by grouping plants together, placing them on a pebble-water tray or running a humidifier.
- Check stored produce and tender flower bulbs and roots for rot, shriveling or excess moisture. Remove and discard damaged material.
- Repot houseplants as they outgrow current pots.

GARDEN (Flowers, vegetables, and small fruits)

- Send for seed catalogs for the garden.
- Sketch your garden plans on paper, including what to grow, spacing, arrangement and number of plants needed.
- Order seeds and plants as early as possible for best selection.
- Wood ashes from the fireplace can be spread in the garden, but don't overdo it. Wood ashes increase soil pH, and excess application can make some nutrients unavailable for plant uptake. Have soil tested to be certain of the pH before adding wood ash.

YARD (Lawns, woody ornamentals, and fruits)

- Check young trees for rodent injury on lower trunks. Prevent injury with hardware cloth or protective collars.
- Keep road and sidewalk salt away from plants. Construct a screen of burlap, if necessary, to keep salt spray off plants.
- "Leaf" through nursery catalogs or visit websites and make plans for landscape and home orchard additions.
 Order plants early for best selection.
- Early spring-flowering trees and shrubs such as forsythia, crabapple, flowering quince, and flowering dogwood can be forced for early indoor blooms by placing cut branches in water in a warm location.
