#### 4-H Clubs/Meetings Weather Cancellation Policy

IT IS THE POLICY OF THE PURDUE EXTENSION WABASH COUNTY OFFICE THAT IF ANY SCHOOLS IN THE COUNTY ARE CLOSED AND/OR EVENING EVENTS ARE CANCELLED DUE TO WEATHER, EXTENSION AND 4-H MEETINGS SCHEDULED FOR THAT DAY/EVENING ARE CANCELLED AS WELL.

**Indiana 4-H Program: Statement of Policy:** The Indiana 4-H program serves the youth of Indiana by providing a strong educational youth development program. This program delivers educational experiences in a variety of settings. Caring, capable and contributing adults assist in the 4-H program as models for youth. The rich heritage of the 4-H Program is one to be valued and passed along to future generations. County 4-H policy is guided by the county 4-H policy making or governing board (i.e., 4-H Council) as provided by the County Extension Board. Legal authority for the 4-H Program rests with the Director of the Cooperative Extension Service at Purdue University. No county 4-H policy may conflict with state 4-H policy or with federal guidelines and requirements. It is the policy of 4-H to be an inclusive organization. No county policy or practice should be used to arbitrarily exclude youth from either membership or participation. Youth should participate in 4-H Youth Development opportunities at levels and times that best suit the youth's development and support family involvement.

**4-H Mission:** The Indiana 4-H Youth Development mission is to provide real-life educational opportunities that develop young people who positively impact their community and world.

#### 4-H Symbols:

**4-H Emblem:** A green four-leaf clover with a white "H" on each clover leaf. The four H's stand for Head, Heart, Hands, and Health.

**4-H Colors:** Green & white are the 4-H colors. Green in the 4-H clover represents life, springtime, and youth. White represents purity.

**4-H Slogan:** The slogan "Learn by Doing" is a constant incentive to motivate 4-H'ers to strive toward acquiring new skills and knowledge. The results can mean a very productive and interesting life.

**4-H Motto:** "To Make the Best Better" The motto gives motivation not to be content with the present but always strive to make things better.

**4-H Program Year:** The Indiana 4-H Youth Development program year is October 1 to September 30 annually attained by completing individual 4-H enrollment at [in.4honline.com](http://in.4honline.com) between October 1 and January 15.

## **GENERAL 4-H INFORMATION**

### **Membership**

Youth may become 4-H members when they enter the third grade and may continue their membership through the completion of grade 12. Each individual may continue membership for a maximum of ten (10) consecutive years. NOTE: 10 years of membership in the 4-H Youth Development is an opportunity; not an entitlement. Exceptions:

- (1) Youth who enroll in grade 3 and graduate early may continue for a total of 10 years ONLY if enrollment occurs in consecutive years.
- (2) Those youth who are academically advanced and “skip” 3<sup>rd</sup> grade, may begin the program as a 4<sup>th</sup> grader and may continue for a total of 10 years ONLY if the enrollment occurs in consecutive years.
- (3) Those youth who enroll in grade three and are retained a grade in public school may continue to progress through the 4-H Program by adding subsequent years of participation, but MAY NOT exceed 10 years of participation. For example, if a member is retained one year in public school, their final year of 4-H membership would conclude the summer following their junior year of high school.
- (4) Those youth who entered the program in 3<sup>rd</sup> grade and for one reason or another leave formal education prior to the completion of 12<sup>th</sup> grade may continue for a total of 10 years ONLY if the enrollment occurs in consecutive years.

Those youth who do not enroll as 3<sup>rd</sup> grade students or meet the exceptions above, conclude their involvement with the program during the summer immediately following the completion of their senior year in high school. An individual's 4-H grade is determined by the school grade in which he or she is classified regardless of the time of year he or she enrolls in 4-H. A member does not advance in 4-H grade until he or she enrolls in 4-H for the subsequent school year. Each member should enroll in the division of a project that would best suit his/her interest and potential for personal growth and would enhance their family involvement.

Opportunities in the 4-H program are available to all Indiana youth as defined regardless of race, religion, color, sex, national origin, marital status, parental status, sexual orientation or disability. Married young men and women of 4-H age may participate in any of the 4-H projects and activities. However, married persons must participate by the same terms and conditions and/or guidelines as unmarried participants. Membership in 4-H is gained by annually enrolling through a Purdue University Cooperative Extension Service Office located in each of Indiana's 92 counties.

### **Residence**

Indiana youth typically enroll in 4-H Youth Development programs in the county or state in which they reside. However, individuals living in one county **may** join 4-H in another county. There may be educational or social reasons for an individual joining 4-H in a different county than that of their primary residence. During a single calendar year, a 4-H member enrolled in a given project is expected to enroll & exhibit that project only in one county of enrollment. In the event that a project is not offered in the county of primary 4-H enrollment, a 4-H member may enroll in that specific project in a different county. Approval of this special exception rests with the 4-H Extension Educator. Participation in 4-H related activities/events (i.e., judging, share-the-fun, auction) must be in the county of primary 4-H enrollment. The above policy is not intended to provide an escape mechanism for 4-H members/families who are unwilling to follow the terms &/or conditions in their current county of 4-H membership. Decisions regarding 4-H membership in a non-resident county (a county you do not live in), rest with the 4-H Extension Educator in the receiving county.

### **Behavioral Criteria**

To 4-H members, volunteers, parents & the public: When attending, participating or acting on behalf of the 4-H program, all persons are expected to conduct themselves in accordance with accepted standards of social behavior, to respect rights of others, & to refrain from any conduct which may be injurious to the 4-H program. The following actions constitute misconduct for which persons may be subject to disciplinary penalties and/or dismissal from the program:

- (a) Dishonesty in connection with any 4-H activity by cheating or knowingly furnishing false information.
- (b) Alteration or unauthorized use of 4-H records.
- (c) Obstruction or disruption of any 4-H activity or aiding and encouraging other persons to engage in such conduct.
- (d) Failure to comply or aiding/encouraging other persons not to comply with specific terms and conditions of a given project, contest, or activity.
- (e) Failure to comply with directions of 4-H officials acting in the proper performance of their duties.
- (f) Inhumane treatment of 4-H animal projects.

### **Exhibition**

Exhibition of 4-H projects in local, county, or state exhibits/fairs is voluntary on the part of the exhibitor. The exhibition of 4-H projects provides 4-H members an opportunity to display their 4-H projects, enter into competition and participate in an educational/social environment with peers. With exhibition also comes the responsibility for abiding by all the terms and conditions pertaining to the respective 4-H project.

### **Completion**

The completion of a 4-H experience may include a variety of options & must not be misinterpreted solely as exhibition of a project at the county or state fair. There are a number of ways a young person may participate in the 4-H Youth Development Program in addition to 4-H clubs. Participating in these 4-H opportunities enable youth to build skills that will serve them well throughout their adult lives. Some of these options don't include preparation of a specific exhibit for display at fair. In some cases, the youths' actual participation may be the final product resulting in completion of a year of 4-H. Some examples of this participation include 4-H Robotics Club; Spark Clubs; State 4-H Band or Chorus; science training/experiment participation; afterschool 4-H experiences; etc. 4-H members are considered complete in their 4-H educational experience for the year when they have (1) completed the 4-H member enrollment process by January 15; and (2) had an officially recognized 4-H volunteer or Extension Educator verify the existence of the completed project/subject or the member's participation in a 4-H educational experience. Additionally, 4-H members who participate in a club or fair-based 4-H project/subject will submit a completed 4-H record sheet based on printed or web-based educational materials (used by Indiana 4-H Youth Development) prior to the established and published date. Though exhibiting in county and state fairs is not required for project completion, as it does not necessarily relate directly to content and skills learned in the development of the 4-H project, project exhibition is encouraged as a continuation of the educational experience. Extension employees/volunteers are obligated to eliminate (and should not create) any practices that limit, deprive, or tend to deprive any youth of opportunities for membership and/or participation in the Indiana 4-H program.

### **Project Record Sheets and Manuals**

Most projects have a record sheet which the 4-Her uses to record the project expenses, income, work completed and progress made in project development. Most record sheets are simple, while others require the help of parents or club leader. Project record sheets may be found in the project manual or on a separate piece of paperwork. Keeping up-to-date records is important to tell your project story. A 4-H project manual contains help, information, activities and directions needed to complete the project. Some projects have a manual for each division of the project. Others have one manual that the member uses through his/her 4-H career.



# **WABASH COUNTY 4-H PROGRAM RULES AND POLICIES**

## **General Wabash County 4-H Rules and Policies**

1. Wabash County 4-H Policy is determined by the Wabash County 4-H Council Inc.
2. Each 4-H member will pay a \$15 state program fee and a \$15 county program (maximum of \$90 per family) yearly at enrollment time.
3. All members are encouraged to attend 50% of the meetings for each club to which they belong.
4. 4-H members should give an educational demonstration yearly to display knowledge, practice communication skills, develop self-esteem, etc.
5. A 4-H member must do his or her own project with only teaching assistance from parents and/or others.
6. To exhibit a 4-H project, a 4-H member will:
  - (A) Complete official 4-H club member enrollment **at v2.4honline.com from October 1 - January 15.**
  - (B) ALL 4-H'ers showing/exhibiting at the Wabash 4-H Fair must register EACH project at wabashcounty.fairentry.com by **June 25.**
  - (C) NON-LIVESTOCK – Turn in a completed 4-H project record sheet/manual at project check-in at pre-fair judging on **Tuesday, July 13**  
If you fail to turn in a record sheet/manual at check-in, your project will NOT be judged.
  - (D) LIVESTOCK – May 15 Deadline: Submit Animal Location Forms for any livestock not housed at 4-H member's primary address.  
– **June 25 Deadline:** Submit 4-H livestock worksheet to the Extension Office.  
– **June 25 Deadline:** Complete YQCA (Youth for the Quality Care of Animals) Certification Program.
7. To complete but not compete in a given 4-H project – A 4-H member will do one of the following.
  - (A) 4-H members unable to complete, compete or exhibit his/her own project must log into in.4honline.com and drop the project by **May 15**
  - (B) 4-H members who did not drop a project by May 15 and do not intend to compete/exhibit at the fair may still complete by submitting necessary worksheets, record sheets, and/or project manuals by the specified date for that project.
  - (C) In an emergency (i.e. bodily injury, loss in the family) occurring after **May 15**, a 4-Her must submit a written request to the 4-H Educator if he/she is unable to be present at fair & would like another 4-Her to show his/her animal. The 4-H Council will vote on the request prior to the Wabash County 4-H Fair.
8. A 4-H member will receive one completion pin per year to be given on basis of years of 4-H work completed.

## **Wabash County 4-H Fair Rules**

1. The 4-H Council will use every precaution to prevent accident or loss of property but will not be otherwise held responsible.
2. The 4-H Council reserves the right to make further rules & regulations concerning display of exhibits on the fairgrounds should occasion occur.
3. While on the fairgrounds, the superintendent &/or committee members &/or 4-H Council, **&/or 4-H Extension Educator** reserve the right to interpret and enforce any rules violation and determine penalties for any rules infraction, in accordance with the Wabash County Rules and Policy Enforcement Section below.
4. No unauthorized person's will be allowed on the fairgrounds from 11:00pm - 5 am. Sheriff department will enforce!

## **Wabash County 4-H Rules and Policy Enforcement**

1. The Wabash County 4-H Handbook exists to create an informed, organized, and fair 4-H program in Wabash County. If, in the opinion of the Wabash County 4-H Council, evidence of alteration and/or excessive outside help and/or unethical preparation and/or misconduct is noted the following penalties may be invoked:
  - a. The exhibit and/or 4-H'er may be disqualified
  - b. All premiums and/or awards forfeited
  - c. The 4-H'er may be subject to up to a three year ban from participation in that project and/or other related 4-H projects, events, and/or activities
  - d. The person(s) involved are subject to removal from the grounds.
  - e. Enforcement of the above consequences does not waive the 4-H Council's right to enforce further consequences collectively at a future date.
2. When infractions in regulations and/or policies take place in animal projects, special penalties will be enacted. In addition to above stated penalties, animals unethically fitted or altered for entry, show, or sale at 4-H auctions are subject to the following penalties.
  - a. All premium money paid to the 4-Her, above market price for the animal, will be forfeited by the 4-Her and returned to the auction buyer of said animal.
  - b. The animal sale price provided the 4-H'er will be determined by the packer after notice of alterations are made known to the packer.
  - c. 4-Hers deemed in violation of rule regarding properly bedding animals or cleaning out stalls as determined by the Wabash County 4-H Council or Project Superintendent will be assessed a \$50 fee per pen. If fee is not paid in full to the Extension Office by August 1 of the current year, the fee will be \$100 per pen to be paid by September 1 of the current year. If the fee is not paid by September 1 of current year, then the 4-Her will not be allowed to exhibit any projects the following year. If the 4-Her has any item going through auction, the fee will be taken out of the auction check.
3. Any 4-H situation not covered by these policies shall be handled by the Wabash County 4-H Council as appropriate.
4. The penalized 4-H family who disagrees with penalties must file a grievance with grievance committee within 24 hours of said violation.

## **Grievance/Appeal Guidelines for County 4-H Program Issues: (Activities, Programs, and Projects)**

*The Extension Educator has the obligation to inform all parties of the grievance procedure if there are disagreements with policies.*

1. Disagreements concerning a specific project or policy should first be discussed with the superintendent/project leader. If the issue is unresolved, continue to the next step.
2. A \$100 grievance may be lodged with the president of the 4-H Council or the 4-H Extension Educator. The burden of proof shall reside with the party filing the grievance (Note: concerns regarding staff or volunteers are not issues for which a grievance may be filed. 4-H Volunteers are assigned by the 4-H Extension Educator. Concerns regarding volunteers or other individuals should be addressed directly with the 4-H Extension Educator.)
3. The person filing a grievance must complete the Grievance/Appeal Form.
4. A grievance shall be filed within 24 hours of the incident. The 24-hour guideline pertains to fair related issues where timing is an issue.  
In all other grievances. There will be a 14-day limit in which the grievance must be filed.
5. A grievance will be reviewed by the Policy and Procedure Committee, a committee of the Wabash County 4-H Council. The committee will review the grievance, conduct the initial investigation, and render a decision. The committee will be called together to act within 24 hours of a grievance pertaining to fair related issues or within a reasonable time frame for programmatic related grievances.
6. The person filing the grievance may appeal the decision to 4-H Council, which will review the facts in evidence and render a decision.
7. The person filing a grievance may appeal a decision to the County Extension Board. The Extension Board will review the facts in evidence and render a decision. This is the final level in the appeal process.

In the event that a ruling of the grievance committee finds a 4-H member in violation of Wabash County 4-H Policy, the Wabash County 4-H Council reserves the right to invoke penalties as outlined in the Wabash county 4-H Rules and Policy Enforcement section below.

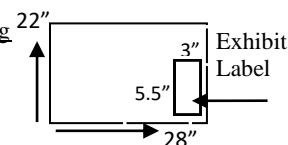
### General 4-H Rules for Non-livestock Projects

1. Turn in a completed 4-H project record sheet/manual at project check-in at pre-fair judging on **Tuesday, July 13, 2021**. If you fail to turn in a record sheet/manual at check-in, your project will NOT be judged.
2. Exhibits must comply with project requirements as listed in 4-H Record Manuals and/or this 4-H Handbook. Questions regarding projects should be directed to the project leader and/or Extension Office.
3. RIBBONS-Non-Livestock 4-H exhibits will be judged in blue, red or white ribbon groups.
4. Any 4-H member who exhibits the wrong exhibit, has a project exhibited incorrectly, or checks in late or at the wrong judging time will be docked one placing, ex: blue star to blue, blue to red, etc.
5. An article may be entered in only one project.
6. Any article that has been exhibited at a previous Wabash County Fair is ineligible to compete again, unless otherwise stated.
7. See the Judging Schedule on page 4 for specific judging times and places.
8. Exhibits in the 4-H Building/Bob Elrod Building will be released to 4-H members, parents, or 4-H Leader with prior permission. **The only release time will be Friday, July 23 from 5:00 p.m. –7:00 p.m.** Pick projects up in the building where they were displayed.
9. The Extension Office, 4-H Council, & Fair Board will NOT be responsible for articles or exhibits left at the 4-H Fair.
10. Exhibits with reference to alcohol, profanity, tobacco, drugs &/or nudity will not be displayed & are not eligible for state fair or county champion.

### Notebook/Poster/Educational Display Requirements

1. All posters must be made horizontal on 22" x 28" poster board &/or foam core board (Diagram). It may be of any color. (Drawing not to scale)
2. All posters must be stiff-backed. To make a poster stiff-backed, glue your poster board onto cardboard, lightweight wood or foam-core board. You may put your project directly onto the Foam-Core if you wish. Foam core board is available for purchase at the Extension Office.
3. All posters must be covered with clear plastic. Purchase plastic at department, hardware, or fabric/craft stores OR the Extension Office.
4. Posters must leave a space 3 inches wide and 5.5 inches tall for a project label in the lower right hand corner to be placed on top of plastic. Labels are furnished and will be distributed at judging.

All posters, notebooks, & display boards MUST include a reference list indicating where information was obtained, giving credit to the original author. This reference list should include web site links, people & professionals interviewed, books, magazines, etc. It is recommended that the reference list be attached to the back of a poster or display board, be the last page of a notebook, or be included as part of the display visible to the public. A judge is not to discredit an exhibit for the manner in which references are listed.

Each county would be permitted to send one rocket, **remote control aircraft, or drone** and one poster/display board in each level to the state fair. No "Ready to Fly" or E2X rockets are acceptable in the 4-H Aerospace project. Rockets may be exhibited with a base, but launch pads are not permitted. All rockets must weigh less than 3.3 pounds and considered an amateur rocket according to FAA regulations.

