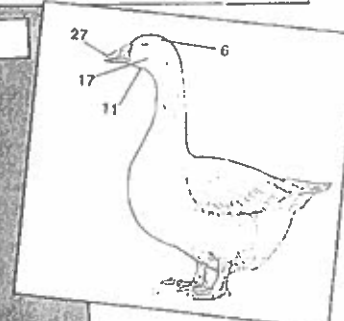
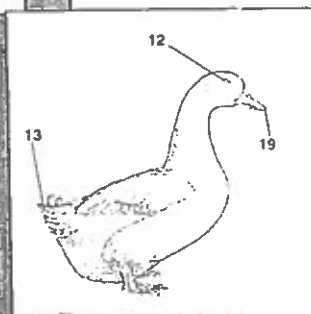
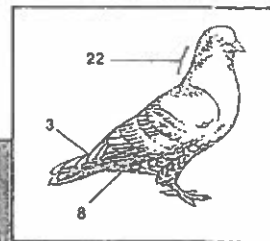
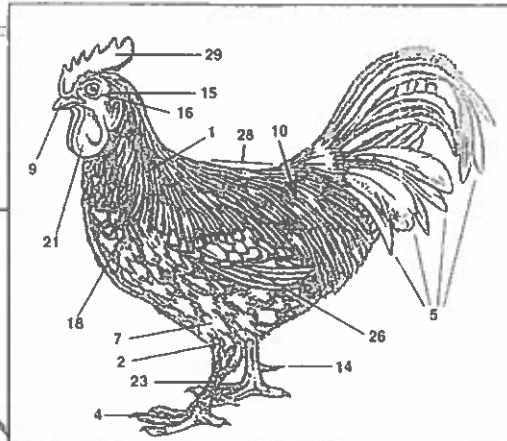
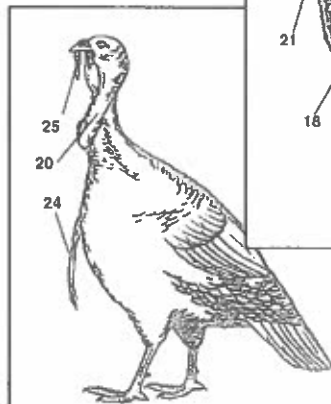
Completes the poultry parts crossword puzzle.

to the correct part when a judge asks you and understand what parts are being discussed. You'll also be able to answer the famous question, "Do chickens have lips?"

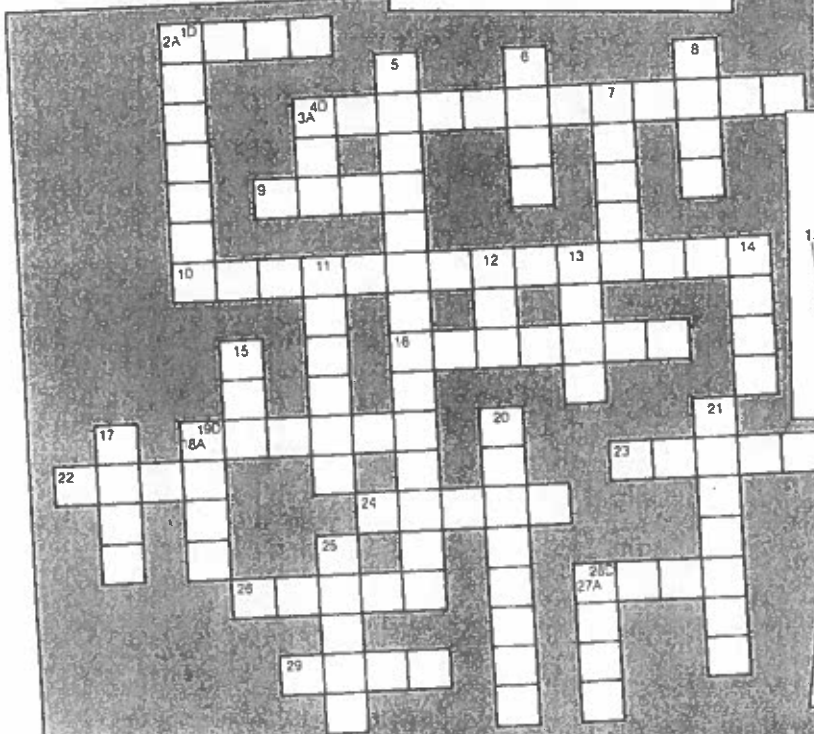
Crack the Case

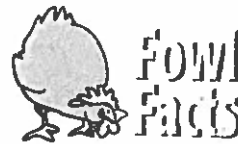

Parts of a Bird

When you are getting started with poultry one of the first things to learn is the parts of birds. This is an important foundation for the rest of your poultry-related learning. Also, knowing the parts of birds gives you a common language with others when they talk about birds. Knowing poultry parts and terms is especially important when you are reporting a problem to a veterinarian, talking with a poultry breeder or reading the *Poultry Standard of Perfection*. Also, showmanship judges will often ask you questions such as "Where is the vent?" "Where is the shank?" and "Does your bird have a caruncle?" You must know the names of parts to answer these questions and many others to excel at poultry showmanship.
