- 1. Make project select on <u>4Honline</u> by May 15th deadline
- 2 If choosing to take livestock have animal Identification entered in <a href="#">4honline</a> by May 15th Deadline
- Make sure you attending club meetings—livestock exhibitors wishing to participate in the auction must attend a minimum 3 meeting.
- 4. Fair Entry Opens May 16th—This is where you will log into Fairentry.com and select your projects for the fair. If a project was not previously entered into 4honline it will not be able to be added at this point.

# **2023 Important 4-H Camp Updates and Changes**


### Camp Dates:

### **Purdue Yard & Garden Calendar: MAY**

#### **HOME** (Indoor plants and activities)

Many indoor plants can be moved to shady locations outdoors but only after danger of frost is past. Plants will dry out more often outdoors, so keep a close eye on soil moisture. Sinking the pots in soil will help slow down moisture loss.

Now is a good time to take cuttings of houseplants to increase a collection or share with friends. Root cuttings in media, such as vermiculite, perlite or potting soil. Roots grown in water tend to be weak from lack of oxygen and do not adjust well to planting in soil. Fertilize houseplants according to label directions. Foliage plants require relatively high nitrogen fertilizer; flowering houseplants respond best to fertilizer high in phosphorus.

#### YARD (Lawns, woody ornamentals and fruits)

Prune early spring-flowering trees and shrubs after flowers fade. Plant balled-and-burlapped or container nursery stock, and water thoroughly. Remove and destroy overwintering bagworms from landscape trees and shrubs.

Follow a spray schedule to keep home-orchard crops pest free. While trees are in bloom, use fungicide sprays without insecticide to avoid injury to bees. Follow label directions. Thin fruits of apple trees, if needed, about three weeks after petal fall. Apples should be about 8 inches apart. Apply fungicides to roses to control diseases such as black spot. Purdue turf experts recommend that if you are going to fertilize your lawn in May, apply three-fourths to 1 pound N/1000 square foot with a product that contains 50 percent or more slow-release fertilizer. Try to schedule the application prior to a rain or irrigate following application to move the fertilizers off the leaf blade.

#### **GARDEN** (Vegetables, small fruits and flowers)

Plant frost-tender plants after danger of frost is past for your area. This includes warm-season vegetables, such as tomatoes, peppers, eggplant and vine crops, as well as most annual flowers and tender perennials, such as cannas, gladiolus, dahlias, tuberous begonias and caladiums.

Pinch chrysanthemums and annual flower plants to keep them compact and well branched. Make successive plantings of beans and sweet corn to extend the season of harvest. Thin seedlings of early planted crops, such as carrots, lettuce, spinach and beets, to their proper spacing.

Harvest early plantings of radishes, spinach and lettuce. Harvest asparagus by cutting or snapping spears at or just below soil level. Harvest rhubarb by cutting, or grasp the stalk and pull it up and slightly to one side.

Control cucumber beetles, carriers of bacterial wilt, as soon as cucumber plants germinate or are transplanted to prevent disease. Remove blossoms from newly set strawberry plants to allow better runner formation. Remove unwanted sucker growth in raspberries when new shoots are about a foot tall.

### **Everyone's Favorite Time of Year-It's Allergy Season! May is National Asthma and Allergy Awareness Month!**

An allergy is when your immune system reacts to a foreign substance, called an allergen. Allergens can be anything eat, inhale, inject or touch and can cause various reactions ranging from coughing and sneezing to hives to rashes to low blood pressure and death if not treated quickly. Allergies are also one of the most common and overlooked diseases in the U.S but they can be managed with prevention and treatment.

In the U.S. more than 50 million people experience allergens of all types with allergies ranking 6th in causes for chronic illness. For children, allergens account for over 90,000 emergency room visits because of anaphylaxis which is a strong, severe allergic reaction most commonly triggered by food, medicines and insect stings.



Indoor and outdoor allergies are all around us and can lead to our sinuses being swollen or painful, our eyes to be itchy and watery, our chest to be congested and can either be seasonal or year round. Most people with allergies have more than 1 type of allergen that triggers them. Some of these allergens can be tree pollen, grass pollen, weed pollen, mold spores, dust mites, cockroaches and cat/dog dander. The most common type of seasonal allergy which effects nearly 24 million Americans is Rhinitis or more commonly known as hay fever. Severe allergic rhinitis is an allergic reaction to the pollen from trees, grass and weeds and occurs most commonly in the spring and fall when pollen is plentiful.

So how do we ease the symptoms of allergies? Our treatment is based on our overall health and what allergens trigger us based on going through an allergen test. Treatment may include avoiding the allergen, medicine or immunotherapy.

#### **Tomato Melt**

1/4 cup shredded cheese (try cheddar, mozzarella or a blended cheese)

- 1 Tablespoon low-fat mayonnaise
- 1/2 teaspoon prepared mustard
- 1 English muffins, halved or 2 bread slices (try whole wheat)
- 1 medium tomato, cut into 4 slices

Directions: Wash hands with warm water and soap for 20 seconds.

Using a small bowl, combine cheese, mayonnaise and mustard. Spread the cheese mixture evenly over the English muffin or bread slices. If using a toaster over, broil or toast until the cheese is melted or about 2-3 minutes. Place tomatoes on each sandwich. serve as is or broil tomatoes for 2-3 minutes. If using a skillet, add the sandwiches bread

side down, cover and heat until cheese melts or about 7-8 minutes and top with tomatoes before or after heating. Refrigerate leftovers within 2 hours.

### **May is Skin Cancer Awareness Month**

Follow these tips courtesy of the American Academy of Dermatology to help reduce your risk of skin cancer!

- 1. Seek shade when appropriate—the sun's rays are the strongest between 10am and 2pm. If your shadow is shorter than you, see shade.
- 2. Wear Sun protective clothing— wide brimmed hats, sunglasses with UV protection and light weight clothing with Ultraviolet Protection Factor (UPF) can help too!
- 3. Use a broad-spectrum, water-resistant sunscreen with an SPF of 30+ even on cloudy days. Most adults need about 1 ounce of sunscreen to cover their body. Sunscreen needs to be reapplied every two hours and all areas like ears, toes, etc. need to be covered.
- 4. Perform regular skin self-exams and make it a point to see a dermatologist on a regular basis. If you notice new or suspicious spots, a changing mole or a mole that itches and bleeds contact your doctor.
- 5. Summer isn't the only time for sunscreen! If you are going to be on the water, playing in the snow or sand , these surfaces can reflect damaging rays and increase your chance for a sunburn.

DYK.... A tan is a sign that your skin has been injured. The more you tan the more you speed up the aging of your skin and increase your risk for all types of skin cancer.