**Level 1:** Rocket of your choice, Estes Skills Level 1, 2, or comparable difficulty or a poster, display board on any topic in the manual (i.e., construct a paper airplane with a poster board explaining why you designed it the way you did). Cluster engine rockets and rockets that take an engine D or above are not permitted in this level. **Remote control aircraft or drones may be constructed from a kit or purchased ready-to-fly. Remote control aircraft or drone of your choice that is age/grade appropriate and compliant with FAA regulations, federal and state laws, and local ordinances. This exhibit choice is to include a notebook or poster including how the aircraft/drone was used and aerospace skills learned. Displaying the aircraft or drone is optional.**

**Level 2:** Rocket or other aerodynamic object of your choice. Estes skill level 2, 3, 4, or comparable difficulty rocket or poster, display board on any topic in the manual (i.e. glider plane (pg. 18) with poster explaining design) Cluster engine rockets and rockets that take an engine D or above are not permitted in this level. **Remote control aircraft or drones may be constructed from a kit or purchased ready-to-fly. Remote control aircraft or drone of your choice that is age/grade appropriate and compliant with FAA regulations, federal and state laws, and local ordinances. This exhibit choice is to include a notebook or poster including how the aircraft/drone was used and aerospace skills learned. Displaying the aircraft or drone is optional.**

**Level 3:** Rocket of choice, Estes Skills Level 3 or above, a box kit or other aerodynamic object of choice illustrating principles of flight or poster, display board on any topic in the manual (i.e. box kit (pg. 20) with poster explanation). Rockets that take an engine G or above are not permitted. **Remote control aircraft or drones may be constructed from a kit or purchased ready-to-fly. Remote control aircraft or drone of your choice that is age/grade appropriate and compliant with FAA regulations, federal and state laws, and local ordinances. This exhibit choice is to include a notebook or poster including how the aircraft/drone was used and aerospace skills learned. Displaying the aircraft or drone is optional.**

  - 2 types of metal screws
  - 2 types of wood screws
  - 4 types of bolts-carriage, machine, plow, stove
  - 4 types of nuts-square, hexagon, castle, wing
  - 4 types of washers-plain, spring lock, external tooth lock, internal tooth lock
  - 2 types of set screws-1 socket (hex) & 1 square head
- Educational poster based on a topic discussed in your manual.
- Action demonstration.

**BREEDING DIVISIONS GUIDELINES:** All fish exhibited in classes other than tank classes are to be displayed in a bowl with at least one flat side with no colored rock, marbles or plants. Extra objects distort the fish, making judging more difficult.

In the breeding classes, the 4-H member must check out their fish immediately after judging, or they will be required to stay the entire fair.

**DIVISION 1B** - Exhibit a specimen or pair of fish. If using livebearers, 3 fish (2 females & 1 male) are needed (all fish must be the same type and variety of fish which means that if one is a sunshine platy, then the other fish must also be sunshine platy).

**DIVISION 2B** - Exhibit a pair of fish which are not livebearers.

**DIVISION 3B** - Exhibit a pair of livebearers with at least two offspring. Breeding grass is permissible in order to protect offspring.

**DIVISION 4B** - Exhibit Salt water coral propagation – try to show before and after propagation by using a drawing or picture.

**TANK DIVISIONS GUIDELINES:** 4-Hers in tank divisions must leave their aquarium & fish for display the entire fair unless otherwise approved by project leader. All tank divisions will use a rectangle tank except Division 3 (odd tank setup). For each division, 4-Her will design the described tank.

**DIVISION 1: TANK BEAUTIFUL** – Beautiful by your own standards. Three-dimensional flat backgrounds accepted. Exhibit appropriate number of fish for tank size. Keep in mind the type of fish to be in the tank when creating the exhibit.

**DIVISION 2: THEME TANK** – Choose a theme of choice (i.e. songs, poems, stories, etc.) Consider the type of fish being used when creating the exhibit. Three-dimensional backgrounds accepted. Tank will be 5 gallons minimum and 10 gallons maximum. Exhibit appropriate number of fish for tank size.

**DIVISION 3: NOVELTY SET-UP TANK** – Design a tank that is not standard rectangle or drum tank shape. Backgrounds should be a light, plain color if used. 10-gallon tank maximum. Exhibit appropriate number of fish for tank size. Keep in mind the type of fish being used when creating the exhibit.

**DIVISION 4: NATURAL TANK** – Use all natural plants – artificial is not acceptable. If a background is used, it should be a light, plain color. Keep in mind the type of fish in relation to the plants in the tank. Exhibit the fish with the tank. Use a rectangle tank of 5-gallon minimum or 10gallon maximum.

**DIVISION 5: COMPATIBLE TANK** – Use fish & plants from the same geographical area (i.e. use South American plants with South American fish.) If a background is used, it should be a light, plain color. Exhibit the fish with the tank. Tank will be 5 gallons minimum and 10 gallons maximum.

**DIVISION 6: SALT WATER TANK** – Tank is a salt water habitat. Use only salt-water items and fish. Keep set up in mind. 12 gallon tank maximum

**DIVISION 7: EXPERIMENTS** – Select 1 of the examples of advanced programs on pages 3 & 4 of the Aquatic Science Manual or devise an experiment of your own. Set a definite goal & keep a step-by-step record (log) of how the results are achieved. Exhibit record (log) & fish. **DIVISION 8** - Same as Division 7 but conducted over approximately a one year time period. Exhibit the record (log) and fish.

\*\*\* Arts & Crafts projects are divided by grade level divisions for county judging purposes only. Upon judging completion, all Arts & Crafts judges will meet and decide State Fair Entries together based upon categories eligible for State Fair entries. **Number of State Fair entries per category will be reviewed and determined every three years based upon the average of entries in each category. Number of entries per category to the State Fair for 2020 – 2021 will be as follows:**

- Fine Arts – **Four** State Fair and Two State Fair Alternates
- Needlecraft – **One** State Fair and **One** State Fair Alternate
- General Crafts – **Four** State Fair and Two State Fair Alternates
- Models – **One** State Fair and **One** State Fair Alternate
- Other** – **Two** State Fair and **Two** Alternates to be selected from any Arts and Crafts Category or Creative and Expressive Arts Project that would fit into the general crafts category.

## ALL DIVISIONS:

- Exhibitor may enter up to 3 categories and must exhibit one craft from each category entered. Article must be completed for its intended use.
- If the article is to be hung, it must come prepared for hanging. Prepared for hanging is defined as wire or a single toothed hook on the back of the frame. Triangular shaped metal pieces on the back of purchased frames are not suitable for proper/safe artwork hanging. Projects without appropriate hardware for hanging will be docked one ribbon placing. The absence of a frame on fine arts does not mean a project should be entered in General Crafts. Canvas art on a wooden frame is considered prepared for hanging provided that frame has a hanger as described above.
- The medium (i.e. oils, charcoal, paints, etc.) used to construct the fine art determines the category of exhibition.
- If multiple pieces make up the exhibit, a photograph of the complete exhibit should be attached to the exhibit so the total exhibit can properly be displayed. For safety purposes any craft exhibit that resembles a sword, knife, or look-a-like weapon will be judged but will not be displayed.

**FINE ARTS** - Original art work using oil, charcoal, pastels, pencil, ink, acrylic, or watercolor on canvas, canvas board or paper. Art work drawing with markers and paint by number are considered general crafts. All pictures must be framed and prepared for hanging. (See definition above.)

**NEEDLECRAFT** - (Hand Work) Knitting, embroidery, crocheting, needlepoint, crewel, hand quilting, tatting, huck weaving, hem-stitching, pulled, drawn and counted thread work, punch needle work, candle wicking and chicken scratching. Does not include latch hook, plastic canvas machine knitting, machine quilting, or arm knitting/crocheting. If the article is to be hung, it must come prepared for hanging

**GENERAL CRAFT** - Includes art drawn with marker and any craft not included in other A&C categories. See Creative & Expressive Arts for Lego.

**MODELS** - Exhibits must be a small scale replica and meet the following criteria:

- Wood, paper, clay, die-cast, or snap together models aren't permitted
- Must be of injected styrene plastics
- Pre-painted or pre-decaled factory models are not permitted
- For State Fair, if the model is being built from a kit, include a copy of the instructions with the craft information card.
- Legos are not considered models and are to be exhibited as Creative & Expressive Arts: Lego Type Models
- At least 25% of the exhibit must be painted
- Screws are not permitted

## CAKE DECORATING

The cake decorating subject provides skills-based educational experiences that provide an opportunity for mastery before building on that experience to develop more advanced skills. This subject area is divided into three levels: Beginner (Grades 3-5), Intermediate (Grades 6-8), and Advanced (Grades 9-12). While the defined grades are intended to be a guide, older youth enrolled in this subject for the first time may start in a lower grade skill level with permission by the county extension educator, followed by an appropriate level the following year.

Skills and techniques demonstrated should be age/grade appropriate. While it is not to say a beginner level member cannot master an advanced level skill, it would be rare and unique. **Therefore, exhibited cakes must demonstrate the minimum five techniques from their given level outlined in Indiana 4-H Cake Decorating Skills and Techniques, 4-H 710A, but may also include higher/lower level techniques that have been mastered. Any higher/lower level techniques will not be counted as part of the minimum five, but nevertheless will be evaluated for quality.** All exhibited cakes must be created using a Styrofoam, foam, or other solid dummy. Unless otherwise stated, cakes are to be iced using royal icing or buttercream. Buttercream icing will not withstand environmental conditions and may become soft, melt, not withhold its shape, and colors may bleed when being displayed an extended period of time. When displaying a cut-up cake or tiered cake, the exhibitor must include a diagram and description indicating how the cake was assembled. This diagram and description can be attached to or written on the skills sheet. All exhibits must include a completed Cake Decorating Skills Sheet (4-H 710) and must accompany the cake for the judge's reference during judging.

**BEGINNERS:** Cakes must be on a cake board approximately 3/8" thick and 3" larger than the cake. For example, if the cake is 8" round, then the cake board must be 11" round. The cake board must be neatly covered and well taped or otherwise attached underneath. Cakes exhibited in the beginner level are to be a single **tier/layer, no more than 5" tall**, and may be round, square, or rectangular and the cake board is to be no more than 12"x12". Tips and skills demonstrated are limited to those explained in The Wilton Method of Cake Decorating Student Guide 1. A minimum of five skills are to be demonstrated. NOTE – While nail flower creation is explained in student guide 1, the difficulty level may be too high and not educational for some beginner level youth.

**INTERMEDIATES:** Cakes must be on a cake board approximately 3/8" thick and 3" larger than the cake. For example, if the cake is 9"x13" rectangular, then the cake board must be 12"x16" rectangular. The cake board must be neatly covered and well taped or otherwise attached underneath. Cakes exhibited in the intermediate level are to be a single or double **tier/layer, no more than 12" tall**, and may be any shape. Youth may choose to decorate an inverted (upside down) character pan, create a 3-dimensional cake. It is also permissible to cut-up pieces of Styrofoam, foam, or other solid material to create a new shape, like a butterfly or castle for example. The cake board is to be no more than 24"x24". Tips and skills demonstrated are limited to those explained in The Wilton Method of Cake Decorating Student Guide 1 and 2. A minimum of five skills from student guide 2 are to be demonstrated. NOTE – While applique creation is explained in student guide 2, the difficulty level may be too high and not educational for some intermediate level youth.

**ADVANCED:** Cakes must be on a cake a cake board approximately 1/2" thick and 4" larger than the base cake. For example, if the cake is 26" round, then the cake board must be 30" round. The cake board must be neatly covered and well taped or otherwise attached underneath. Cakes exhibited in the advanced level may be multiple layer and/or tiered and may include multiple cakes, like a wedding cake. Youth may choose to create a character or 3-dimensional cake by cutting-up pieces of Styrofoam, foam, or other solid material to create a new shape. Dowel rods, plates, etc. should be used to support multiple layers and tiers. Fondant icing and gum paste is permissible. Cakes may be any shape, **no more than 36" tall** and the cake board is to be no more than 36"x36". Tips and skills demonstrated are limited to those explained in The Wilton Method of Cake Decorating Student Guide 1, 2 and 3. A minimum of five skills from student guide 3 are to be demonstrated.

### ALL DIVISIONS:

- Exhibit project on a solid base (i.e. cardboard or wood) that is approximately 3/8" thick and is no more than 3 inches larger than cupcake display. Boards should be covered.
- Cupcakes must be attached to the exhibit as to not allow them to be picked up.
- Icing must be used in your project. Cupcakes will not be judged on taste.
- All cupcakes exhibited must meet the specific level requirements (no more, no less) or they will be scored down a ribbon.
- Styrofoam dummy cupcakes are an option if an exhibitor does not want to use real cake.

**BEGINNERS:** Display 6 individually decorated cupcakes, all decorated alike, in uniform appearance.

- All items used for decorating must be edible. Added sprinkles, candies or cookies may be used.
- Cupcakes must be displayed in a single layer on a solid surface, not to exceed 16 x 16 inches in exhibit size.

**INTERMEDIATES:** Display 6-16 cupcakes decorated in a theme.

- Cupcakes may be decorated individually or as a group as long as the theme is carried out in your display.
- Cupcake display area must not exceed 18 x 18 x 24 inches in exhibit size. Cupcakes must be presented on a solid base in a single layer.
- All decorations must be edible. Top may be smooth or decorated with added edible sprinkles, candies, cookies, etc., that incorporate with your theme. NO artificial items may be used.

**ADVANCED:** Display 12-24 cupcakes or more cupcakes decorated in a theme.

- Cupcakes may be decorated individually, or as a group as long as the theme is carried out in your display.
- Cupcake display area must not exceed 24 x 24 x 18 inches in size. No matter display, your cupcakes must be presented on a solid base.
- Artificial items may be used in this division only.

2. Display a binder notebook that includes the information from one of the activities you completed this year.

3. Create a display 36 x 36 x 36 inches maximum using an activity completed in the manual or one promoting physical, emotional or cognitive skills.

4. Action Demonstration -- You may present an action demonstration for your project completion requirement.

Level D: 4-H members should complete at least three activities each year, each from a different chapter. Within the 3 year period for each level, they should have completed at least 9 activities, & at least 1 activity from each of the 5 chapters. Choose one of the following to exhibit:

Notebook: (required for all levels) Each collection needs to be accompanied by a notebook containing the following information: Inventory Sheet, Story Sheet, at least one photo of your complete collection as it is displayed in your home. If you are exhibiting a collection for more than one year then you will need to have all previous year material included in your notebook. Your notebook can be a binder, scrapbook and or report cover. Inventory sheets & story sheets can be hand written or typed. Please find electronic copies of these forms at: [www.ag.purdue.edu/counties/wabash](http://www.ag.purdue.edu/counties/wabash).

### **Fair Displaying Options:**

- The following items cannot be left at the fairgrounds for display: Collections of weapons or items that could be considered dangerous, knives, coins, stamps, pieces of guns. Please choose a notebook exhibit for these items.
- You may not exhibit items that are used in conjunction with drugs or alcohol.
- Items in your display must be numbered to correspond with the number on the inventory list. It is recommended that valuable objects be protected in a display case, fastened to a display board or taken home after judging. Your project should be covered with glass, Plexiglas or plastic.
- If the collection is too large or valuable to leave for the exhibit at the Fair, your notebook can be exhibited with, or in place of, your collection. If you are displaying a notebook you still need to bring a minimum of seven items to judging. Your items may be taken home after judging. If you choose this option, your items do not have to be in a display case. A parent or guardian of each exhibitor will sign a form releasing the Fair Association, 4-H Council, and Purdue Extension from loss or damage if THEY CHOOSE to leave an exhibit that the Extension Educator has requested to be taken home due to concern of loss or damage. You may also be asked to narrow down your exhibit for space issues.

Level 1 - Exhibit a portion or example of the collection, minimum of 7 items. Use an attractive display not to exceed 2'x3'x3'. Completed story and inventory lists must also accompany exhibit.

Level 2 - Exhibit a new collection or a continuation of the Beginner Collection, minimum of 7 items, with a completed story and inventory lists. Exhibit not to exceed 2'x3'x3'.

Level 3 - Exhibit a continuation of previous division or a new collection, minimum of 7 items, with a completed story and inventory lists. Exhibit not exceed 3'x3'x4'. When repeating this division with a collection from the previous year, the member must add to the previous year's collection.

Youth enrolled in the computer project will select one of the below subject categories to study, regardless of grade. Youth may choose to create an exhibit demonstrating skills learned during the year. Check with your county Purdue Extension Office to determine if a computer will be available during judging and if there will be an opportunity to explain your exhibit to the judge. Exhibits qualifying for state fair are to be submitted on a thumb drive securely attached to a notebook/portfolio describing accomplishments, skills learned, design ideas, budget, a summary of what was done, screenshots showing the development and final project, etc. as the exhibitor will not be able to discuss their work with a judge. **Poster exhibits are not acceptable** 22" x 28" or freestanding 3-dimensional display boards no larger than 36" x 36" may be submitted. Youth may continue in the same subject category in subsequent years expanding on the previous year's topic, or choose a new topic. Subject categories are:

- Hardware and Networking Design/Installation/Repair
- Software or Smartphone App Programming and Development
- Website Development
- Computer Forensics (identity theft, online bullying, ethical use of technology, responsible social media use, etc.)
- Independent Study - A topic of your choice that does not fit in any other category
- Graphic Design and Computer Art
- GPS or Software Utilization
- Computer Entrepreneurship

Software submitted to be reviewed by a judge must be compatible on both PC and Mac. If additional software other than Microsoft Office Suite is required to view the member's work, software must be provided by the member & comply with all manufacturer copyright laws. Apps can be Android or IOS compatible.

2. Include actual receipts, or copy of original receipts, with the purchased item(s) specified.
3. 4-H'er must participate in Fashion Revue to be eligible for State Fair or Alternate State Fair entry. (Exceptions in cases of extreme emergency.)
4. ALL consumer clothing exhibits will remain after judging, **Tuesday, July 13**, in order to be displayed at the fairgrounds.
5. Each piece of clothing and notebook must be tagged with exhibitor's name before leaving the Honeywell Center.

Level 1: Purchase an item of clothing you'll wear with other clothes in your wardrobe (i.e. slacks, blouse, jeans, shirt, sweater, or sweatshirt). Choose an accessory to go with your purchase (i.e. shoes, sweatband, belt, jewelry, or socks). Model your purchases. Tell the judge about them, what you learned, & about activities you completed. Plan to discuss with the judge about them, what you have learned, & about the activities you completed.

Level 2: Purchase & accessorize a casual or school outfit. You may purchase accessories or select from items you already own. Model your outfit. Plan to discuss with the judge about your purchases, what you learned, & about activities you completed.

Level 3: Choose an outfit & accessorize it. You may purchase or select from items you already own. Model your outfit before a group. Plan to discuss with the judge about your activities in this year's project & how you plan to use this year's purchases in your future wardrobe. If a member has completed all activities in the manual in prior years, the member is to consult with the extension educator, leader, or mentor to create an activity. When assembling the exhibit notebook, be sure to include a note to the judge explaining how the activity was determined and the intended objectives.

In the Consumer Meats project, you will learn the cuts of meat and how to prepare the meat cuts for a meal.

1. Sign up 1 or more of the meat categories (beef, lamb, pork & poultry) each year. Exhibit 1 serving of the recipe for each category enrolled.
2. Bring recipes to the fair in an index or recipe card box. The size of the card is of your choosing. Judging will be on neatness of the collection.

### EXHIBIT REQUIREMENTS:

Division 1: *Grade 3* - Steer/Lamb/Hog - Poster with standing picture or sketch identifying major cuts. Poultry Poster with sketch or pictures of all kinds of poultry (duck/turkey/chicken) identifying major cuts.

