Emphasis in the Junior Leader project is placed on training Junior Leaders to assist the local 4-H Leader in running the 4-H program at the local club level. The Junior Leader project is also designed to develop personal leadership skills by working with peers and other members of the community.

Note: In the event that a Jr. Leader member thinks he/she cannot complete the required hours in the Food Booth during the Fair, they must contact an advisor prior to fair to work with them on alternate ways to meet this requirement. Band Camp, Fair Queen Court, family vacation are examples.

- 1. If the member attends the Fair anytime during the event, they must work at least five hours in the Jr. Leader Booth.
- 2. If the member does not attend the fair at any time during the week, they can complete their hours either before or after the fair by helping with Jr. Leader maintenance, cleaning, etc.
- 3. In case number one, the Jr. Leader can complete the remaining hours either before or after the fair by helping with Jr. Leader maintenance, cleaning, etc.
- 4. To be considered for any of the above guidelines, member must have a legitimate reason as to why they cannot complete their hours during the fair. The advisory committee will determine the legitimacy of the member's case.
