Mental Health First Aid

Be the Difference

Mental Health First Aid is an evidence-based course that teaches participants how to recognize when someone might be experiencing a mental health challenge and how to reach out to offer help and find other resources. By raising awareness and understanding of these disorders we can reduce the stigma often associated with seeking resources and care. The course is available in both virtual and inperson formats; however due to lack of demand for inperson classes, we will transition back to only virtual courses. Prepare Now For Potential 2022 Herbicide Shortages

There is some speculation that there will be a herbicide shortage in 2022. The two active ingredients that will likely be most impacted are glyphosate and glufosinate. Cost will also likely be increasing for these products.

What is causing this shortage? Well like many things there are a handful of factors contributing to this shortage. Some of these include a shortage of workers unloading ships at ports, lack of truck drivers transporting goods from ports to the plants, low supplies of some of the inert ingredients, shortage of materials to make containers/labels, and Hurricane Ida damaged a production plant in LA. Currently reports are saying glyphosate price will be over \$80/gallon.

Whether there is a shortage, a price increase, or both it will be important to reconsider your 2022 growing season weed management and make adjustments that will work best for your farm.

One simple way to do this is to use fall and or early spring tillage to manage the winter annual weeds that have emerged. This obviously will not work if you no-til or lack the equipment or labor. Second, regardless of your tillage practices you need to build a solid residual herbicide program that will be the backbone to your weed management program. Third, try to use "regular" rates of glyphosate to stretch your supply.

Other tips include to look for glyphosate or glufosinate premixes that may be in greater supply or lower relative costs then glyphosate alone, optimize your herbicide applications using best management practices (GPA, nozzles, speed, etc), use appropriate adjuvants, spray small weeds, substitute alternative corn post emergent herbicides that control broadleaf/grass weeds, hand weed escapes prior to seed set, and cultivate.

PURDUE EXTENSION MASTER GARDENER PROGRAM

Knox and Daviess Counties will be hosting the virtual Purdue Extension Master Gardener Basic Training that will meet Tuesdays from Feb. 1– May 3, 2022 from 6:30-8:30pm eastern. There will also be a weekly county connection hour. This course is great for those wanting to gain more knowledge in a variety of horticulture topics. Participants will then volunteer in their communities to share knowledge and service in educational gardening activities.

Invasive Spotted Lanternfly in Indiana, Now What?

In July of 2021, spotted lanternfly (SLF) was identified in Switzerland County, Indiana (SE side of the state). This pest is originally from Asia and is of concern due to the damage it causes to vineyards and orchards. It can feed on over 100 species of plants but their preferred host is the invasive tree of heaven.

Adult SLF has two sets of wings. The underwing is bright red and the outer wings have black spots. The immature state of SLF is bright red with black and white markings. The egg masses look like mud and can be spread by vehicles including recreation vehicles, truck transport, freight trains, nursery stock, outdoor furniture, lumber, etc.

What can be done now?

Remove the invasive tree of heaven from properties. Although this insect can feed on many plant hosts it prefers the tree of heaven so removing this may slow its spread down a bit.

Keep your eyes open for it. Smooth surfaces are preferred areas for egg laying. Nymphs(immature) and adults tend to cluster at the base of trees during the day and are more active around dusk. Honeydew and sooty mold will likely be present around heavily infested trees.