Division 2: *Grade 4* - Burger for each category enrolled. Include bun & condiment items for the burger. Place these items on the side of the plate.  
*Grade 5* - Beef – steak; Pork/Lamb – chop; Poultry – recipe with eggs as the main ingredient.

Division 3: *Grade 6* - Beef/Pork/Lamb – ribs; Poultry - chicken breast with bone.

*Grade 7* - Beef/Pork/Lamb – roast; Poultry - Cornish hen.

*Grade 8* - Beef – brisket; Pork – ham; Lamb – a serving of leg of lamb; Poultry – duck recipe using any cut of meat

1. Only one entry or exhibit is required for exhibit in the Creative Writing project. However, 4-H'ers may choose to have an entry in each of the following 3 project categories.
  - Prose – Exhibit a story (fiction or nonfiction), autobiography, biography, essay, journal or entry or any other prose piece.
  - Poetry – Exhibit a poem of any length or style.
  - Children's Story – Exhibit a story written specifically for young children including illustrations. (Must include illustrations.)
- Beginner:** Exhibit a poem of any length or style – OR – a story, autobiography, children's story or other prose piece consisting of 50-300 words.
- Intermediate:** Exhibit a poem of any length or style – OR – a story, autobiography, children's story or other prose piece consisting of 300-700 words.
- Advanced:** Exhibit a poem of any length or style – OR – a story, autobiography, children's story or other prose piece consisting of 500-1200 words.
2. Entries are to be typed and double-spaced.
3. Submit 2 copies for judging, so that the judge may mark on one copy, while the other is "clean" for display at the fair.
4. All entries must have been written since the previous year's county fair. Work that has been judged in any other writing contest is ineligible for 4-H completion. All entries must be the exclusive work of the 4-H member. No group projects or collaborations should be submitted for judging.
5. Each entry is to have a title page with the following information: Title, Author, Date, Project Category, Grade in School, and 4-H Club. See sample title page in Section IX of the manual.
6. Each entry is to be bound to keep it neat and clean during judging and display at the fair. Use any type of three-pronged folder or school report cover, or use a report binder with a plastic front so your title page shows through.
7. Be sure your project is clean, neat, & organized. The creative way you express yourself & proper grammatical use of words is important.
8. Double-check the order of the paper in your binder.
  - a. Title Page (See section IX in your Creative Writing manual.)
  - b. Your writing project
  - c. Bibliography (give credit to any sources used in research)
  - d. Author's page (See Section X in your Creative Writing Manual)

The 4-H'er will create a realistic setting around manufactured or custom-built farm or construction toys. Modeling is very personal and involves much imagination; members are encouraged to display their many artistic abilities in this project.

### **GENERAL EXHIBIT GUIDELINES:**

1. Exhibits will be judged on the following criteria: artistic arrangement of exhibit; detail of exhibit; and realistic setting around toys.
2. Farm & Construction Toy Scenes will be judged in two separate classes. 4-H'ers may exhibit in both the Farm & Construction Toy Scene classes.
3. Farm and Construction Toy displays can be modeled in 1/64, or 1/16, or any other scale desired.
4. Farm or Construction Toys can be obtained at farm equipment dealers, department stores, farm stores, and farm toy shows.
5. Landscape supplies can be obtained at hobby shops, craft supply stores, and items can be found in your back yard.
6. While every effort is made to keep projects secure, Wabash County 4-H Council is not responsible for lost or damaged items.
7. Members must display a new exhibit each year. You are not allowed to bring a previous exhibit.
8. Points will be deducted for each item included in the exhibit that is not listed as items acceptable for the 4-H member's division as outlined below.



9. Whether exhibiting in the Farm or Construction Toy Scene category, projects display must be constructed as follows:

- Your project may be covered for transportation purposes. The cover must be off during judging. The cover may be put on after judging is complete and may remain on for the duration of the fair.
- Displays for all divisions must be built on rigid wood (plywood)
- Displays must be **no larger than** the following: Beginner Display 20" x 20", Intermediate Display 24" x 36", Advanced Display 36" x 36".

**Beg. Farm Toy Scene:** This division is limited to field tilling/planting equipment (toy plows, disc/tiller, planter, tractor, and cultivator). Scenery items may be chosen from the following list: roads, lanes, trees, light poles with wires, fencerows, & a backdrop may be used to set off field(s).

**Beg. Construction Toy Scene:** This division is limited to site preparation equipment (bulldozer, road grader, excavator, industrial tractor & disc, & back hoe). Roads, lanes, trees, people, light poles with wires, fencerows, & a backdrop may be used. In the display at least portion of the scene will be under site preparation (the whole site does not need to be prepared), including moving and piling dirt in preparation for construction.

**Int. Farm Toy Scene:** This division is limited to any type of fieldwork (tilling, planting or crop harvesting). Equipment may include: disc/tiller, plow (any type), planter, tractor, cultivator, combine, sprayers, grain wagon/cart, truck, hay baling equipment, hay wagon. Scenery items may be chosen from the following list: roads, lanes, trees, fields, fencerows, light poles, backdrop, signs & animals may be used.

**Int. Construction Toy Scene:** This division is limited to work done after site preparation & before building construction. **No Buildings** will be exhibited. Display examples may include road building (streets, cul-de-sacs), beginning landscaping, pond building, erosion control procedures (terracing, sodding, stone waterways), park building, tiling, culverts, & utilities (water, gas, electric, sewer). Equipment may include: bulldozer, road grader, excavator, industrial tractor & disc, back hoe, skid loader, wheel loader, pan scraper, log skidder, dump trucks, pick-up trucks, equipment haulers, semis appropriate to construction sites, cement mixer, & trailers. Roads, lanes, trees, people, light poles, fencerows, a backdrop, signs, & gas tanks.

**Adv. Farm Toy Scene:** This division is open to create any type of farm. Example: Farmstead (buildings, grain-handling equipment, field work, harvesting) or Farm Equipment Stores.

**Adv. Construction Toy Scene:** This division is open to create any type of construction scene. Examples include buildings (at least part of which are under construction), dealerships, construction site offices and buildings or equipment naturally found at a construction site, housing development, demolition sites, or construction equipment stores.

5. Information must be attached to the package as to the occasion, age, and sex of recipient.

6. Fabric may not be used as the main covering for a package prior to Division C.

7. One County Champion and one Reserve County Champion will be selected in each division.

**Division A:** Wrap 3 packages, not including exhibit package, throughout the year. Exhibit a square or rectangle package, 8" square minimum. May use any kind of paper; must include self-made bow.

**Division B:** Wrap 4 packages, not including your exhibit, throughout the year. Exhibit: square or rectangle package; create own paper & accessories.

**Division C:** Wrap 6 packages, not including your exhibit, throughout the year. Exhibit: cylindrical package; may use purchased materials.

**Division D:** Wrap 8 packages, not including your exhibit, throughout the year. Exhibit a square or rectangle package wrapping the top & bottom separately. Commercial paper may be used; create own accessories. Your package must have a removable lid for judging.

**Division E:** Wrap 10 packages, not including your exhibit, throughout the year. Exhibit a creative package consisting of 1, or not more than 3 containers of any shape. Containers must be covered; create your own accessories.

- Final Exhibit design **CANNOT** be a purchased kit. They should be of your own design.

1. There is to be no gluing of pieces and/or painting and/or adding decals (decaled blocks may be used if the decal is associated with a kit, or factory imprinted). Adhere projects to the display board using Velcro, sticky-tack, or similar adhesive.

2. All exhibits must be an "original design" not from a purchased kit or design.

3. You may use parts of kits, but no design manuals may be used to create your exhibit.

4. You may use any brand of plastic linking blocks/pieces to complete the project. The word "Lego" is used only as a guide for the project.

5. The project must be on a hard board no larger than 20"x20" & can be no taller than 20" off the board. A general rule of thumb is that the board surrounding the project should measure 3 inches out from the edge of the Lego-Type model.

**Level A:** Build a fictional character or creature. **Motorized units that are battery or solar operated may be exhibited in this category. Robotics are not permitted in Level A.** Examples: Animal, Person, Mythical Creature, Insect...

**Level B:** Build a structure or vehicle. Motorized units that are battery or solar operated may be exhibited in this category. Robotics are not permitted in level B. Examples: Sky Scraper, House, Barn, Car, Truck, Boat, Airplane...

**Level C:** Build 2 related objects (Objects must be of a "new design" and not previously exhibited). **(Motorized/Robotics Allowed).** Examples: Barn & Animal, Car & Garage, Truck & Camper Trailer...

**Level D:** Build three related objects (Motorized/Robotics Allowed) Examples: Barn and two different Animals, Garage with Car and Truck...

### Group Acts (Five or More Performers)

- Performance time limit: 5 - 8 minutes

- Types of acts: skits or sketches, choral number, dance routines, lip sync

### Curtain Acts: Non-Musical (One to Four Performers)

- Performance time limit: 3 - 5 minutes

- Types of Acts: skits/sketches, magic, clowning, rhythmic gymnastics, reading, 4-H cheerleading routines, choral speaking, dance (ballet, tap, modern, etc.) lip sync, juggling, acrobatic feats, ballads, puppetry.

### Curtain Act: Musical (One to Four Performers)

- Performance time limit: 3 - 5 minutes

- Types of Acts: instrumental (piano, guitar, flute, drums, etc.) vocal, bands (rock, country, jazz).

**County Contest is April 18 at 2:00p.m. at Wabash Middle School Auditorium.** All entertainers must be 4-H members. Narrators are considered part of the act and must be a 4-H member. Please note: A person whose only contribution to the act is that of being piano or other accompanist is not considered part of the act and does not have to be a 4-H member. This is because this provides music in a similar capacity as a tape provides music.

**Beginning in 2019, Acts will be divided into Jr. & Sr. Divisions. Grades 3-7 will compete in the Jr. Division with Grades 8-12 competing in the Sr. Division. The division an act is placed into is determined by the oldest 4-H member in the act. For example, if a 6<sup>th</sup> grader and an 8<sup>th</sup> grade perform a duet together, the act will compete in the senior division.**

**1<sup>st</sup>, 2<sup>nd</sup>, and 3<sup>rd</sup> place will be awarded for both Jr. and Sr. Divisions of group, non-musical, and musical acts. The judges will then select Champion and Reserve Champion for each type of act (Group, Non-musical, Musical). Champion and Reserve Champion Acts will be given the opportunity to perform at the area performing arts competition.**

1. Required cover sheet must be submitted with the scrapbook, indicating which pages are to be judged. A brief description of the page or title of the page will be listed on this cover sheet. Scrapbook page numbers may be marked with removable stickers or sticky tabs. Scrapbooks without cover page or pages not indicated before judging will have the first 5 pages judged.
2. Exhibit 5 new pages each year to be added to your scrapbook exhibited in previous years. If you start a new scrapbook, bring the previous scrapbook to show the judge. New pages must be tagged/flagged to be judged. A page is considered one side of each page. The scrapbook project is the art of preserving memories. Photos & memorabilia must be included each year in the scrapbook, but do not need to be on each page. Remember to include a variety of photos, journaling & memorabilia. Page sleeves are recommended, but not required.
3. Use a variety of cropping techniques and page layouts. This will add interest and creativity to your album. Let your pictures, memorabilia and journaling be the main focus of your project. Make sure to list dates, people and places.
4. Having a logical order to your scrapbook is important. For example: you may construct your scrapbook by theme or in chronological order.
5. One county champion and one county reserve champion will be selected in each division.

**TRADITIONAL SCRAPBOOKS:** May be in a scrapbook or 3 ring binder of any size.

Neatness counts! Exhibit clean pages with clear handwriting. Handwriting is part of your heritage. While titles and captions are acceptable typed or cut, details should be handwritten. Practice writing before putting it on a page. Proofreading is a must.

**Beginner:** Label photos with names of people, dates, and places. Include at least 1 piece of memorabilia.

**Intermediate:** Complete ALL beginner requirements plus include extended captions the record the happening in the photos.

**Advanced:** Complete ALL beginner and intermediate requirements. In addition, include storytelling. Storytelling completes the story of a picture with your thoughts and feelings. Storytelling is not required for every picture, so please choose ones deserving of this.

### **DIGITALLY DESIGNED SCRAPBOOKS**

- The album must have a front and back cover with the album pages firmly attached.
- The album size must be at least 8" x 8" in a book-bound finish.
- Digitally Designed Scrapbooks may also be constructed using a computer software program.
- The on-line/software service must allow for sufficient space for journal-writing requirements. Some examples of online services may be, Shutterfly, Snapfish, etc., but not limited to these programs.

3. ID 401 A-F Cards (grades 3-8) and ID 401-I cards, (grades 9-12), are to be placed inside the display box in an attractive manner.

Identification: Collection display boxes are expected to contain the specified number of insects, families, and orders specified (see chart below).

All insects must be in the adult stage and be properly mounted on insect pins or be contained in vials as directed.

Pin Labels: Each pin or vial must contain two labels: 1) Top label is to include collection date, location, and collector name.

2) Bottom label is to include common name and other optional identification data

Box Labels: Box labels (computer generated or neatly printed) are used for orders & families as required (see chart below) & are to be placed flat against the bottom of the box. Insects must be properly grouped directly under the correct order & family box label. For example, all insects belonging to a particular order must be placed under that order label. Orders to be used are listed in the reference book ID- 401. If family level identification is required, the insects should be further grouped together under that family label.

Educational Box: One additional box (educational), based on the specific theme (see chart below), is required for grades 9-12, in addition to the insect collection boxes. This box can be created in any manner chosen (without the mounting, pinning or identifying restrictions specified above).

### Poster Option

Follow all poster rules on page 8 of this handbook. Choose one of the topics listed below, appropriate for your grade in school, and use that topic for your exhibit title, so the judges know which activity you completed. You can also use a creative sub-title if you wish.

#### Level 1: Display a poster based on the following activities:

- **Big Mouth Bugs:** Show 4 different mouth types you studied. Create a chart listing the 4 mouth types, an insect with this mouth type, food they eat, & where these insects might be found.
- **Pit Stop:** Make 2 pit traps. Use them to collect insects. Exhibit completed record sheet. Use the format given for data collection or make your own. Include some of the insects, or pictures of your trap and insects collected.
- **Buz-z-zing Around:** Present 3-5 ways insects communicate. Include an insect (or pic) that communicates in each of the ways you are describing.
- **FACETnating:** Show how insects see (compound eyes) & explain how they see colors.
- **Ants & Uncles:** Compare insects with their non-insect relatives. Complete chart in book (copy or make your own). Include some of the insects & their non-insect relatives, or pictures of them, on your poster.
- **Chirp, Chirp:** Watch & listen to crickets for 5 minutes, 3 times a day, for 3 days. Include day & night observations. Record what you see & hear.

#### Level 2: Display a poster based on the following activities:

- **A Sticky Situation:** Make and use sticky traps for 4 weeks as described in Activity 13. Exhibit data sheet & the answers to "Talk It Over" questions.
- **Insect Experiments:** Complete 1 of the following: Activity 8 (Color My World), Activity 9 (Sowbug Investigations), or Activity 10 (Life's Stages). Exhibit data sheet & answers to "Talk It Over" questions. For activities 8 & 9 include your hypothesis & a conclusive statement about your hypothesis (indicate if proved or disproved).
- **Invasive Species Investigations:** Create informational exhibit about 1 (Indiana) invasive insect. Include info requested in the activity for this insect (first 8 questions on page 29).
- **Footprint Clues:** Study tracks of 3 different insect species & 1 arthropod (Activity 14). Exhibit data sheet & answers to "Talk It Over" questions

#### Level 3: Display a poster based on the following activities:

- **The Scientific Method:** Use scientific method to complete 1 problem listed in Activity 3. Describe what you did to complete the 5 scientific method steps. Include data & drawings or pics of your experiment.
- **Transecting for Insects:** Compare 3 habitats using the scientific method to determine which has the most terrestrial insect activity. Display your transect data sheet for each habitat & answer "Talk It Over" questions.
- **Please Drop In:** Create your own hypothesis and collect insects in five pitfall traps to prove or disprove your hypothesis, as described in Activity 7. Display how you completed your experiment (including each step in the scientific method) and your data for each habitat.

#### LEVEL A: Grades 3 and 4 – Create a simple flower arrangement meeting one of the following criteria.

1. **Bud Vase;** provide your own vase, from cut flowers you grew in your garden. Vase must be no more than 9" tall by 3" wide, neck opening not to exceed 1.5" & be clear or white only. Include 1-3 stems of a main flower, along with appropriate amount of filler flower & greenery.
2. **Bud Vase;** use own vase (no more than 9" tall by 3" wide, neck opening not to exceed 1.5" & be clear or white only) from cut flowers you purchased. Include 1-3 stems of a main flower with appropriate amount of filler flower/greenery. Flowers should be in their natural state; not wired for display.
3. **Round Arrangement;** (small, compact round cluster of flowers) with fresh flowers you purchased. No larger than 12"x12" including vase/container
4. **Round Arrangement** (small, compact round cluster of flowers) with fresh flowers you grew. No larger than 12"x12" including vase/container

**Poster or Notebook Exhibits** - choose any one (1) of the following topics:

1. Chronicle your work in your flower garden (planning, planting, care, harvest, arrangements made with your flowers).
2. Describe how you planned or designed your garden, including how you chose the kinds of flowers.

Maximum container size is 18" x 18" (height will vary). Must include 4-H 967c "Level B Plant Record" chronicling care of your plant.
2. **Dried Arrangement** - Make an item with dried herbs or dried flowers that you grew yourself. Examples of items to exhibit are, but not limited to, dried flower product or simple dried arrangement in a container. (Exhibit not to exceed 18"X18").
3. **One house plant**, (foliage and/or flowering), in a container not to exceed 10 inches in diameter. There must be only one specimen plant per pot. A flowering plant may be of any color with single or double flowers. Must include 4-H 967c "Level B Plant Record" chronicling the care of your plant.

**Poster or Notebook Exhibits** - choose any one (1) of the following topics:

1. Report how you harvested, cared for, dried, & used your flowers/herbs.
2. Describe how you planned or designed your garden, including how you chose the kinds of plants, any problems, & successes.
3. Describe your houseplant - how you cared for, transplanted to larger pot, any problems, or successes.
4. Describe an experiment you did and the results.
5. Investigate & describe: a butterfly garden - what types of plants, benefits to insects & butterflies, etc.

