

<u>Pasta Primavera Recipe</u> Source: Myplate.gov; Serves 3 people Ingredients:

1 cup of noodles, uncooked

1 tablespoon of vegetable oil

2 cups mixed fresh vegetables, *chopped* (broccoli, carrots, peppers, etc.)

1 cup tomatoes, *cut in half*

1 tablespoon margarine 1/4 teaspoon garlic powder 1/8 teaspoon black pepper 3 tablespoons Parmesan cheese

Black olives, cut in half

<u>Instructions:</u>

1. Wash hands with soap and water.

- 2.Cook noodles according to package directions.
- 3. While noodles are cooking, heat oil in a skillet.
- 4. Add vegetables and sauté until tender; stir constantly.
- 5.Add tomato and sauté 2 more minutes.
- 6. Toss vegetables with noodles and margarine.
- 7.Add seasonings; sprinkle with Parmesan cheese.

What Are Extension Homemakers, You Ask?

Extension Homemakers are an Indiana statewide organization, begun in 1913. Whitley County's group was organized in 1924 as a Women's Auxiliary of the Farm Bureau. A constitution was drawn up and accepted on July 2 of this year and stayed in effect until 1952 at which time anyone could become a member not just those affiliated with the Farm Bureau. Further revisions were made in 1972 in order to comply with the Civil Rights Laws of Membership Affirmative Action and remains in effect today.

Whitley County Extension Homemakers, in 1924, consisted of 9 clubs with 243 members. The objectives of this group back then were educational in nature and served to promote the advancement of home and community life along with encouraging children to achieve the highest ideals in citizenship through the 4-H program.

Along with the educational aspect, fund raising projects were begun in the late 1960's by serving meals to community groups with profits used for a variety of activities. Today, fundraising is predominantly focused on scholarships for high school seniors and an assortment of other community service projects.

Extension Homemakers have always been involved with the 4-H Fair. The early groups began serving food in the shelter house with a menu consisting of hot beef, hot dogs, sloppy joes and have become known for their pies. A fund to build a new building was begun, and in 1953, the 4-H Center, we know today, opened complete with a new kitchen to prepare food for the fair. The favorite hot beef sandwiches and homemade pies continue to be served and a variety of daily dinners were added to the menu. To this day, the Extension Homemakers still volunteer to cook and serve food for the fair.

Today, many annual functions (some begun over 20 years ago), bring in the needed revenue to finance projects such as: 4-H Fair Adult Open Show, Holiday Craft Bazaar and the spring and fall Garage Sale are the biggest.

It is interesting, but concerning, to note that in 1951, the statewide membership in Extension Homemakers was 58,800 individuals consisting of 2,220 clubs; however, in 2020, that number has dwindled to only 6,664 members throughout the state. In order to become a bigger presence in our community and be of service to all, it has become necessary to focus on increasing our membership.

Recognizing Mental Health Awareness Month

Did you know that May is **Mental Health Awareness Month**? Over the years, mental health has gone from being a subject that many people avoid to one that is receiving more attention and understanding. Recognizing Mental Health Awareness Month helps remind people that they are not alone in their struggles. **1 in 5 adults** experience a diagnosed mental health condition each year, which accounts for **20% of the adult population**. This is a significant issue that many individuals face quietly, but by raising awareness, we can show that help and support are available.

Here are a few key facts to further emphasize the importance of mental health awareness:

- 46% of Americans will meet the criteria for a diagnosable mental health condition at some point in their life, with half of these individuals developing their conditions by the age of 14.
- Anxiety disorders are among the most common mental health conditions in the United States, affecting 42.5 million adults.
- 22.5 million adults in the U.S. have been diagnosed with major depression.


If you or someone you know is seeking mental health support in Whitley County, several local resources are available:

- Bowen Health (formerly Bowen Center) offers comprehensive mental health services, including crisis intervention, addiction recovery, and life skills support. They have recently partnered with local law enforcement and courts to provide a mental health response program aimed at connecting individuals to treatment and reducing court involvement. For more information, visit Bowen Health or call their crisis line at (800) 342-5653.
- Parkview Behavioral Health Institute provides inpatient and outpatient care for mental health and substance use issues. They offer 24/7 assessments and a range of treatment options. Contact them at (800) 284-8439 or visit Parkview Behavioral Health.
- Helpline of Whitley County is a local referral service assisting individuals and families in need of emergency assistance and resources. Reach them at (260) 248-2601.
- **Psychology Today** offers a directory of licensed therapists in Whitley County, allowing individuals to find mental health professionals based on specific needs and preferences. Explore available therapists at Psychology Today Whitley County.

