
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

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AGRICULTURE & NATURAL RESOURCES

VET 107

The Vet 101 series, started in 2017, in partnership with Spring Mill Veterinary Services-Dr. Jerry Rusch and Dr. Ellen Burcham includes hands-on demos utilizing live animals to teach skills/practices to producers they can perform on home farms. This year included new partners: Axiota and Elanco. Vet 107 was the seventh program offered in December 2023. Featured topics: rumen health, implants, ionophores, basic recordkeeping, and more.

Evaluation results: 100% reported that they found learning about rumen health and other program related topics was needed for their herds.



Passing It On: Farm Transition to the Next Generation

The average age of farmers continues to increase as does the need to transition farms from one generation to the next. Since 2016, succession planning topics have been offered for farm families in Lawrence County and across Area 2. In early December 2023, nearly 50 participants (several from Lawrence County) attended a full day workshop entitled "Passing It On: Farm Transition to the Next Generation" featuring industry leading speakers from out of state as well as some more locally. When given action steps on what they planned to do after the program, nearly 85% planned to work on farm plans related to transition. Participants expressed interest in more topic related programming continuing in 2024.

4-H YOUTH DEVELOPMENT

Smoothies, Hummus, Salsa, Art, OH MY!

Thanks to funding from Premier Companies through the Indiana 4-H Foundation, Lawrence County was able to purchase a Smoothie and Spin Art Bike to teach local youth about nutrition, mental health, and physical activity. Our Smoothie/Spin Art Bike has made appearances at many events in the summer and fall of 2023. It visited the Lawrence County 4-H Fair, Farmer's Market (twice), Bedford's Culture Crawl, and the Hoosier Uplands Back to School Bash.

Over 1,700 youth and adults have interacted with the bike at just five of the events we have used it. It is a great conversation starter to talk to people about healthy drink choices, the health benefits of art and exercise, and 4-H of today in general. People are constantly shocked at how good the smoothies are and that they can sneak spinach in and not even notice. At the Farmer's Market this fall, we used it to make pumpkin Hummus to incorporate more vegetables and protein into snacks. The most common response from many skeptical taste testers was, "Wow! That is way better than I expected." With the Spin Art attachment, youth in the Bedford Culture Crawl and the Farmer's Market made

artwork to take home and think about art in a whole new way. We look forward to the bike making many more appearances in 2024.








HEALTH & HUMAN SCIENCES

Captain Cash

With the increased costs of goods and services, it is crucial that individuals know how to manage their money to ensure lifetime financial wellness.

Learning how to spend, save, earn, and borrow money at a young age can help students be better prepared to make smart financial decisions as they enter adulthood. The Captain Cash program was developed to help third graders learn how money behaviors they learn now will affect them in the future. In four lessons, students learn about earning, saving, spending, and borrowing money through the use of interactive activities, stories, and group discussions.

Students from St. Vincent, Springville
Community Academy, and Needmore Elementary
participated in this program. One activity the
students completed, required them to think of an
item they wanted to start saving for and set a
savings goal for themselves. Items ranged from
video games and toys, to a house and a car.
Students found their items' costs and decided how
long it might take before they were able to afford
this item. This activity taught them the importance
of having a savings account they regularly



NUTRITION EDUCATION

CATCH

Visiting local schools and sharing CATCH (Coordinated Approach to Child Health) is fun, engaging, and allows for many hands-on

opportunities to learn about nutrition. During a sugary beverages lesson, students were able to read nutrition labels on various drinks and



calculate how much sugar each contained. This activity is eye-opening for students and adults.

While visiting 3rd graders in Mrs. Bellush's class, students not only learned about sugar content in drinks, but the importance of drinking water and others that provide some health benefits. A favorite recipe to sample during this lesson is a fruit smoothie. As part of the Nutrition Education Program(NEP), there is importance placed on what is attainable and doable for limited resource individuals. When attainable, it is most likely to be replicated. Making smoothies is a great way to show students how to add more fruit and dairy into their diet, but may not be attainable for families who do not own a blender or food processor. However, making a smoothie in a bag is something that is likely to be replicated at home. Each student had the opportunity to make "Smoothie in a Bag." This smoothie was a hit with her students! Because this recipe was such a hit, the NEPA plans to use it in several other classrooms this semester.

"JJ, and the Catch Program have been a wonderful addition to our classroom. This program introduces students to the benefits of clean, healthy eating. Many of my students would not have an opportunity to experience new foods that are beneficial to their health. JJ teaches students how they can prepare these healthy snacks at home with little ingredients and preparation. It is also an eye opener to the "slow" foods that might seem healthy. The students look forward to Miss JJ each week."