Explore and Explain one of the following options:

6. Insects & your flowers &/or herbs.
7. Starting seeds indoors - the process & pros/cons
8. Perennials: what are they, how they're used, benefits/drawbacks
9. Plant biology: form & function, growth, photosynthesis, etc.
10. Growing indoor plants: things to consider, common problems/solutions
11. Environmental effects related to plants like light, water, soil, temperature
12. Topics from "Imagine That": plants around the world, info about cultural uses of plants, different ways you used your plants/herbs/flower

**LEVEL C: Grades 7, 8, and 9 – Create and exhibit one of the Following**

1. **Terrarium** - Terrarium size should be appropriate for table use at home, (Maximum size 12" deep X 18" long x 16" high. Must have a cover while on exhibit. See activity information for design.
2. **Combination or European planter**: Container of plants (3 or more kinds) that you planted & cared for a minimum of 2 months. See activity for info on plants & design. Maximum container space 18" x 18" (height will be variable).
3. **1 corsage or 2 boutonnieres made with fresh flowers**. Corsages should contain 3 or more blooms. NO artificial flowers or greenery should be used in this category. Bows and decorative items are okay.
4. **1 corsage or 2 boutonnieres made from silk or other artificial flowers/greenery**. Can be created with mixed fresh & artificial materials, or all artificial. Bows & decorative items are ok.
5. **Dried arrangement in container or specialty item** (i.e. wreath or swag) made with dried flowers & dried plant materials. NO artificial flowers/plant materials should be included. Bows & decorative items are okay. Maximum size 24" x 24" (height will be variable).
6. **Flower arrangement using either roses or lilies as the primary component**. Arrangement should be made with all fresh materials (NO artificial flowers/plant materials). Bows and decorative items are okay.

**Poster or Notebook Exhibits** - choose any one (1) of the following topics:

1. Explore & explain: vegetative propagation - how to, different types, problems and solutions, different uses of.
2. Explore & explain: plant nutrients: what they are, why plants need them, what happens if plants get too much/too little, planters/containers vs. garden.
3. Investigate the design of multiple plant containers - how to, things to consider, selecting plant material, uses.
4. Describe creation of your corsage/boutonnieres/dried arrangement. Include info on design principles & how they're used to create your arrangement
5. Explore & explain: floral tools & materials (how to use, what they are, care of tools, different uses of tool or material).
6. Explore and explain: preserving cut flowers - how, problems, uses of and/or diseases related to cut flowers.
7. Illustrate, explore & explain how you dry flowers or other plant material &/or describe different methods &/or how, why use them.
8. Explore and explain: medicinal uses and toxicity of fresh and dried flowers and plants.
9. Describe an experiment you did and the results.
10. Describe a career exploration activity you did, such as job shadow, interview with a professional.
11. Describe a community service activity you did related to your flowers project - what you did, why, results.

**LEVEL D: Grades 10, 11, and 12 – Create and Exhibit one of the following MUST INCLUDE PLANT RECORD**

1. **Seasonal arrangement of fresh flower &/or plant materials**. Flowers/plant materials specific to a season or holiday should be used (i.e. fall mums or spring tulips). Maximum size 24" x 24" x 36". Display traditional floral arrangement or items such as wreaths. Bow/decorative accessories accepted
2. **Seasonal arrangement of fresh &/or artificial flowers/plant materials**. Flowers/plant materials specific to a season or holiday should be used. Maximum size 24" x 24" x 36". Display traditional floral arrangement or items such as wreaths. Bow/decorative accessories accepted
3. **Modern or contemporary style arrangement using fresh flower and plant materials**. See manual for suggestions. Maximum size 24" x 24" x 36". Include a label that states what type of design you have created (botanical, pave, parallel, free-form, abstract, etc.)
4. **Bridal bouquet**. Proper display of the bouquet should be considered, but only the bouquet will be judged. Bouquet should include only fresh plant materials. Bows and decorative accessories are okay.
5. **Event Centerpiece** (i.e. banquet, party, wedding, funeral, or church). Arrangement should be no larger than 24" x 24" x 36" and be made from EITHER fresh flowers and/or plant materials or artificial or silk flower and/or plant materials. Bows and decorative accessories are okay.
6. **Display a plant that you propagated** (and grew and cared for) by tissue culture or other vegetative propagation methods, or flowering bulbs that you forced. Maximum pot size should not exceed 10" diameter. You must include 4-H 969c "Level D Record" chronicling the care of your plant.

## **FOODS**

**Project Leader: Deb Finch 765-981-4562**

**Food Safety Rule for Foods Entered into County and Statewide Competitions:** For food competitions: Filling, frosting, glazing, pie filling, & meringue, (uncooked or cooked) are not permitted to contain cream cheese, sour cream, heavy cream, or whipped cream as the nature of these products increases the moisture content & water activity of the food. Foods with a higher moisture content & water activity can be ideal growing conditions for food borne pathogens, even if the ingredient is part of a batter & baked. Additionally, raw milk, raw milk products or uncooked eggs/egg whites are not permitted. Eggs/egg whites cooked to 160°F (i.e. pasteurized or included as part of a batter & baked) are acceptable. No home-canned fruits, vegetables, or meats are permitted in products. Recipes must be provided that show which ingredients were used in each part of the product. Contestants should carefully wash their hands & make sure their hands do not have any open cuts before preparing foods. Contestants should not be preparing food exhibits for competition within 48 hours of recovering from any illness. Whenever possible, baked products should be transported & stored in chilled coolers (41°F).

Judges and individuals who will consume products from county and state competitions should be informed that they are at risk for foodborne illness since the established policy cannot guarantee that an entry which may be a "potentially hazardous food" has been properly prepared or handled before, during or following the competition. Tasting of a food product is solely at the discretion of the judge. Judges are NOT to taste any low-acid or acidified preserved food, like green beans or tomato products, and are discouraged from tasting any other home preserved food.

Consumers of competitive food exhibits being sold at auction or used for hospitality purposes should be notified they could be at risk for foodborne illness since the established policy cannot guarantee that an entry which may be a potentially hazardous food has been properly prepared or handled before, during, or following the competition.

Recipes must be provided that identifies all ingredients that were used in each part of the product. Any ingredient that could be a potential allergen must be clearly identified. Each food product must be labeled with the following information: Name, Address, Contact information (phone and/or email address), Date the food product was made.

**Please Refer to the General Foods Category for Food Safety Rules for Foods Entered into County and Statewide Competitions:**

- NO BREAD MACHINES. NO BOX MIXES – RECIPES MUST BE FROM SCRATCH. Participants are expected to learn how to knead bread dough by hand & allow it to rise appropriately.
- Since it is illegal in the State of Indiana for youth under the age of 21 to purchase or consume alcoholic beverages, 4-H members are to use recipes that do not include an alcoholic beverage as an ingredient. A suitable non-alcoholic or imitation product may be substituted.

Recipes must be provided that show which ingredients were used in each part of the product.

For Food Competitions: Fillings, frostings, glazes, and meringues are not permitted to contain cream cheese, sour cream, heavy cream, or whipped cream if they are not fully cooked/baked. These items are allowed as ingredients in food products IF the final product is cooked/baked. Additionally, raw milk, raw milk products or uncooked eggs/egg whites are not permitted. Eggs/egg whites that have been cooked to 160 °F (i.e. pasteurized or included as part of a batter and baked) are acceptable. No home-canned fruits, vegetables, or meats are permitted as ingredients in food products. Fresh-cut, uncooked, fruits and/or vegetables are not permitted to be used in food products or used as garnishes for the product. Foods should be transported to the competition in a way that minimizes contamination and maintains the quality of the food (i.e. foods that are judged as frozen should remain frozen at all times).

RECIPES MUST be provided that identifies all ingredients that were used in each part of the product. Any ingredient that could be a potential allergen must be clearly identified. Each food product must be labeled with the following information: Name, address, contact information (phone and/or email address), date the food product was made.

Contestants should carefully wash their hands and make sure that their hands do not have any open cuts before preparing foods. If cuts are present, the wound should be bandaged and a single use food service glove worn on the hand during all stages of food production. Contestants should not be preparing food exhibits for competition within 48 hours of recovering from any illness. People experiencing symptoms of vomiting, diarrhea, fever, and/or jaundice should not be allowed to prepare food.

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Judges and individuals who will consume products from county and/or state competitions should be informed that they are at risk for foodborne illness since the established policy cannot guarantee that an entry has been properly prepared or handled before, during or following the competition. The food products for competitions are home produced and processed and the production area is not inspected by the Indiana State Department of Health. Tasting of a food product is solely at the discretion of the judge and consumers. Judges are NOT to taste any home preserved foods such as low-acid or acidified foods like green beans, tomatoes or tomato products, jams/jellies/fruit preserves or fermented products produced in the home.

**Exhibit Requirements:**

- Display cakes top side up on cardboard about 1/2" larger than the bottom of the cake. Cover cardboard with freezer paper, foil, wax paper or plastic wrap, before putting the cake on it.
- Display all baked goods grades 3-8 on paper/foam plate or cardboard covered with freezer paper, foil, wax paper or plastic wrap.
- Grades 9-12 may display in non-disposable containers at county fair only.
- An interactive demonstration may be given in each of the age divisions to complete the project.
- Pies should be exhibited in disposable pie tin. Reusable containers or pans will NOT be returned from State Fair.

**Level A: Grade 3** - Three snack-sized (2"-3" in size) drop, molded or bar baked cookies. No glaze or frosting. Display on desert size paper/foam plate.

**Grade 4** - Three standard size muffins that contain an ingredient that is a source of Vitamin A or Vitamin C (no muffin liners).

**Level B: Grade 5** - A square, oblong or round layer reduced-fat cake, without frosting. Reduce the amount of fat in the recipe by using a fruit puree or baby food fruit product that does not contain yogurt.

**Grade 6** - Use a whole grain flour mixture to make three no-yeast, any shape pretzels (shaped, stick, or nugget) OR 3 no-yeast sweet or savory rolled biscuits (no dropped biscuits).

**Level C: Grades 7, 8, 9:** Choose 1 baked product from the following list. It is suggested a 4-H'er choose a different option each year but not required.

- 3 yeast breadsticks or yeast rolls (any shape, medium size - not sweet roll), using a whole grain flour mixture such as whole wheat, rye, oat bran, etc.
- A yeast bread (can be loaf/braid, but not rolls) using a whole grain flour mixture such as whole wheat, rye, oat bran, etc.
- One package of a non-perishable invented healthy snack (such as a granola bar, popcorn snack, trail mix, etc.) or another invented food product. Your snack must include at least 2 food groups from MyPlate. Exhibit must include a your snack product and a separate folder containing a marketing plan with product name, recipe, how it will be packaged, a package design, where it will be sold and suggested selling price. Style your snack for a photo shoot and include the picture in your marketing plan. Label should include product name, date, quantity, and serving size.

**Level D: Grades 10, 11, 12:** Choose 1 baked product from the following list. It is suggested a 4-H'er choose a different option each year but not required.

- Single or double crust baked fruit pie (homemade crust - no graham cracker). NO perishable food ingredients.
- A non-perishable food product for a catered meal or special event in which organizers have requested low fat &/or reduced sugar items. Exhibit will include your food product and a notebook outlining how this product is to be used at the event, menu, supplies to buy, preparation schedule, equipment, table layout, etc. A table display is optional and should be no larger than 16" deep x 22" wide x 28" high.
- Select a condition in which people have to specifically modify their eating habits (diabetes, heart disease, Celiac disease, food allergies, etc.) Prepare a non-perishable baked food product appropriate for someone with this condition. Exhibit will include your food product and a notebook summarizing the condition or allergy, nutrition considerations involved with the condition, a description of your baked item, and an explanation of how it fits within the nutrition considerations. Make sure to note any ingredients that could cause an allergic reaction.

**Level A:** Display in freezer bag/container. Include a covered 5x8 recipe card & defrosting instructions. Label with product name, quantity & date frozen

**Grade 3-** A package of 3 baked, snack-sized (approximately 2"-3" individual size) frozen cookies.

**Grade 4** - One package of frozen berries.

**Level B** Include a covered 5x8 recipe card & instructions for cooking. Label with name of product, quantity & date frozen.

**Grade 5** - One uncooked frozen mini pizza using whole-grain pita bread, English muffin, bagel or already prepared crust (no larger than 7" in diameter) with toppings of your choice. Include at least 4 MyPlate food groups on your pizza. Meat toppings such as hamburger, sausage, bacon, etc. need to be cooked. Display on covered cardboard inside freezer bag.

**Grade 6** - One package of any frozen vegetable or combination vegetables. Display in freezer bag or freezer container. Include defrosting and cooking instructions on recipe card.

**Level C: Grades 7, 8, 9:** 4-H'ers may choose 1 preserved product listed below. It is suggested a 4-H'er choose a new option yearly but not required.

- One container of freezer jam. Include a covered 5x8 recipe card & storage instructions. Label with product name, quantity & date frozen.
- One jar of a canned tomato product using the Hot Pack Method for a boiling water bath canner, such as tomato juice, catsup, barbeque sauce, or salsa. Recipe Card should include instructions for cooking or using the product. Label with name of product, quantity & date frozen. Note: Only food preservation products made using USDA approved or Ball Blue Book recipes are acceptable.
- One jar of canned pickles or a canned pickled product. Include a covered 5x8 recipe card, processing and storage instructions. (Products using a fancy pack are not accepted.) Label with name of product, quantity and date canned. Note: Only food preservation products made using USDA approved or Ball Blue Book recipes are acceptable.

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Level D: Grades 10, 11, 12: 4-H'ers may choose 1 preserved product listed below. It is suggested 4-H'ers choose a new option yearly but not required.

- One jar of pressure canned vegetables, meat or combination product, such as soup, stew, spaghetti sauce with meat, etc. Include recipe card and instructions for cooking or using the product. (Products using a fancy pack are not accepted.) Label with name of product, quantity and date canned. Note: Only food preservation products made using USDA approved or Ball Blue Book recipes are acceptable.
- One package of combination food frozen entree in freezer container. The combination food should contain 3 food groups from MyPlate. Exhibit should include a covered 5x8 recipe card and instructions for reheating. Label with name of product, quantity, and date frozen.
- A jar of cooked jam or a reduced sugar fruit spread. Include a covered 5x8 recipe card. Label with product name, quantity, & date made.

Choose one of the topics listed below, appropriate for your grade in school, and use that topic for your exhibit title. If you are exhibiting leaves, they should be free of any damage. (Note: scientific names are required for herbariums.) If you choose to write their scientific names, they must be in either italics or underscored. The Genus (first name) must have the first letter capitalized. The species (second name) has no capitalization.

Forestry 1: Grades 3-5 – Display a poster based on one of the following activities:

- Leafing Out -comparisons (pp 6-7) Collect, dry, & mount 6 different species of leaves showing leaf differences; 1 leaf with opposite arrangement & 1 with an alternate arrangement, 2 leaves with different leaf margins, a compound leaf, & simple leaf. Use 50 Trees of Indiana book (4-H 15-80 or CD-FRN-3) as a reference & identify the leaves & group them under the titles of “arrangement”, leaf margins,” and “compound or simple.” Draw (or copy the picture) and label the parts of a leaf using the diagram from the manual (Level 1). Title your poster, Leafing Out - Leaf Differences.
- Leafing Out - collection (pp 6-7). Identify and exhibit leaves from 10 different trees that are listed in 50 Trees of Indiana book (4-H 15-80 or CD-FNR-3). List at least two unique characteristics of each tree. Title your poster, Leafing Out – Collection.
- Hold on Tight (pp 10-11). Dig up small plant root system & display along with a drawing of the root system with the anchor, lateral, & feeder roots identified and the “Parts of a Tree” diagram (4-H 641B).
- Down in the Dirt (pp 20-21), collect roots from 3 different habitats: woods, near a creek, & pasture or prairie. (Do not use habitats listed in your manual.) Display the roots with the completed root test chart (copy or recreate) showing color, size, & shape information. Include any unique features you noted.
- My Couch is a Tree? (pp 30&31) Use pics (draw, cut from magazines, print, or take photos) to show 10 things in & around your home made from wood.
- Fun in the Forest (pp 32 & 33), Visit a state park or forest, take your 50 Trees of Indiana book (4-H 15-80 or CD-FNR-3), diagram the trails you hiked, and list the types of trees you saw. Photographs of you hiking and some of the trees you saw will help you tell your story.

Forestry 2: Grades 6-8 - Display a poster based on one of the following activities:

- Leaf Machine (pp 8-9), copy, draw, or find a picture of a cross-section of a leaf. Label the 7 parts. Give the chemical reaction for photosynthesis, define the chemicals: CO<sub>2</sub>, H<sub>2</sub>O, O<sub>2</sub>, & C<sub>6</sub>H<sub>12</sub>O<sub>6</sub>. Balance your equation! There should be the same numbers of Carbon, Oxygen, & Hydrogen molecules on each side of the equal sign. You may need to ask an older 4-H member or science teacher for help. Draw the tree canopy, trunk, & roots (or use the tree diagram, 4-H 641B) & identify the crown, trunk (with the parts, heartwood, sapwood, cambium, & bark listed on the right), feeder roots & anchor roots.
- My State's Forests (pp 14-15) use a map, draw, or find a picture of Indiana on the Internet (e.g., [www.in.gov/igic](http://www.in.gov/igic)). Show where your home, school, & fairgrounds are located. Choose 1 of the following options to complete your poster.
  - a. Show where Indiana's state forests are located. List facts about each. Visit a state park or forest & have your picture taken by the sign, if possible.
  - b. Show locations of some *state* parks & forests (5-15). List facts about each. Visit a *state* park or forest & have your pic taken by the sign, if possible.
- Someone Call a (Tree) Doctor and Stop Bugging Me (pp 22-25), Collect 10 samples of tree leaves, twigs, stems, or roots damaged by insects or disease and the fruiting body or disease that caused the damage. List information about the insect or disease & the species of tree affected.
- Fire in the Forest (pp 26-27), explain the Fire Triangle & describe what happened during & after a famous forest fire. Drawings or pictures will help.
- Growing Every Day (pp 30-31), Complete the table to calculate the volume of 5 large trees that you can find & measure in your county. Research to find out how to make & use a Tree Measuring Stick (FNR-4) & use that to calculate the volume of each tree. Explain why you think your results varied with the 2 methods of determining tree volume (the one in your 4-H manual or using a tree measuring stick.)
- Tree Planting. Plant 1-3 shade trees. Include information about the tree (or trees) you planted, why you chose the species you did, what are the benefits of this tree, & how tall this tree (or trees) will be when mature. Explain why you chose the planning site that you did, where you found planting information, what steps you followed, the hole size, care of your tree (watering and weed control), & any other info you can give. Include a picture of your tree (photo or drawing). Reference: FNR-FAQ-18-W

Forestry 3: Grades 9-12 - Display a poster based on one of the following activities:

- A World of Forests (pp 16 & 17), indicate the 3 major forest biomes on a copy, drawing, or picture of the world. Complete table in the activity.
- City Trees (pp 20 & 21), complete the questions about Tree City (page 20). Show (draw or use pictures) some trees that are often used in city plantings and explain the benefits of these trees.
- Trim the Trees (pp 26 & 27), explain the 5 different kinds of tree pruning for urban trees. List some do's and don'ts of proper pruning.
- My Boss is a Tree (pp 34 & 35), list 5 jobs that require a knowledge of trees and forestry. Explain the training and education that is needed and what types of things you might be doing if you had this job.
- Tree Planting - Present a tree planting plan for at least 100 trees. Include the type of trees planted, pictures, cost, planting method, weeding, pruning your trees, & any additional info. Exhibit must have a title, labels, backing, & plastic covering as required in manual. Reference: FNR-FAQ-18-W
- Herbarium Collection - Trees Collect 25 terminal twigs & at least 2 leaves, if space allows (1 compound leaf required), from native forest trees. Mount specimens on 11 1/2" x 16 1/2" paper. One leaf on the twig must be mounted to show the leaf's back side. Label each sheet with the following: common & scientific names, where collected, county where collected, date collected, name of collector & specimen number. Cover each specimen. There are no specific references given for these exhibits. Youth should use Extension publications, the Internet, books, & forest specialists to develop these items.
- Herbarium Collection – Shrubs Collect 25 terminal twigs, with leaves attached, from native shrubs. Mount specimens on 11 1/2" x 16 1/2" paper. One leaf on the twig must be mounted to show the back side of the leaf. Label each sheet with the following: common names, scientific name, where collected, county where collected, date collected, name of collector & specimen number. Cover each specimen. There are no specific references given for these exhibits. Youth should use Extension publications, Internet, books, & forest specialists to develop these items.