Be Water-Wise: Trips for Staying Safe Aroung Water

Whether you're at a pool, beach, or lake, it's important to be aware of potential hazards and take precautions to protect yourself and others. Here are some key tips to follow before you jump in:

- **Know the risks** of your environment. Be aware of hazards like rip currents, deep water, water temperature, and underwater dangers such as vegetation or animals.
- Swim in areas where lifeguards are present. Having a trained lifeguard on duty can provide an extra layer of safety in case of emergencies.
- Wear a Coast Guard-approved life jacket when boating or swimming in unfamiliar waters. Children should always wear a lifejacket, regardless of their swimming ability.
- **Never swim alone.** Always swim with someone or ensure that someone is watching you from shore. It's especially important for children to never swim alone.
- Assess your fitness level and any medications you may be taking that could impair your ability to swim or respond to emergencies.
- Be familiar with emergency procedures and know what to do if someone is in distress. If a child is missing, always check the water first, as drowning can happen quickly and silently.
- Alert the lifeguard if one is present, especially if someone seems to be in trouble.

It's also important to recognize the signs of someone in trouble. A swimmer may need immediate help if they:

- Are unable to make forward progress in the water;
- Are vertical but unable to move or tread water;
- Are motionless and face down in the water.

In these situations, rescue the person from the water if it's safe to do so, and immediately call emergency services. Begin CPR if necessary. By following these simple but essential safety tips, you can help ensure a safe and enjoyable time in the water for everyone.

Helpful Hints on 4-H Posters & Notebooks

All 4-H posters (regardless of project) must be displayed horizontal.

Think of a 4-H exhibit poster like a dollar bill. You read the dollar bill horizontally and a poster is the same way.

- POSTERS MUST HAVE A HARD BACKING to make them stand when placed on the display easel. Use cardboard, foam board or lightweight wood.
- ➤ BE AWARE OF THE SIZE OF FOAM BOARD. A lot of foam board poster board for sale is 20"X30" - this is the wrong size do not use! Your poster must be 22"X28". Foam poster board can be used if it correctly measures the 22"X28" size. The 22"X28" foam poster board is available at the Extension Office. Price is \$4.00 per poster board.
- > REMEMBER TO COVER YOUR POSTER with clear plastic for protection. Heavy duty acetate is available at hardware stores. Poster sleeves (\$1.00) and Salon print sleeves(\$.50) are available at the Extension Office

Road and Farm Safety this Spring

Be patient and safe on roads during the spring planting season.



(SMV) Slow-moving vehicle emblems should be displayed on farm equipment and other slow-moving vehicles. An SMV emblem is a triangle shape, with an orange fluorescent center and red reflective borders. Equipment and other vehicles displaying this emblem are capable of speeds no faster than 25 miles per hour. Driving at road speed, the gap between you and the equipment will close quickly, so immediate caution and slower speeds are prudent.

Most farmers have had some significant days in the farm shop to get equipment ready. However, I'd urge farmers to recheck the condition of SMV emblems to make sure they are still fluorescent. Over time, these emblems can fade, become less noticeable, and need replacing.

Other road-related safety equipment, such as headlights, taillights, flashing lights, hitch pins, tires, and wheel bearings also should be checked.

Large equipment should be fully folded to transport position for the safety of the farmer and other drivers when moving from field to field over the road.

Coupling road hazards with general farming risks, farming is a dangerous operation.

Spotted Lanternfly in Indiana

Spotted lanternfly could be anywhere in Indiana, and we'd like to ask you to help us scout for spotted lanternfly now. The most at-risk sites appear to be railroad corridors bordered by tree-of-heaven trees. Especially at-risk among those sites would be places where the railcars sit idle for extended periods. New nymphs

will be hatching out soon to crawl around on tree-of-heaven and other plants. If you see this little black



insect with white polka-dots, please let us know, or report your finds at https://www.eddmaps.org/.

Although their preferred host is treeof-heaven, this is a devasting insect of grape, and can also affect fruit trees, hardwood trees, and other plants. Although SLF feeds on over 100 host plants, not all of these incur economic damage. Grapes are the primary crop of concern according to our current understanding.
