Registration fee of \$30 provides access to all five sessions.



#### **DNR Recommends Removal of Birdfeeders Statewide**

The Indiana Department of Natural Resources has received reports of sick and dying songbirds from 50 counties, including Brown County. As the investigation continues, the DNR recommends all Hoosiers remove their birdfeeders (including hummingbird feeders) statewide.

The DNR is working to determine the birds' cause of death. The affected songbirds showed neurological signs of illness as well as eye swelling and crusty discharge. All bird samples submitted have tested negative for avian influenza and West Nile virus. Final laboratory diagnostic results are pending.

The following steps are recommended statewide:

- Use the DNR sick/dead wildlife reporting tool at on.IN.gov/sickwildlife to alert DNR staff.
- Stop feeding birds until the mortality event has concluded.
- Clean feeders and baths with a 10 percent bleach solution.
- Avoid handling birds. If you need to handle birds, wear disposable gloves.
- When removing dead birds, wear disposable gloves and place birds and gloves in a sealable plastic bag to dispose with household trash.
- Keep pets away from sick or dead birds as a precaution.

#### Hobby Flock Owners Should Keep Their Poultry Safe from Unknown Bird Ailment

In light of recent reports of sick and dying songbirds throughout the state, veterinarians with the Indiana State Board of Animal Health (BOAH) are encouraging hobby flock owners to take steps to protect their poultry.

"Currently, we do not know what is causing songbirds to become ill or to die," said Bret D. Marsh, DVM, Indiana State Veterinarian. Without specific information on the cause, poultry owners are encouraged to take steps to protect their chickens, ducks, turkeys and other domestic species.

Good biosecurity practices mean keeping poultry safe from unseen pathogens that can be brought into the coop by other birds; other animals; or humans. Deter contact with wild birds by keeping poultry in a fenced space and contain them to the coop or barn at night. Do not feed chickens outdoors where wild birds may feed, too. Clean and sanitize feed pans and waterers.

#### **Signs of Tree Damage Caused by Cicadas**

Even though the time for the 17-year Brood X cicadas themselves is mostly done, you may be seeing other signs of them left behind - mainly in the form of damage to trees where they've laid their eggs.

Cicadas lay eggs by stabbing their ovipositor into tree bark. This can create scars in the bark. If enough cicadas lay eggs on a small branch, it can kill the twig. As a result, large trees sometimes have minor dieback at the ends of branches, but this will not harm the overall health of the tree. Small or young trees (3-4 years old) and shrubs, however, may be more seriously harmed.

If you find these dead twigs unsightly, you can either trim them off or hire an arborist to remove them.