Note: Herbarium collections must be accessible to the judges. Do not cover it under the plastic that covers your poster. You may want to attach a folder or other holder over your poster to hold the mounted, covered specimens.

Independent Study: Grades 9 -12

Advanced topic – Learn all you can about an Indiana or Eastern Deciduous forestry topic of your choice and present it on a poster. Include a short manuscript, pictures, graphs, and list the works cited to describe what you did and what you learned. Manuscript must be part of the poster. Title your poster, "Advanced Forestry – Independent Study.

Mentoring - Exhibit a poster that shows how you mentored a younger 4-H member. Include your planning, the time you spent, the challenges and advantages of mentoring, and how the experience might be useful in your life. Photographs and other documentation are encouraged. Title your poster, "Advanced Forestry - Mentor."

Exhibit – 4-H Members may enter an exhibit in any category listed below regardless of grade/level in the garden project.

*Single Vegetable:* Selected from 4-H 970-W or State Fair Premium book. Maximum of 5 different single plate exhibits per exhibitor. Display 3 of the same vegetable on the same plate. Label single vegetable entries with common name, Latin name, & variety of vegetable. Find Latin names in 4-H 970-W. (i.e Green bean (*Phaseolus vulgaris*) 'Blue Lake 47 Bush')

*Garden Collection (3 Plate, 4 Plate, or 5 Plate Classes):* In all classes, vegetables are to be exhibited on paper plates & may include a display of not less than 3 garden flowers, grown in your own garden. Exhibitors may each exhibit one collection (3 or 4 or 5 plate garden collection) at State Fair. Garden collection entries should be labeled with common name, Latin name, and variety. Latin names can be found in 4-H Garden Publication 4-H 970-W.

*Single Herb Exhibit:* Can enter 3 single herbs (all edible types) that must be labeled with common & Latin names & in pots 8" diameter maximum. (maximum of 3 different pots). Resource HO-28; 4-H 970-W; For list of herbs acceptable for State Fair, see State Fair handbook or 4-H 970W.

*Garden Education - One garden education exhibit per county may be exhibited at State Fair. Anyone can complete Section IV (Garden Education), but 4-Hers enrolled in Levels C & D of the garden project SHOULD exhibit 1 of the following activities in addition to the Produce Exhibit (Section I, II & III)*

Produce Options

1. Exhibit 4 plates containing 2 cultivars of 2 different kinds of vegetables in your garden. *For example:* display tomato *Rutgers* and tomato *Roma* on two plates and spinach *Melody* and *America* on two plates. Label the cultivars you exhibit.
2. Label & exhibit 3 unusual vegetables (may or may not be discussed in your 4-H Garden Manual) you grew in your garden this year. If not listed in the vegetable display chart, check with your Extension office. *For example:* spaghetti squash, head lettuce, etc.

Poster Options – Make a poster on any of the following topics.

3. Five commonly found diseases in vegetable gardens, the damage caused by each, and the control options for each.
4. Five commonly found vegetable garden insects: beneficial (good guys) and/or injurious (bad guys), benefits or damage caused by each, and the related management practices (how to keep the beneficial, and how to control the injurious insects).
5. Maximum of 10 pests (diseases/insects/weeds/rodents) found in your garden this year, damage caused, control measures used, & results.
6. Explain a computer garden program or mobile application.
7. Show a picture story of what you did in your garden this year. (how you planned, planted, & maintained your garden)
8. Show your financial record.
9. Pictures showing your experiences in hydroponics.
10. Explain various career options working with vegetables/herbs.
11. Explain types of pollinators and their importance in vegetable and fruit production.
12. Show the different plant parts consumed by humans. Identify the fruit or vegetable & categorize it by root, stem, leaf, or flower.
13. Show different storage methods for vegetables.
14. Show how to create a raised bed OR container vegetable garden.
15. Discuss how herbs listed on the last page of 4-H Garden Publication 4-H 970-W are used & have been used throughout history. Be sure to include both culinary and medicinal uses as well as other unique uses, if any.

Project forms are found on Indiana's 4-H Website [www.extension.purdue.edu/4h](http://www.extension.purdue.edu/4h) click on "projects" then on Genealogy to reach downloadable forms. If using a genealogical commercial software program, you may need to type in or hand write in information required by the Indiana 4-H genealogy project. **Do NOT use old "packet" pedigree charts for any division.**

The exhibit will consist of no more than four 4 notebooks (must be 3" D-ring binder) for Division 1-4 and first year Advanced Division. (If a notebook requires additional space, label it as notebook x, continued.) Notebooks should be tabbed and in the following order:

- Book #1: introduction sheet, pedigree charts and family group sheets
- Book #2: additional information worksheets and diary of work
- Book #3: supporting docs, pics, etc. (label tabs with ancestor numbers)
- Book #4 – contains Adv. Division options only (label each tab separately with the specific option); Diary of Your Work (this will be a 2<sup>nd</sup> diary describing work done for each Adv. division option) Begin using this notebook in 1<sup>st</sup> year of Adv. Division or 5<sup>th</sup> year of project.

• Another notebook should be maintained & kept in a secure place at home to keep original personal & legal documents & previously exhibited work. Computer or legible printing/handwriting (be consistent with method used), #2 lead pencil with soft eraser, Black ink pen, Yellow highlighter, Notebook tabs AND acid free dividers (several tabs will be needed, be consistent with style used, should not appear past edge of notebook), Fine point permanent Black marker, Acid free and non-glare sheet protectors Acid free paper, Acid free glue stick, Acid free satin Scotch tape Scissors, Correction tape, Lots of creativity to make the exhibit your own while still following the exhibit guidelines.

Place Pedigree Charts, Family Group Sheets, Additional Information Worksheets, & Diary Sheets back-to-back in notebook in sheet protectors to save space, reduce being damage, & reduce number of sheet protectors. For public displayed & to minimize potential of identity theft, do NOT include original legal documents in the exhibit notebook. Instead, include a copy of any legal document in the notebook & completely mark out all identifiable information (i.e. social security numbers) except for names. Original legal documents are to be kept in a secure location by the 4-H'er & his/her family.

If info on a family member is unknown, an additional information worksheet for each required ancestor is still required. Write "unknown" or "NIA" (no information available) in PENCIL for each sheet of unknown ancestors or list several ancestors on a page & insert page in proper numerical order.

After exhibiting the 1st year of the ADVANCED Division, only the Adv. Div. notebook (Book #4) with ALL OPTIONS (no pedigree charts, no family group sheets, no additional information sheets, no documents from Divisions 1-5) need to be exhibited each year the project continues.

### **DIVISION I** - Exhibit a notebook(s) that includes the following and Turn in a Completed Record Sheet

Book 1: \* Introduction page with a recent photograph of yourself.

\* 3-generation pedigree chart. This includes you, your parents, & your grandparents, ancestors #1 through #7. Put all surnames in capital letters & all dates in military form (12 July 1974). Give each person a number, described in "Recording the Information" 4-H 748.

\* Family Group Sheet for your parents and each pair of grandparents. Sources of information must be filled in on family group sheets (see section "Recording the Information").

Book 2: \* Four "Additional Information Worksheets": 1 for you (4-H'er), 1 for your parents, & 1 for each set of grandparents (2 worksheets)

\* A diary of your work.

- Book 3: \* Copied photo or story of 6<sup>th</sup> generation ancestor. Include info about the date the photo was taken, how or where you found it & what's happening in it or why it was taken. If unavailable, write a story about the historical period during which your 6<sup>th</sup> generation ancestor lived.  
 \* Any documents or pictures pertaining to these generations, correctly labeled.
- ADVANCED DIVISION** - Exhibit a notebook(s) that includes the following and turn in completed record sheet:
- Book 1: \* 7<sup>th</sup> & 8<sup>th</sup>-generation pedigree charts, ancestors 64-255. If ancestry is unknown, indicate as Unknown. Computer programs do not generally print chart numbers, so if you are using a computer program, make sure you have the correct number of ancestors.  
 \* Your family group sheet and additional information worksheets for generations seven and eight.  
 \* Sources of information filled in on family group sheets (see "Recording the Information" in 4-H 748).
- Book 2 (Ancestors 64-255 Information): \* Additional Information worksheets \* A diary of your work.
- Book 3 (Ancestors 64-255 Information): \* Any documents or pictures pertaining to these generations; correctly labeled.
- Book 4: \* 1 new advanced level option (see below). Advanced division exhibitors must include all options submitted in prior years, with each option labeled with the year completed. Explain the information received as to how it relates to you & your ancestors. Copies of documents obtained in previous divisions are acceptable and should be utilized in the option chosen if needed.
- o Migration map of your 8-generation ancestors. You should have at least 1 map per family line with charts or explanations of the migrations.
  - o Timeline historical report of a family line. Show how this family fits into history. Document your report as well as possible with dates, records, places or maps, pictures, etc. Be sure to include proper labels & sources.
  - o Census history of a family line. Census abstract forms can be found on several websites. Download forms to abstract the census. Your notebook should contain copies of the census and the completed abstract form for each census.
  - o History of your family's religious background for any family line or lines. Include a brief history of the denomination. Include baptism, confirmation/profession of faith & membership records. Include info or history of the congregations involved. Include proper labels & sources.
  - o History of your family's military service for a family line. Include supporting documents if possible. Documents can include military records, (muster rolls, discharge papers, etc.), pension records, & bounty land records, as well as maps & pictures. Include proper labels & sources.
  - o Research paper on a famous ancestor. Prove relationship with documentation. Try to include pictures & anecdotes to enhance paper.
  - o Complete a family line(s) back as many generations as possible beyond 8 generations. Include: pics, maps, documents, proper labels & sources.
  - o A timeline historical report of another family line not previously completed. Document as well as possible as in Option B. You need to state at the beginning that this is a second family historical report on such ancestor.
  - o A history of your family's military service for a family line not previously completed. Include supporting documents as in Option E. You need to state at the beginning that this is a second family military history report on such ancestor.
  - o Family DNA history. (This can be a very expensive option) Please include charts and explanations.
- Pedigree charts are available on the Indiana 4-H Web site for your additional genealogy research. Each year following, continue to add ancestors to your pedigree charts. In addition, choose one of the following options that have not been completed previously. Please identify, by letter, the option that you are completing (for example Advanced Division, Year 1, Option A-, Advanced Division, Year 2, Option C; etc.)
  - Advanced Division Year 2 & beyond – Exhibit Book #4 that contains advanced division options & a 2<sup>nd</sup> diary of work. If additional ancestry information was found in the 7<sup>th</sup> & 8<sup>th</sup> generation, exhibit Book 1 noting ancestors completed this year along with Books 2 & 3 demonstrating this year's work.

Create an exhibit displaying some of the geology specimens you have collected. See page 8 of this handbook for poster rules. Or, you may display your specimens in an insect display box (18 x 24 inches), orientated horizontally. Exhibit actual specimens, when possible. You can make your own labels for your specimens. See the suggested label format found in the Indiana 4-H geology manuals. Boxes make your specimens more secure. Do not put valuable specimens on posters where they can be removed quickly. Be sure to include a label with your name, grade, & county. Choose one of the topics listed below, appropriate for your grade in school, & use that name for your title. Titles must be in the front of the poster or box.

- You may purchase your specimens & display rocks, fossils, & minerals. If you purchase a specimen, indicate when & where you purchased it & the location where you would expect to find the specimen. If you collect a specimen, indicate the county & township where you found it.
- Posters & display boxes will be exhibited standing up at the Indiana State Fair. Therefore, you need to mount your specimens securely. Project leaders suggest the following methods: soaking ½ cotton ball in Elmer's glue, hot glue or clear tub sealant. Place the cotton ball in your box & put your rock (or fossil or mineral) on the cotton ball & let sit. It will take 1-2 weeks for Elmer's glue to fully harden. Specimens mounted with Elmer's glue can be removed by soaking the cotton ball in water. Glue remaining on the rock may be brushed off with an old, damp toothbrush.
- When exhibiting rocks, show a fresh surface to help judges identify the rock.
- Do not identify your specimens any further than phylum and class. There is one exception to this – for fossils which are identified to phylum OR class. Class should only be used for fossils of mollusks, backboned animals, and arthropods.

Record Sheet must be signed by your leader prior to judging.

Level 1 (Grade 3-5) – Display a poster (or use an exhibit box) based on one of the following activities:

- The Rock Cycle. (Activity 2). Explain the rock cycle using both words and pictures.
- Rock Types (Activities 2-4). Display rocks from the three major types: igneous, sedimentary, & metamorphic. Examples of each include: Igneous - granite, basalt, gabbro; Sedimentary - limestone, dolomite, shale, chert, gypsum; & Metamorphic - quartzite, schist, marble, slate.
- How Rocks Change (Activity 4) Color & display picture in your book or draw & color your own on poster. Briefly describe earth processes shown.
- Rock Artwork (Activity 12). Display your rock artwork and the story that you created.
- Collections. (Activity 11). Display and identify 8 rocks.
- Making Crystal Models. (Activities 14 & 15). Display crystal forms characteristic of most minerals (cubic, tetragonal, hexagonal, orthorhombic, monoclinic, triclinic) in a display box with their name & mineral with this form. You may color, paint, or use markers on your crystal models.
- Molds & Casts. (Activities 16 & 17). Display 3 molds &/or casts in a display box. Describe steps you followed to create a mold or cast.

Level 2 (Grade 6-8) - Display a poster (or use an exhibit box) based on one of the following activities:

- Rocks with Different Textures. Identify and display six rocks with three very different textures (two rocks of each general type). Include three grades of sandpaper and show how the differences in sandpaper are similar to the differences in rock texture.
- Indiana Limestone. Show and label pictures or photographs of ten buildings, sculptures, or monuments made from Indiana limestone.
- Mineral properties and tests. Explain the characteristics: crystal form, cleavage, hardness, appearance, and streak. Explain tests used in identifying specimens. Examples you might include are streak, acid, hardness, chemical analysis, and specific gravity.
- How We Use Minerals. Show 10 common products that contain minerals. Explain the minerals that are contained in these products and the characteristic that makes them useful.
- Geologic Time. Create a display to show the major geologic eras. Indicate the names, specific features, and approximate length of each.
- Indiana's Glaciers. Show the extent of Indiana's three main glaciers.
- Indiana Geology. Exhibit a map or sketch of Indiana showing at least ten sites with interesting geological formations. Describe the formation and sketch or show a picture of the formation.
- Field Trip. Describe a geology field trip you took. Describe where you went & what you learned. Include photographs or sketch what you saw.
- Collections. Display and identify 1 of the following: 8-16 minerals, fossils, or 4-8 of each (half minerals and half fossils). You may exhibit a new collection in subsequent years but not one you have already exhibited.

Level 3 (Grade 9-12) - Display a poster (or use an exhibit box) based on one of the following activities:

- Geology Research. Prepare a display to teach others about the topic studied. Include an appropriate title, abstract (brief description of your topic), and photographs, drawings, charts, or graphs that help explain your topic. This activity may be repeated if a new topic is chosen in subsequent years.
- Lapidary and Jewelry. Show how stones and minerals are turned into polished stones and jewelry. Show and explain the steps involved.
- Miniatures-Display 5 miniatures in a display box & explain the benefits of collecting miniatures & how they are prepared.
- Indiana's State Parks or Forests. Create a matching game of Indiana's State Parks or Forests and a brief description. This exhibit should include geological features of the park or forest.
- Indiana, US, or World Geology. Teach others about one Indiana, U.S., or World Geology topic.
- Career Exploration. Prepare a display that explains your interview with someone who needs an understanding of geology to do their job.

Level 3 Independent Study

- Advanced topic - Learn all you can about a geology topic and present it on a poster. Include a short manuscript, pictures, graphs, and list the works cited to describe what you did and what you learned. Title your poster, "Advanced Geology – Independent Study."
- Mentoring - Exhibit a poster that shows how you mentored a younger 4-H member. Include your planning, the time you spent, the challenges and advantages of mentoring, and how the experience might be useful in your life. Photographs and other documentation are encouraged. Resources must be from educational or government entities. Title your poster, "Advanced Geology - Mentor."

Indiana 4-H exhibit options are not listed in the manual. Please use this handbook for exhibit guidelines.

Members at each level may choose from 3 exhibit categories: furniture item & notebook, design board (poster), or portfolio (notebook). Level 3 members have a 4th choice: independent study. NOTE: Each level has several options per category from which to choose. We suggest 4-Hers either choose a different option each year or show how they expanded on the same option (portfolio & furniture categories only) used in previous years.

**Furniture Item & Notebook Category** – actual piece of furniture accompanied by a notebook (3-ring binder) explaining the who, what, when, where, why, & how of the chosen project. We suggest including pictures showing where the item will be used. 4-H members are encouraged (but not required) to include pictures of themselves doing the project. Always place your identification information in the notebook and on the furniture.

**Design Board & Notebook Category:** See Page 8 for poster/design board rules. The notebook is to help explain the who, what, when, where, why, and how of the chosen design. This can be a “before and after project” or “plan in the future” project.

**Portfolio Category:** standard notebook (3-ring binder). If doing this option more than 1 year, keep previous year’s materials in the notebook. Place current year’s materials in the front, clearly mark/label previous year’s materials at the back. Place your identification information in the notebook.

### Other Information:

**Color samples** - These can be paint samples from a paint or hardware store, or color samples the 4-H member makes with paints or colored pencils. **Other samples** – Many hardware or home improvement stores have free samples of wall coverings, flooring, countertops, and cabinet materials that can be used with the 4-H member’s design board or portfolio.

**Colored pencils** – We suggest using colored pencils when coloring the design board or portfolio. Professionals use colored pencils! Keep in mind that the entire area does not need to be colored in, but be sure to apply enough color to adequately express design ideas. Other methods for coloring will also be accepted. These could include (but are not limited to): crayons, watercolor pencils, markers, or printing on the computer.

### Level 1

**Furniture options** – exhibit any of the following items demonstrating color, texture, and/or line and shape that would help complete a room. Include your notebook. (See “Furniture Item and Notebook” explanation above.)

- A hanging or wall hanging item
- Storage or organizer item for room or home
- 3-5 accessory items for your chosen room

**Design Board options** –

- Color the line drawing found in your manual title *Color, Texture, Line, & Shape* with colored pencils. Print a line drawing from options available at: [www.four-h.purdue.edu](http://www.four-h.purdue.edu) under “projects” then Home Environment. Create 3 different color schemes for the line drawing chosen. Label the type of color scheme used in each (e.g., monochromatic, analogous, complementary, warm, or cool). Include your 3-ring notebook.
- Color the line drawing found in your manual title *Color, Texture, Line, and Shape* using one color option. Print a line drawing from the options available at [www.four-h.purdue.edu](http://www.four-h.purdue.edu) look under “projects” then Home Environment. Use color to explain dominant & supportive colors. Attach color samples to identify two additional color options. Include your 3-ring notebook.
- Display a bedroom floor plan showing line & shape where furniture will be placed (can be your own). Include pictures (magazine/photos) of furniture to be used. You may use graph paper to get close to scale & show how line & shape work with furniture. Include your 3-ring notebook.

**Portfolio options** –

- Collect different color scheme samples (minimum 3). Label type represented by each (i.e. monochromatic/analogous/complementary/warm/cool).
- Collect magazine or photo samples of formal vs informal balance, dominant & supportive color, & pattern use. Include comments explaining each.

- Kitchen (include appliances & sink). Include pictures (magazine, brochure, or photos). We suggest using graph paper to get the drawing close to scale & to show furniture placement. Include paint &/or wall-treatment, flooring & cabinet &/or countertop samples. Include 3-ring notebook.

**Portfolio options** –

- Samples of 3 types of wall treatments & explanation for each including but not limited to: paint only, wallpaper only, wallpaper/paint combination.
- Samples of 3 different floor treatments (pictures or flooring samples). Examples can include but are not limited to: hardwood, carpet, &/or tile. Include information on advantages & disadvantages of each. Include information on where it would be appropriate to use each flooring type.

- Samples of three different cabinet/countertop combinations (pictures or samples). Examples can include but not limited to: granite, laminate, and/or stainless steel. Include information about the advantages and disadvantages of each.

#### **Requirements:**

- All images are to be original images taken by the 4-H member.
- Number photo print boards 1 to 10 and slides 1 to 12.
- The same photo may not be used in more than one exhibit.
- Salon prints are one print, either Black & White or Color, printed horizontally or vertically from any size negative. The print must be mounted on a standard 16" x 20" salon mount, displayed vertically and covered with plastic.
- If an image is digitally altered beyond what can be done on the enlarger, i.e. adding different background, removing buildings or people, adding text, hand-coloring, etc. it must be entered in the "Creative/Experimental" class.
- Captions under photographs &/or fluorescent posters are not recommended.
- Photos must have been taken since the previous year's county fair judging
- Sepia photos (mono chromatic) are entered in Black & White classes.

#### **Mounting and Labeling:**

- The mounting may be of any color or texture. The pictures are to be neatly and securely mounted. Dry mounting tissue is best.
- Salon mounts are available in photo & art supply stores either in plain or with a picture area cutout or make your own. Matting not required.

Level 1: ALL Photos must be mounted on a background board 22" x 28", displayed horizontally, on stiff backing covered with plastic.

Non-Wearable: Simple pillow sham with lapped back opening & purchased pillow form (see manual) OR simple tote bag with handles or drawstring or similar sewn article.

*Grade 4* - Include at least 2 skills listed in manual.

Wearable: Shorts, pants, or skirt with waistband or facing, or partial elastic waistband (not full elastic band) OR simple shirt or top OR BBQ apron or similar sewn clothing article made to be worn by the 4-H member or another person.

Non-Wearable: Shaped pillow with curved seams, stuffed and sewn closed OR hanging pocket organizer OR bound edge placemats (set of 4) or similar sewn article.

### **Level B: Exhibit Requirements:**

### **Category Descriptions:**

*Informal or Casual:* A complete outfit of 1 or 2 pieces suitable for school, weekend, casual or informal.

*Dress-up:* Suitable for special, church, or social occasions not considered to be formal. It may be an outfit of one or more pieces with or without its own costume coat or jacket (lined or unlined). This is not an outfit which would be worn to school, weekend, casual, or informal activities.

*Suit or coat:* The suit consists of 2 pieces including a skirt or pants & its own lined jacket. It is not a dress with jacket as in "dress up wear." The coat is a separate lined coat. It will be judged separately as a coat with its own accessories.

*Separates:* Consists of 3 garments that must be worn as a coordinated complete outfit with each piece versatile enough to be worn with other garments

*Formal wear:* This outfit may be one or more pieces suitable for any formal occasion, such as proms, weddings, and formal evening functions.

*Free Choice:* A complete outfit comprised of garments, which do not fit in the other classifications. Examples include: tennis wear, swim wear athletic or sportswear; lounge wear; riding habits; historic, dance, theatrical or international costumes, capes; and unlined coats.

### **Fashion Revue Scripts due JUNE 25 to Extension Office**

1. Complete & return an outfit description form at judging check-in. Forms are available on the Purdue Extension Wabash County Website.
2. A Jr. Division Champion will be selected in each Fashion Revue Category for grades 3-7.
3. Senior Division; grades 8-12 - The judges may name one Champion and one Reserve Champion in each of the six categories: informal or casual Wear, dress-up, free choice, suit or coat, separates, and formal wear.
4. Senior Fashion Revue contestants may exhibit 1 outfit in each of the 6 categories. (NOTE: only 1 sewing wearable construction entry is permitted.) One State Fair entry will be chosen per category. Outfit descriptions should be completed & submitted for each outfit exhibited. If you have opted to participate in more than one fashion revue category, you must indicate your preferred state fair entry upon check-in at county fashion revue judging.
5. To be announced as winner/alternate, the 4-H'er must participate in the public revue at the fair. The exception would be in case of extreme emergency.
6. All 4-H'ers participating in the public fashion revue will receive special blue fashion revue ribbons.
7. ALL fashion revue exhibits will remain after judging, **Tuesday, July 13**, in order to be displayed at the fairgrounds.
8. Each piece of clothing must be tagged with exhibitor's name before leaving the Honeywell Center.
9. Garments modeled must have been made by contestants since the last Wabash County 4-H Fair.
10. Costumes to be worn in the State 4-H Fashion Revue cannot be exhibited in the State Fair 4-H Clothing Exhibit.
11. State Fair: a. A contestant may only participate at State Level in 1 category per year.  
b. Each county can send six participants to the State 4-H Fashion Revue (maximum two per category). On the county level, if there are no entries in a category, counties may send a second participant to the State Fashion Revue from another category.

  - Title exhibit with 1 of the following: Archery, Outdoor Skills, Muzzle-loading, Pistol, Rifle, Shotgun, or Shooting Sports. You may use a subtitle.

### **IMPORTANT EXHIBIT NOTES:**

- Firearms or ready to shoot bows are not allowed to be exhibited. Unstrung bows are permissible.
- Live ammunition is not allowed to be exhibited (no powder or primer)
- Modern broadhead arrows are not allowed to be exhibited
- An arrow with its arrowhead attached must be displayed in a secure case. An arrowhead without the arrow attached must be displayed in a secure case. An arrow may be displayed unsecured if its arrowhead is removed. Modern arrows are not allowed to be exhibited.
- Displays involving firearms/bows may be exhibited as a photographic display on a poster or in a notebook following grade level guidelines
- Handmade items must include information explaining how the project was made and its intended use. Photos are encouraged.

**Level 1:** Exhibit a poster showing what was learned in the 4-H Shooting Sports project.

**Level 2:** Choose one of the following options.

1. Poster
2. Small project or model no larger than 18"x18"x36"
3. Notebook, showing how a Shooting Sports item was made, or project completed.
4. To complete project, a two page report must be turned into project leader with record book.

**Level 3:** Choose one of the following options.

1. Poster
2. Project or model (any size) and explanation of costs and procedure.
3. Notebook, showing how a shooting sports item was made, or project completed.

This project includes animals that are raised at home as a pet such as, but not limited to: gerbil, rat, mouse, guinea pig, exotic bird, turtle, non-venomous reptile, potbellied pig, ferret, hamster, fish, cat, dog, & rabbit (If NOT already entered as Dog or Rabbit project). It does not include any wild animal or animal that is controlled or illegal to possess. Care for your pet. Keep record of cost, food, and care. Complete record book. Develop a poster using information from care books, internet sites, veterinarian, pet store and pamphlets. (See Poster Requirements on page 8.)

### **Beginner**

*Grade 3:* Basic Pet Needs and Grooming of Your Pet

*Grade 4:* Animal Body Parts – Describe your pet’s body parts. Do any of these parts serve a purpose or function? i.e. turtle shell (protection), wings (to fly), feathers (to maintain body temperature), etc.

*Grade 5:* Diet – Explain your animal’s diet, nutritional needs and what you feed your animal.

### **Intermediate**

*Grade 6:* Handling Your Pet – Since you carry & hold small pets frequently, it is important to know how. Explain proper handling procedures for your pet. Explain improper handling & why this can have negative effects for your pet.

*Grade 7:* Shopping for Pets – Show cost comparison for your pet’s supplies. You could include items such as: bedding (shavings), food, cage/aquariums, toys, food & water dishes, housing, etc. You could get information from pet stores, books, magazines, etc.

*Grade 8:* The Digestive System – Describe your animal’s digestive system by showing and explaining the parts.

### **Advanced**

*Grade 9:* Diseases – Explore diseases your animal is susceptible to & preventative measures to be taken &/or treatments.

*Grade 10:* Taxonomy – Are there different breeds or varieties of your kind of pet? Describe the characteristics and traits for your kind of animal. Describe any animals that are similar to yours and share the differences.

*Grade 11:* Health care for animals/Dealing with loss – Explore health care options for your animal, look at yearly vet visits and/or how people emotionally deal with the death of an animal/pet.

*Grade 12:* Vital Signs – Explain normal temperature, pulse rate, & respiratory rates (or ranges) for your pet. Other ideas to include on your poster are: take the body temperature, pulse rate, & respiration rate of your pet one time each week for 8 weeks; graph the results. Select a disease that would affect your pet’s vital signs. Write a brief summary about the disease & how to prevent it.

## **STATE FAIR**

- Entry deadlines for State Fair: **May 15, 2021**- Beef, Dairy, Sheep, Swine, Horse and Pony, Dogs, Goats, Poultry, and Rabbits
  - All livestock going to State Fair, must complete a State Fair 4-H Animal Affidavit & have it notarized.
  - Refer to the Indiana State Fair Website or the Purdue Extension office for more specific information. [www.indianastatefair.com](http://www.indianastatefair.com)
- All animals exhibited at the 4-H Fair must meet Board of Animal Health (BOAH) requirements. Requirements are updated annually.
  - General animal health requirements may be found below with specie specific information found within the rules pertaining to that specie.

## **ANIMAL HEALTH REQUIREMENTS FOR EXHIBITION OF DOMESTIC ANIMALS IN INDIANA 2017**

### **GENERAL REQUIREMENTS FOR ALL SPECIES - BOAH**

The following describes the Indiana State animal health requirements for all animal exhibitions in the state. HOWEVER, exhibition organizers may impose additional animal health requirements as a condition of entry. BOAH recommends contacting exhibition organizers for information about requirements for each event. Call **Indiana State Board of Animal Health at 1-877-747-3038** with questions concerning animal health requirements.

**A. Limitations on Exhibition:** This section describes limitations on exhibiting animals in Indiana. There may be other exhibition limitations that are described in the specific species requirements.

1. Failure to meet all animal health requirements will result in removal of animals from the exhibition premise.
2. The following animals are not eligible for exhibition in Indiana:
  - a. Animals that originate from a herd that is under quarantine.
  - b. Any animal classified as a brucellosis "suspect".
  - c. Animals showing symptoms of any infectious or communicable disease or that are a health hazard to persons or other animals.
  - d. Any animal that does not meet state animal health requirements.
4. Any animal developing/showing signs of infectious/communicable disease during exhibition must be removed from the premise and surrounding exhibition grounds. Owners disputing exclusion of their animal from exhibition may not exhibit the animal in question pending appeal.

The State Veterinarian is authorized to make the final determination as to an animal's eligibility for exhibition. The state veterinarian may order removal of any animal from exhibition ground. Exhibition organizers may impose health requirements in addition to those prescribed by BOAH. Added requirements may not contradict requirements imposed by BOAH. Exhibition organizers may have a licensed and accredited veterinarian review animals and animal health documentation during the exhibition.

### **B. Certificates of Veterinary Inspection (CVI)**

1. **For animals that originate in Indiana**, contact the exhibition organizer to determine the CVI requirement, if any.
  2. **For animals that originate outside the State of Indiana**, the exhibitor must have a properly completed CVI (commonly known as "health papers") for the animal. This CVI requirement applies to the following types of animals:
    - a. All animals of the family Bovidae, (cattle, sheep, goats, and buffalo)
    - b. All animals of the family Equidae, (horses and donkeys)
    - c. All animals of the family Suidae, (domestic and feral swine)
    - d. All animals of the family Cervidae, (deer and elk)
    - e. All animals of the family Camelidae, (camels, llamas, and alpacas)
- A CVI on any animal coming from outside Indiana for exhibition in Indiana is valid for 30 days from the date it is issued.
3. CVIs accompanying animals for exhibition must be completed by a licensed & accredited veterinarian who has personally inspected the animals & must clearly include a description of each animal including the age, sex, and breed of the animal, and the official identification for each animal.
  4. Certificates of Veterinary Inspection for all out-of-state swine & cattle going to the Indiana State Fair must have the import permit number for the 2020 Indiana State Fair, "INSF", written on the certificate.
  5. A copy of the official CVI for each animal exhibited must be on file at the state veterinarian's office prior to the opening day of the exhibition.

**C. Identification:** All exhibition animals must be permanently and individually identified by an acceptable method. Please refer to specie rules.

**D. Testing:** All tests required for exhibition must be conducted at the Animal Disease Diagnostic Laboratory (ADDL) at Purdue University, a laboratory approved by the Indiana Board of Animal Health or a state-federal-approved laboratory.

## **Indiana 4-H Guidelines for Animal Exhibits**

1. 4-H animals are expected to be in the possession and regular care of the 4-H member who owns/leases them from the animal ID deadline until the conclusion of the county and/or state fair.
2. For 4-H breeding animals: family corporations and/or partnerships of 4-H members with one or more parents, siblings, grandparents, aunts, uncles, or legal guardians are acceptable.
3. For 4-H dairy cattle: family corporations and/or partnerships of the 4-H member with unrelated persons or dairy operations are also acceptable.
4. Dairy heifers, horses, ponies, and llamas may be leased subject to approval of both the county 4-H dairy, horse and pony, or llama committee and the respective County Extension Educator.
5. 4-H animals exhibited after the animal ID deadline (April 1 for market steers and May 15 for all other animals) at any show by anyone other than the person whose 4-H enrollment record is connected to the ID of the animal in Indiana 4HOnline will not be eligible to be shown in the 4-H show at the Indiana State Fair. This term/condition does not apply to siblings and parents, who may show each other's animals at any show during the year without jeopardizing State Fair eligibility. This policy applies to all 4-H animal projects. For animal projects without ID deadlines, the person who enters them in the Indiana State Fair 4-H show is the equivalent of the owner of the animals.
6. 4-H animals purchased, sold or offered for sale after the ID deadline and prior to the Indiana State Fair (including animals that have gone through a "Premium Only Auction"), shall not be eligible to show in the 4-H show at the Indiana State Fair. Sale of products of animals (milk, cheese, wool, etc.) in lieu of the animal, are considered equivalent to a "Premium Only Auction."
7. To exhibit beef cattle, dairy cattle, swine, sheep, meat goats, dairy goats, poultry and rabbits, 4-H members must be certified through the Youth for the Quality Care of Animals program. This is an annual program that can be completed via online modules or in-person trainings. For more information about in- person trainings in your county, please contact your County Extension Office.



## **Wabash County General Livestock Requirements**

Exhibitors who do not cooperate with State and/or Wabash County Livestock Rules may be barred from showing by the 4-H Council.

**PLEASE NOTE: WHILE THE 4-H ENROLLMENT DEADLINE FOR ALL PROJECTS IS JANUARY 15, 2021. ADDITIONAL ANIMAL IDENTIFICATION REQUIREMENTS MUST BE MET FOR EACH LIVESTOCK SPECIES. ANIMAL ID MUST BE COMPLETED BY DATES INDICATED. SEE INDIVIDUAL SPECIES INFORMATION FOR DETAILS. Penalty: Failure to complete animal identification in 4HOnline and YQCA certification will result in 4-H member's ineligibility to show that specie at county fair and state fair. A visit by the Extension Educator accompanied by an approved 4-H volunteer may be scheduled to verify your project is under your daily care. A follow-up visit may occur prior to the fair.**

**While on the fairgrounds the superintendent and/or committee members and/or 4-H Council, and/or 4-H Extension Educator reserve the right to interpret and enforce any rules or violation of rules and determine penalties for rules infractions in accordance the Wabash County Rules and Policy Enforcement Section in this handbook.**

### **COMPLETE PRIOR TO FAIR**

1. Turn in a completed 4-H livestock worksheet for each specie you're enrolled in by **June 25**. 4-H families receive 1 resource book per family the first year a member is in enrolled in a specie. Use resource books to help answer worksheet questions.
2. Members in ALL species will register all exhibits at [wabashcounty.fairentry.com](http://wabashcounty.fairentry.com) by **June 25**.
3. Complete YQCA (Youth for the Quality Care of Animals) Certification Program by **June 25**.

### **FAIR SET-UP/CHECK-IN**

4. Any 4-H member interested in a tent spot will sign up for a spot beginning at 8:00a.m. on **Saturday, July 10**. A single line will form for tent spots and extra swine pen sales. No one is permitted to go on the fairgrounds before 5:00a.m. to form this line. EACH PERSON IN LINE MAY REPRESENT ONLY ONE 4-H FAMILY. (FAMILY IS DEFINED AS ANYONE WITHIN A SINGLE FAMILY PROFILE IN 4-HONLINE.) When it is your turn, you will be asked if you want to purchase an extra swine pen, reserve a tent spot, or both. A single family is NOT eligible to reserve greater than a 20 foot span of tent space. If you do not attend on **July 10**, any available tent spaces may still be reserved beginning **July 15 at 5:00 p.m.** No boxes, bedding, supplies, tents etc. are permitted to be set-up on the grounds until **7:00 PM Thursday, July 15**. Permanent tents may be erected along the west and south fences of the livestock barns from **5 – 10:00 PM on Thursday, July 15**. 4-H members arriving on grounds prior to **7:00 pm** will stay north of the fairgrounds creek (AKA: ditch) until **5:00 p.m.** During tent set-up, there will be no unloading of any items from outside of the fence off Gillen Ave. on the south side of the fairgrounds.
5. Livestock trailers should not be on fairgrounds property unless it is your specie's designated check-in or release day. In addition, on those days, trailers should remain north of the ditch until times specified on pages 2 & 3 of this handbook.
6. 4-H animals will be physically inspected prior to entering the barn and may be rejected or removed for health issues at any time during the fair.

### **BARN EXPECTATIONS**

7. **PER FIRE MARSHALL – ONLY 12 GAUGE EXTENSION CORDS CAN BE USED IN THE BARN. ANY EXTENSION CORDS THAT ARE NOT 12 GAUGE WILL BE REMOVED BY THE FAIR BOARD IN ORDER TO BE IN COMPLIANCE WITH FIRE CODES.**
8. A 4-H'er must put manure in places designated for that purpose.
9. 4-Hers must keep aisles clean and clear. Unreasonable size boxes and equipment and number of bales of hay or straw will not be allowed. Fair boxes in the hog aisles can be no larger than 4 feet by 2 feet.
10. No hanging apparatuses are permitted in the pens.
11. Lamb stands and cattle chutes are not to be erected in the barn aisles between 6:00 PM and 10:00 PM Monday through Friday.
12. Self-supporting tents i.e. no ropes or stakes, may be erected between livestock barns the morning of the show and must be taken down within one hour after the show.
13. 4-H exhibitors are asked to be mindful of other livestock shows going on during the week of the fair and be courteous of livestock and exhibitors when it comes to using the wash racks while other species are showing.

### **ANIMAL CARE**

14. Grooming of all livestock on the fairgrounds is limited to currently enrolled Indiana 4-H members, their immediate family members and approved Wabash County 4-H adult volunteers. Immediate family is defined as those family members included as sibling, parents, guardians in the member's 4HOnline Family Profile. When completing Fair Entry, members must submit the names and the current Indiana County of 4-H enrollment of 4-H members who will be providing grooming assistance at the Wabash 4-H Fair. Wristbands will be issued by the superintendent or designated person the day of show. ID is required and the band must be worn upon receipt. If rule is broken, the penalty is that the animal will not show. Grooming does not include holding halter, controlling animal and keeping animal, 4-Her and/or public safe.
15. All animals must meet all health requirements listed in the 4-H Handbook. (Refer to BOAH section on previous page and with each specie)
16. No sick livestock will be allowed to quarter on the show grounds.
17. 4-Hers must keep their own stalls or pens clean and will furnish feed and bedding for their own livestock.
18. Tie outs for calves will be permitted from 9:00 PM - 7:30 AM. Animals may be exercised in the horse arena between **9:00 PM and 10:30 PM**.
19. Indoor show arena will not be used for exercising of animals before or after shows at any time, unless authorized by Department Superintendent.
20. No oral or nasal medications or injections will be allowed to be given on the fairgrounds unless administered by a registered veterinarian. A livestock committee member and 4-H council member must also be present when medications are administered.
21. The use of a drenching tool is prohibited. Premanufactured tube of paste are allowed.

### **LIVESTOCK SHOWS**

22. RIBBONS-Livestock 4-H exhibits will be judged in first through fifth placings. Only Blue Ribbon animals or exhibits may compete for champion.
23. An animal may be exhibited by only one 4-H member (except Horse and Pony).

### **REMOVAL OF LIVESTOCK EQUIPMENT/ANIMAL CHECK-OUT**

24. No livestock is to leave the grounds outside of the time allowed in 4-H Handbook **unless deemed necessary by the livestock superintendent or the 4-H Extension Educator.**

25. Animal Release times – ALL Species are free to release at any of the following times:

Wednesday – STATE FAIR LIVESTOCK RELEASE – 8 pm to 11:00 pm (pending completion of swine show).

State Fair Livestock ONLY may release with proof of State Fair Enrollment (e-mail receipt either printed or on phone is acceptable). Livestock and equipment load out will all occur at the west end of the Show Arena.

Thursday – Livestock - 5:00 am -7:00 am

ALL Livestock – 8 pm to 11:00 pm (Livestock & equipment loadout will all occur at west end of Show Arena.)

26. Vehicles are allowed south of the horse and pony make-up arena for removal of livestock equipment from 5-7 am and 10-11 pm.

27. 4-H members must put manure in one of the three designated places around the buildings. When livestock is released, the 4-Her must completely clean own stall or pen and dispose of manure properly.

### **Showmanship Rules**

1. Showmanship divisions are determined by grade: Rookie – grade 3; Juniors - grades 4, 5, 6; Intermediates - grades 7, 8, 9; Seniors - grade 10 & up  
\*\*Exceptions Rabbit Ambassador and Horse & Pony follow State Fair guidelines.

\*A 4-Her may win showmanship only once in each division; not including Supreme Showmanship. Winners must advance to the next division the following year or wait for their specific grade division. The exceptions are Horse & Pony and Rabbits which follow State Fair Guidelines.

2. Prior Round Robin winners may compete in their appropriate grade level of species in which they did not qualify for Round Robin, but are ineligible to compete in the Round Robin competition if named the winner

3. In all species, the animal used in the showmanship class **must be identified within the 4-H member's family profile in 4HOnline.**

### **Supreme Showmanship**

4. Exhibitors include Rookie, Junior, Intermediate, & Senior division winners plus past Senior and Supreme winners.

5. Past Supreme winners may only compete in the Supreme division for that species in future years.

6. Past Round Robin winners may compete in Supreme Showmanship in the species in which they qualified for Round Robin but are ineligible to compete in the Round Robin competition, if named the winner. The alternate, if not a prior Round Robin winner, will advance to the Round Robin competition. A third or fourth placing may be necessary.

7. \*In the event that the winner of Supreme Showmanship either opts out of the Round Robin competition or is ineligible to compete in Round Robin as outlined previously, the Round Robin t-shirt will be awarded to the Round Robin competitor. The trophy will remain with the winner of the class.

### **Round Robin Showmanship**

**Committee Members: Livestock Superintendents of All Species**

1. Judging: Thursday, **5:00 p.m.** Round Robin Participants are to report to the Show Arena at **4:45 p.m.**

2. Six Supreme Showmen: Beef, Dairy, Goats, Horse & Pony, Sheep, Swine. One participant per specie.

3. Participants will be Supreme Showman or Alternate Supreme Showman of each specie. If a participant wins more than one specie, he/she will choose which specie he/she will represent. The alternate will then be allowed to represent the other specie.

4. ALL past winners of the Round Robin competition will be ineligible to compete again in the Round Robin competition for the remainder of their 4-H eligibility in Wabash County.

5. Animals used in the Round Robin classes will be chosen by the superintendent of each specie. All necessary show equipment will be provided. Participants' animals or their family's animals (brother, sister, stepbrother, and/or stepsister) will not be used.

6. Horses will be available 1 hour prior to the contest.

7. Each participant will be required to show all six species. There will be a random draw for each participant's animal.

8. Participants will remain in the show arena at all times during the contest; upon entering the show arena participants are not allowed to speak to anyone except the judge.

9. If any problems arise, the 4-H Council's decision will be final.

### **COMPLETE PRIOR TO FAIR**

- ALL beef must attend ID day and be in possession and under the daily care of the 4-H Member by the Identification Deadlines specified above.
- All animals must be properly dehorned, to be exhibited at the fair, except when required to register. (Veal calves should not be dehorned.)
- All male calves must be castrated or clamped **by ID Day for Market Steers and by Fair for Feeder Calves.**
- County Born & Bred, Feeder Calves, and Rate of Gain exhibits will comply with ALL beef department rules unless otherwise stated.
- Submit a photocopy of the registration to the Extension Office prior to June 25 for Steers and Heifers. Animals without copies of registration on file by those dates will show in the cross class.**
- There will be a beef project meeting prior to the Wabash County 4-H Fair. 4-H members who attend the meeting in its entirety will be able to select their pen space for the Wabash County 4-H Fair.**

**FAIR CHECK-IN:** Entry and Weighing\* **Sunday, July 18, 12:00-3:00 PM** for ALL beef.

\* Please note Minimum weight for Market Steers is 800 lbs.

- Type of bedding will be 4-H Member's choice
- There is no limit on the total number of steers or heifers that may be shown at the county fair. See Feeder Calves & County Bred & Born rules for maximum entry numbers in those areas.
- Registered Steers & Heifers must have registration papers meeting State Fair breed purity requirements; otherwise they'll be considered crossbred.
  - A breed registration certificate from the breed registry must be presented at fair check-in. No photocopies will be accepted.**
  - All purebred females and steers must be registered in the 4-H member's name by the breed registry
  - All breeding heifers with registration papers and breed purity requirements will show in respective breed classes. All heifers that do not meet purity requirements will show as crossbred heifers and by weight. All heifers must be permanently identified with a tattoo or metal tag.
  - Steers must be entered in the appropriate breed at the time of tagging and identification in February. All steers showing as a specific breed must have a readable ear tattoo at the time of tagging and weighing.
  - Breed changes at the fair must be made before leaving the scales at check-in Sunday. After cattle are checked-in, no breed changes can be made. If cattle are designated as purebred, they can only be switched to crossbred. Cattle may not be switched from one purebred to another.

**FAIR JUDGING (BEEF SHOW) Judging: Monday, July 19 at 8:00 AM** Note: The gate to the show ring will close 1½ minutes after the last call for a class.

- Animals must meet all Health requirements listed in the 4-H Handbook.
- Market animals will show by breed in their respective class. Acceptable breed types include all breeds shown at the Indiana State Fair 4-H show.
- Combination of heifer/steer classes within a breed may be made to obtain at least three animals in a class.

- Fitting calves for showmanship is NOT required.

## GENERAL EXPECTATIONS FOR MEMBERS SHOWING BEEF DURING FAIR

15. All members will be expected to double tie at the assigned stall with NECK STRAP OR ROPE AND A SUBSTANTIAL HALTER. If you have no neck strap, one will be provided at your expense and you will need to pay for it prior to the beef show.
16. All fans must be hanging fans (no butt fans); no fans in the aisles. Only one fan per calf may be used at the Fairgrounds.
17. The use of graphite or any color, powdered substance in any form is prohibited.
18. Only hair that is growing naturally on the specific animal in that specific location is acceptable. (i.e. no transplants, tail-fins, etc., may be added.)
19. No artificial filling-no pumping tubes, bottles, etc., will be allowed.
20. Tie outs for calves will be permitted from 9:00 PM to 7:30 AM. Animals may be exercised in the Horse Arena from 9:00-10:30 PM.

## CHECK-OUT PROCEDURES

Stalls must be cleaned out by 4-Hers immediately following livestock release. ALL beef exhibitors must check-out with a 4-H Council Member.

### WABASH COUNTY BRED & BORN CALVES (referred to hereafter as CBB)

- Each 4-H member may show two CBB animals in either the CBB Heifer and/or Steer class so long as all CBB requirements are met.
- Calf must be located in Wabash County at the time it is both BRED & BORN.
- For an animal to be eligible, CBB paperwork must be completed, submitted, and approved at time of weighing/tagging at ID Day.
- ALL CBB entered heifers will show in the CBB heifer "breed" class. Champion CBB heifer will compete for Grand Champion Heifer.
- ALL CBB entered steers will show in the CBB steer "breed" class. Champion CBB steer will compete for Grand Champion Steer.

### FEEDER CALVES

- Feeder calves, steer or heifer, must be born January 1 or after of current project year. Feeder calves will be considered Dairy Feeder Steers, Beef Feeders, or Veal Calves and will NOT be shown by breed. (Dairy Feeder Heifers will exhibit in the Dairy Show.)
- A maximum of 4 feeder calves per 4-H member may be shown at the fair as long as two of the four feeder calves are Veal Calves.
- Calves shall not weigh more than 350 pounds at May weigh-in. Any animal over 350 pounds will not be allowed to compete at the county fair.
- Feeder calves shall not be accompanied by a cow at the fair.
- **Calves must be castrated or clamped by fair.**
- **Calves must be dehorned and healed by fair.**
- A Champion and Reserve Champion will be selected; they will not compete for overall Grand and Reserve Market Animal.

### Veal Calves:

- Each 4-H member may show 2 veal calves.
- 4-Hers enrolled in this project must contact the Extension Office no later than February 1 with how many calves they would like to purchase.
- Veal calves will be purchased as a group and members will draw for their project calf. By purchasing as a group, it ensures that all calves are born within 24 hours of each other and are near the same weight to start the project.
  - Each veal is tagged with a county tag prior to the evening of pick up. Ear tags for all calves are written on a piece of paper and placed in a hat. 4-H members will draw tag numbers to determine their veal calves. Seniors will draw first.
  - All calves will be paid for at time of calf pick-up. Exact cost will be determined close to pick up day. Checks will be made payable to Strauss Veal. Calves will be available for pick-up in mid-February at the Shoemaker home.
- Strauss has an account for each 4Her to buy feed from them. Feed will be available at the time of pick up. It is appreciated if the 4Her would plan ahead and acquire the feed earlier.
- Shots and meds are the 4Her's responsibility. All 4Hers and parents will sign a withdrawal contract. Medication withdrawals need to be followed accordingly. It is a grower affidavit agreement. (Agreement available for review upon request.)
- All veal calves will be picked up from the Wabash County 4-H Fair at a time to be determined and sold at a veal processing plant. ~~They do not go on the truck at the auction. A calf for 4 Hers to walk through the auction.~~
- It is recommended to not de-horn veal calves.

### BEEF RATE OF GAIN

- There is a feeder class for rate of gain and a separate beef steer class for rate of gain.
- Calves must be shown in Wabash County 4-H Beef Show to qualify.
- All calves exhibited will be placed within their breed, according to their daily gain.
- Breed Champions will receive plaques
- Overall Grand and Reserve Rate of Gain

### **BOARD OF ANIMAL HEALTH (BOAH) REQUIREMENTS - SEE GENERAL REQUIREMENTS FOR ALL SPECIES.**

1. No dog may be exhibited showing any symptoms of a communicable disease.
2. Each dog used for exhibition must be accompanied by a certificate of vaccination or other statement signed by a licensed & accredited veterinarian indicating vaccinations each animal was given. A certificate of veterinary inspection may be used to document vaccinations but isn't required.
3. All dogs 3 months of age and over must be vaccinated for rabies by a licensed and accredited veterinarian in accordance with the state rabies vaccination law. A certificate of vaccination for rabies must accompany the animal to the exhibition.

**NOTE: Indiana 4-H Imposes Vaccination Requirements for Dog Show Participants Beyond BOAH Minimum Requirements. Check with the Wabash Co. 4-H Educator for Requirements.** For more info on dog health requirements, call the Indiana BOAH at (317) 544-2387.

#### **Eligibility:**

1. Mixed or pure breed dogs may participate in dog club. Wolf-hybrids cannot meet the vaccination requirement of the Indiana Board of Animals Health and cannot be shown in the 4-H Dog Program.
2. A Certification of Vaccination 4-H 671-W, signed by a Licensed Veterinarian, (original copy is kept with the Record Leader) is required to participate in the Dog Program. A rabies certification is also a required documentation to participate. These are due in March of the current year.
3. Dogs that are infectious, in heat, or has fleas and ticks should not attend the meetings.
4. A record sheet is **required** by the end of the year for completion of the dog project.
5. Dogs are recommended to be 4 months of age at the beginning of training whom have puppy vaccinations completed. Dogs must be 15 months old at the time of the show to participate in agility. Any dog in the club may do showmanship. Leaders will have to approve exceptions to these rules.
6. The dog must live in the same household or be owned by a member of the immediate or extended family by honor system. If you enter for the State Fair, the immediate family must own the dog.
7. The dog handler must be the primary handler and caretaker of their dog during the meetings and at home.
8. Dogs must also exhibit in obedience if they want to participate in showmanship or agility.
9. It is highly expected:
  - A.) the participation in a safety meeting held at the beginning of the year.
  - B.) Scrapbooks of 5 pages each year.
  - C.) The Handler participates at the dog show at the County Fair.
10. Safety is a priority of the Leaders. One parents & dog handler must sign the behavioral policy at the beginning of the year. A copy will be held by the Record Leader & a copy will be given to each dog club member.
11. All county rules take priority over the state rules.
12. Details are in the Rules and Regulation of the dog club.
13. The Dog Club uses a point system to evaluate participation and effort by each handler.

#### **OBEDIENCE CLASSES: Required by all dog handlers to participate in each year.**

**1A** Must be handler's and dogs first year in the 4-H Dog Club with no prior training prior to January 1<sup>st</sup> of the current year (not repeatable).

**1B** Handler or dog has had prior training coming back with a new dog or for handlers with no experience whose dog has been trained. Also, for the 4-H handler who has completed 1A and not ready for 2A (not repeatable for the same dog).

**2A** Handler and dog who has completed 1A or 1B class work (not repeatable with the same dog).

**2B** Handler and dog whose have completed 2A class work but not ready for 3A work. Can only complete for 2 years unless agreeable by leaders. (County rule)

**3A** Handler and dog who has completed 2B class work (not repeatable with the same dog).

**3B** Handler and dog whose has completed 3A class work but not ready for 4A. Can only complete for 2 years unless agreeable by leaders. (County rule)

**4A** Handler and dog who has completed 3B class work (not repeatable with the same dog)

**4B** Handler and dog whose has completed 4A class work but not ready for 5A work. Can only complete for 2 years unless agreeable by leaders. (County rule)

**5A** Handler and dog who has completed 4B class work (not repeatable with the same dog).

**5B** Handler and dog who has completed 5A class work but not ready for 6A work (may repeat until mastered).

**6A** Handler and dog who has completed 5B class work (not repeatable with the same dog).

**6B** Handler and dog who has completed 6A class work (may repeat until mastered).

**Veterans:** For handlers whose dogs are at least 7 years old or physically challenged. The dog must have completed at least 2 years in prior years. Dogs that are physically challenged must have a veterinarian stating that the dog cannot perform jumping and/or retrieving exercises if Leader request. Once the dog has performed in the veteran class, the dog may not return to other obedience classes.

**AGILITY CLASSES: The handler must have 1 year of obedience to participate in agility.**

BEGINNING A: (BA) Handler has not previously participated in Beginning A. Handler uses a 6- foot leash. (Not repeatable).

BEGINNING B: (BB) Handler has participated in agility before, either with the current dog or handler or a different dog or handler.

Exercises must be off leash. Dogs will repeat BB for 2 years unless the Leader decides moving to the next class would be unsafe for dog or handler.

BEGINNING C: (BC) Handler has completed BA yet not ready to go off leash. This class will be on leash with a new dog or experience dog. (Not repeatable) No state level class available. This class will not be available for the Agility Grand Champion award at the County Fair.

INTERMEDIATE A: (IA) Handler has not previously participated in Intermediate Agility. Off leash. (Not repeatable).

INTERMEDIATE B: (IB) Handler has not previously participated in Intermediate Agility before, either with the current dog or a different dog. Dogs can repeat IB for 3 years unless the Leader decides moving to the next class would be unsafe for dog or handler. Off leash.

ADVANCED A: (AA) Handler has not previously participated in Advanced Agility. (Not repeatable). Off leash.

ADVANCED B: (AB) Handler has participated in Advance Agility before, either with the current dog or a different agility. Off Leash. This class is repeatable for 3 years.

EXCELLENT: (EX) Handler has participated in Advance Agility. This is repeatable.

VETERAN: (VET) Dog must at least 7 years old or physically challenged certified by a Licensed Veterinarian if required by the Leader.

Once the dog performs in a Veteran class, the dog must remain a Veteran. The Veteran dog will participate in the last class they last showed in at one lower division. They may move up a class if they desire.

**SHOWMANSHIP CLASSES: The handler must participate in obedience to do showmanship. Any dog handler may do showmanship. Mixed or pure breeds may enter showmanship. A novice class maybe added at the discretion of the Showmanship Leader.**

**Junior showmanship: Grades 3rd, 4<sup>th</sup> & 5<sup>th</sup>**

**Intermediate showmanship: Grades 6<sup>th</sup>, 7<sup>th</sup> or 8<sup>th</sup>**

**Senior showmanship: Grades 9<sup>th</sup>, 10<sup>th</sup>, 11<sup>th</sup> or 12<sup>th</sup>**

High Point Grand Champion: Dog Club uses a point system for all meeting & activities throughout the year. This award is to be given to the dog handler who shows the most effort throughout the year. No scores from Fair count. JR, INTER & Senior High Point Champion per age group.

Obedience Grand Champion: JR, INTER & SR highest obedience score at County Fair.

Agility Grand Champion: Highest agility score with best time at the County Fair.

Showmanship Grand Champion: Highest showmanship score at County Fair.

Special awards: Leadership Award, Wilma Retz Mental Attitude Awards & Senior Awards.

  - ONLY County Tags or Tattoos will be accepted and must be applied to the goat before entering the fairgrounds.
  - FARM TAGS or SCRAPIE TAGS are NOT accepted identification tags for goat identification.
  - No more than one tag &/or tattoo per ear.
  - ONLINE County/State Fair Goat Enrollment MUST be completed at in.4honline.com by **May 15** to be eligible for participation at the fair.
- When registering at wabashcounty.fairentry.com you must declare all classes that each animal will show in.
  - Both goats showing in a Mother/Daughter Class must be registered under the same **family profile in 4HOnline by the May 15 deadline**.
- Pygmy and Dairy Goats going to State Fair must be tattooed. Members with goats that need retinal scanned (Dairy, Boer, &/or Meat Goat Wethers) for State Fair **must contact the goat superintendent by May 1 to schedule an appointment for retinal scanning**.
- 4-H Members with goats needing tagged for county fair will be responsible for tagging their own goats prior to county fair.
  - Tags may be **purchased and picked up** at the Extension Office by **May 15**.
  - County tags are \$1.00 per tag / State Fair Tags additional \$2.00**
  - Taggers may be checked out for a \$50 deposit.
- Dairy goats and Pygmy goats MUST be dehorned. Meat goats may show with horns.
- An exhibitor is limited to a maximum of two (2) entries per class, at the time pen assignments are due.
- If ear tags are lost, the exhibitor should notify the Extension Office immediately to discuss options.

**FAIR CHECK-IN: Entry: Sunday, July 18, ALL Goats 9 AM-12:00 NOON.**

8. Pens will be assigned.
9. No bucks will be allowed to show. This includes visibly intact males.
10. Meat Market goats MUST have their milk teeth. Teeth will be verified at time of check-in.
11. Market goats, of all breeds (excluding Boer/Meat goats), must not have their 3 year- old teeth. Teeth will be verified at time of check-in. Market does may not be shown as a breed animal at a later fair.
12. The use of a drenching tool is prohibited. See general livestock rule #21.
13. Every goat must wear a collar and have a tie chain available if needed. NO SPIKE COLLARS allowed the day of the show at county fair.
14. The Goat Committee reserves the right to sift by breed standards at time of fair check-in. Correct classes will be determined and will be the only changes of classes allowed at check-in. Any animal sifted will show in the meat goat class.

**15. Judging: Tuesday, July 20, 8:00 AM**

16. Best of Show and Reserve Best of Show, of all breeds, will have identification numbers verified. Grand Champion and Reserve Champion Market Goats, of all breeds, will have identification numbers verified
17. SHOW ATTIRE: Pygmy & Meat Goat Exhibitors-It is recommended that a blouse or shirt and jeans or slacks, with a belt, be worn (NO Shorts).  
Dairy Exhibitors-It is recommended that a white blouse/shirt and white pants or skirt/split skirt with a belt be worn (NO Shorts).  
ALL EXHIBITORS-The Exhibitor's midriff is not to be exposed when standing or bending over.

**DETERMINATION OF CLASSES**

18. Goats can only be shown as one classification of goat. (Dairy, Pygmy, or Meat)
19. Dairy goats must be 100% dairy goat breeds, no meat goat crosses. Dairy breeds consist of: Nigerian Dwarf, Toggenburg, Nubian, Saanen, Alpine, Lamancha, Oberhasli, and Sable.
20. Meat goats are any of the following breeds: San Clemente Island goat, Arapawa goat, Spanish goat, Kiko goat, Boer goat, Savanna goat, or Myotonic goat or a cross between any breeds of Meat goats or an animal that has a meat goat in its breeding.
21. Mother/Daughter Class – Mother/Daughter class is judged based on the positive traits a doe passes on to her offspring. To consist of 2 does, any age, so long as 1 is the daughter of the other.
22. Mother/Daughter entries must be entered in individual classes unless the Mother is a prior Best of Show winner, than Mother is only allowed in Mother/Daughter class, but Daughter must show in individual class.

**SHOWMANSHIP**

23. Champion Senior, Intermediate, Junior, and Rookie Goat showman will have the option to show in the Supreme Showmanship class to determine the contestant for the Round Robin competition.

b. A suckling foal accompanying a dam that tested negative for E.I.A. within 12 months of the exhibition is exempt from the E.I.A. testing requirement.		
2. Horses coming from Indiana for exhibition in Indiana: a. A certificate of veterinary inspection is not required. b. An E.I.A. test is not required.

### **COMPLETE PRIOR TO FAIR**

- Any animal exhibited must be shown & owned or leased by the 4-H'er, or owned in partnership with the 4-H member's father, mother, brother, sister, grandparent or legal guardian. Animals shown after the enrollment deadline under different ownership will not be eligible for State Fair.
  - Leased project is any animal not owned by the 4-H member, or not owned in partnership by the 4-H member's family (described above)
  - Absolutely no animal may be substituted or traded for the original animal after May 15.
- Record books and project worksheets must be turned in to the Extension Office by **June 25**.
- No one will show out of a trailer at fair. Horse and Pony check – in and release times for each show day can be found with the show order on the next page in this 4-H Handbook.**
  - Trailers may remain parked on the fairgrounds in the yard north of the ditch and west of the Outdoor Show Arena overnight on Friday, July 16 at the discretion of the Wabash County Fairboard (property owners).
  - On Saturday, July 17 trailers must remain north of the ditch until the conclusion of the Horse & Pony Show. All trailers must be removed from the fairgrounds by 11 p.m. on Saturday, July 17.
  - Stalls will be set up on an as needed basis for fair. It is requested that each 4-H family exhibiting at the fair come to a 4-H Meeting during the month of June/July and help set up stalls.
- Members must pick up their exhibitor numbers at check-in time.

### **GENERAL EXPECTATIONS FOR HORSE & PONY MEMBERS DURING FAIR**

- Stalls will be pre-assigned by the Advisory Committee. 4-H members must furnish their own bedding prior to putting the horse/pony into the stall.
- Club members must clean all stall(s) used by them during meetings and the 4-H Fair.
- No animals will be left unattended outside the barn.
- All 4-H H & P members will be expected to dress accordingly at ALL times when mounted on their animals: minimum of a 4" sleeve shirt, boots with a 1" heel, long pants, and a helmet. (Dress Code Expectations will be followed per Handbook during the 4-H Fair)
- Animals must remain west and north of the livestock show arena unless using picture backdrop – No animal will be led, ridden, or driven past or through the Swine Barns at any time during the 4-H Fair or H & P Club meetings.

**BOARD OF ANIMAL HEALTH (BOAH) REQUIREMENTS - SEE GENERAL REQUIREMENTS FOR ALL SPECIES.**

1. Indiana defines poultry as: chickens, turkeys, ostriches, emus, rheas, cassowaries, waterfowl (domesticated fowl that normally swim such as ducks, geese and swans), and game birds (domesticated fowl such as pheasants, pea fowl, partridge, quail, grouse, and guineas).
2. All poultry presented for exhibition shall be accompanied by an official certificate of veterinary inspection or an appropriate National Poultry Improvement Plan (NPIP) certificate.
3. All poultry presented for exhibition, except waterfowl, must meet one of the following requirements:
  - a. Test negative for pullorum-typhoid within 90 days prior to the date of their exhibition.
  - b. Be hatched from eggs originating from certified NPIP pullorum-typhoid clean flocks.
  - c. Originate from a flock where the entire flock is certified NPIP pullorum-typhoid clean.

2. Breeds/classes must be declared when registering. If necessary, the sheep committee will sift lambs at the 4-H fair; if the lamb does not fit the breed, it will be moved to a crossbred class.
3. The county tag number must be identified when completing animal ID at in.4honline.com by May 15 to be eligible for fair participation.
  - A. ONLY County Tags will be accepted and must be applied to the sheep before entering the fairgrounds.
  - B. FARM TAGS or SCRAPIE TAGS are NOT accepted identification tags for sheep identification.
4. 4-H Members with sheep needing tagged for county fair:
  - 4-H Members will be responsible for tagging their own sheep prior to county fair. (Taggers may be checked out for a \$50 deposit.)
  - Tags may be **purchased** and picked up at the Extension Office by **May 15**.
  - **County tags are \$1.00 per tag / State Fair tags are an additional \$2.00.**
5. Lambs must be born after September 1, and must show their lamb teeth.

**In addition, a report will be filed with the 4-H Council for further disciplinary action.**

### COMPLETE PRIOR TO FAIR

- All 4-H swine are required to be ear notched for the Wabash County 4-H Fair.
- Ear notches entered during online animal ID must match with pigs that come to the fair. Typed ear notches will be used as the primary identifier for all swine exhibited at the Wabash County 4-H Fair. Notches should be typed as Pig's Right Ear – Pig's Left Ear (Example: 21 – 9)
  - When identifying swine in 4HOnline, members will have the option of uploading images of the ear notches for each swine.
  - The photo will be used in the event there is a discrepancy between what is typed into the ear notch field and the actual notches as read by volunteers at county fair check-in. (Images will only be used at county fair...not the Indiana State Fair.)
  - Instruction on obtaining correct angles and views of the ears will be distributed with animal identification instructions in March.
  - Fair exhibitors with incorrect swine ear notches who have chosen NOT to upload images or have uploaded images in a manner that does not follow the instructions distributed in the March ID letter will not be eligible to exhibit at the Wabash County 4-H Fair.
- FOR WABASH COUNTY 4-H FAIR: Animal tag numbers must be identified when completing online animal ID at in.4honline.com by May 15 to be eligible for fair participation. 4-H members will complete the following steps to be eligible for Wabash County 4-H Fair competition.
  - 4-H Members will be responsible for tagging their own swine prior to county fair. (Taggers may be checked out for a \$50 deposit.)  
Tags will be a combo RFID and County Tag, so no additional tags will be needed for State Fair Entries. Tags may be **purchased** and picked up at the Extension Office by **May 15**. **Tags are \$3.00 per tag.**
  - Pick up tags at the Extension Office prior to May 15 in order to correctly ID your swine in 4-H Online.
  - ONLY County RFID Tags will be accepted and must be applied to the swine BEFORE entering the fairgrounds.
  - If assistance is needed in tagging swine, contact any swine committee member prior to June 15 to schedule an appointment.
- All purebred gilts and barrows must be registered in the 4-Hers name, family name, or farm name by the breed registry. A hard copy of the breed registration certificate from the breed registry must be presented at fair check-in. No photocopies or e-mails to the 4-H educator from the breed registry will be accepted, Originals only, or they will be shown as crossbred.
- 4-H members may not knowingly exhibit swine with male characteristics including but not limited to testicular tissue, boar smelling urine, foaming at the mouth, etc.**
  - It is recommended that swine are castrated at 1-2 weeks of age; however, if purchasing a boar, you may castrate up until the May 15 animal identification deadline. (Please follow these practices to optimize your chance of a healthy swine project.)**

### **FAIR CHECK-IN: SUNDAY, JULY 18, 5:00 PM – 10:00 PM**

- 4-Her will need at entry:
  - Registration papers for all Purebred Barrows and Gilts.
  - Entry card with the correct animal information for the animals in the trailer. Please pick-up the entry card from the check-in tent when you pull in line. If the animals in your trailer do not match the notecards provided, return to the tent so corrections can be made. Entry cards are printed immediately following Fair Entry closing on **June 25**. Please make any known changes or adjustments in your Fair Entry account prior to **June 25**.
  - No hogs, with their hair clipped less than 1/2" will be allowed to sell in the group sale. **Hair will be measured at swine check-in.**

### **GENERAL EXPECTATIONS FOR SWINE MEMBERS DURING FAIR**

- One pen will be assigned per 4-H member. ALL pen assignments are final.
  - 4-H members must keep their pigs in the (1) originally assigned pen, (2) purchased pen of the 4-H member, (3) assigned pen of an immediate family member (defined by rule 2 in the State 4-H Guidelines on pg 36 or (4) purchased pen of an immediate family member.
  - If additional pen space is available they will be sold on a 1<sup>st</sup> come basis. One pen per 4-H member at a cost of \$25.00 each starting at **8 a.m.** on at the barn office **on Saturday, July 10**. If there are other pens still available, after the conclusion of the first group, any 4-H member that purchased a pen can also purchase one more additional pen.
  - Each 4-H member will be limited to a total of 3 pens.
  - All pigs must be returned to the 4-H member's originally assigned pen by Thursday at midnight or they will be fined a \$50 fee to be deducted from the auctions check.

**CHECK OUT:** All pens must be cleaned out immediately following livestock release on Thursday.

- Fair Boxes are to be no larger than 4' long x 2' deep. Larger boxes do not allow for flow of traffic and are a safety hazard. Boxes should be placed on top of the pens on shelf provided, if possible.

13. Classes within a breed may be combined to obtain at least 3 entries per class. Only Blue Ribbon animals are eligible for champion awards.
14. Gilts: A maximum of 2 may be exhibited.
  - a. Purebred gilts must have been farrowed on or after January 1 to show in Wabash County.
  - b. Purebred gilts must have valid registration papers which must be present at entry to the swine barn or they will show as crossbred. Registration papers must be registered in 4-Her's name or family farm name. No photocopies. Originals only.
  - c. Purebred gilt classes will be determined after all entries are completed.
  - d. Commercial gilts will be weighed and divided into approximately even classes.
15. Barrows: A maximum of 2 may be exhibited.
  - a. Purebred Barrows must have valid registration papers which must be present at entry to the swine barn or they will show as crossbred. Registration papers must be registered in 4-Her's name or family farm name. No photocopies. Originals only.
  - b. Commercial Barrows will be weighed and classes determined after entries are completed.

16. Each exhibitor is responsible to have his/her own pen cleaned
17. Swine release:

18. Selling of hogs: Barrows or gilts may be sold in the group
  - a. The minimum saleable weight for hogs is set at 210 pounds as a group hog.
  - b. Hogs weighing 209 pounds or less MUST go home.
  - c. No hogs, with their hair clipped less than 1/2" will be allowed to sell in the group sale.
  - d. All hogs going through the group will be tattooed before the auction upon packer's request.

## 4-H Achievement Award Application

Wabash County 4-H utilizes an Achievement Award program based upon The Recognition Model established by the National 4-H Council, rewards positive learning behaviors in youth and is based on the youth's involvement, participation and/or efforts. In addition to being rewarded for peer competition, focusing on the following three parts of the recognition model allows a 4-H member to broaden their experiences.

**Participation:** The achievement process emphasizes the importance of acknowledging young people who participated in 4-H educational experiences. Some examples of these experiences include Purdue Round-up, Science Workshops, Youth Congress, etc.

**Cooperation:** Learning and working together promotes high achievement. Cooperation may take advantage of all the skills represented in the group, as well as the process by which the group approaches the learning task/goal. Achievement in the area of cooperation may include serving as an officer, committee member, service learning participation, etc.

**Progress Toward Goals:** Progress toward goals, no matter how small, is an important part of recognition & achievement. Youth are encouraged to find projects or educational areas of interest that they can stick with on a long-term basis. The achievement process recognizes those who stick with projects over a period of time. Members will monitor goals through completion of an Achievement Award Application.

A 4-H member may complete this application for Wabash County 4-H Achievement Awards following completion of the fifth year in a project. Each award may be received once per project and will be awarded in the order presented below. (For example: A project pin cannot be received if the member has not yet received a certificate.) **Awards will be given to all 4-H members who have met eligibility requirements.**
